November Re-Cap by Matt Spielman

Keith Leff, aka "The Midwest's Most Magnificent Magician", was the guest of honor for our November OMS meeting. With 25 years in the business Keith's range of services span from close up/strolling performances, corporate events, trade shows, and even inspirational speaking. For our group Mr. Leff presented his lecture "A Close Up Look at the Art and Science Strolling Magic" which primarily focused on table hopping in the restaurant business and was designed for the "working" magician. Despite the focus on table hopping the lecture was inclusive to everyone in the group and contained extremely useful tidbits of information for everyone including the hobbyists in attendance.



Multiple courses were covered for the group interweaved with witty one liners and quick hitting close up magic. Topics covered were:

- When and how to approach a restaurant
- How to approach a table
- The science of how to negotiate fees and contracts
- How to handle tips
- Pitching a free "demonstration night" and how to handle the first performance
- Self-promotion
- Relationship strategies for customers, coworkers, and managers


25 years of expertise was on display as Keith covered each topic in depth with multiple stories from his professional career and several performances of close-up magic. Even though the focus of the lecture was for the restaurant working magician, the bulk of the lecture contained useful information applicable to everyone in the group. A clever pneumonic for names was taught, how to read and approach a group for a performance, and overall, how to create a great experience for your audience. Of course, high-level close-up magic kept the evening interesting as well. Multiple handlings of burnttorn-restored-vanished match sticks were taught as well as a handful of slights to perform using one of his vanishing card boxes. An impromptu topit history lesson was covered as well as the Erdnase color change and the Mercury fold.



At the end of the lecture Keith had several items to purchase at a discount to OMS members, many of which were performed and taught to the group throughout the night. Many thanks to the club for getting this lecture setup, loaded with information to make everyone a better performer.







Larry's Logic

Is magic an art?

Short answer? No. No, it's not. At "best", it could be considered to be a very MINOR art form.

But to explain my thinking, we're going to have to poll a group of people. And group of people is EVERYONE in the world you know – except – magicians, magic collectors, and people affiliated with magic. Such as grandparents of magicians, etc.

So, let's imagine that we're stepping inside any of your friends' houses. Look around at the walls. Disregarding family photos, do you see any other pictures or paintings? Any landscapes, pictures of animals, any drawings?



Maybe they have a poster or two framed and hanging on the walls. A poster of a movie for example. Maybe a teens room has posters of the latest boy-band sensation. Maybe the man-cave has a jersey that's signed by a Nebraska coach.

But you saw some stuff, right?

Now check around for CD's. MP3 players. Spotify accounts. Radios, vinyl, maybe an old tape-to-tape system. Maybe browse their phones to see if they have any songs cued up.

You saw some right?

Well, let's continue. Do they have any TV's. DVD collections. Do they have any streaming services. Computers?

Now, let's take one last look around. Find a poster, a DVD, a figurine, a "anything" that has the least thing to do with magic or magicians.

I'm guessing you're pulling up a blank on this one, aren't you? I believe that this is because art (paintings, sketches, photographs) and music (MP3 players, song lists) and sports/movies/TV stars all MATTER to these people. Whereas magic **doesn't**.

So, none of them have a single photo, a single taped magic special, a book about a magician. Because they don't really CARE about magic.

But why don't they? This is actually, in my mind, a pretty simple question.

It's because we can only offer SURPRISE as an emotion. One thing.

Books, movies, songs, and paintings can make you cry, make you feel patriotic, make you empathize, make you hate, make you love. They can make you experience the entire gamut of human emotion.

Heck, they can even make you think, and perhaps even change your mind.

Magic goes "BOO"! And the very format of magic works against us.

We have to create our scripts to work WITHIN the confines of the trick. Imagine if movies had this type of restriction. A restriction like "every scene in a movie must be shot from behind". Think how different movies would be.



We have 3 to 10 minutes to do a trick. A movie has 2 hours to explore its theme. A book has 200 pages. A sport has a season...and a lifetime of being a fan.

How can we express much of anything other than light comedy in 3 minutes, WHILE we attend to the needs of the magic?



I even think the formal definition of art proves my point. Art is – per Wikipedia - "**Art** is a diverse range of human activity, and resulting product, that involves creative or imaginative talent expressive of technical proficiency, beauty, emotional power, or conceptual ideas. " So, let's look at our resulting product, shall we?

"Expressive of technical proficiency". We aren't. In most cases, we HIDE our technical proficiency. don't want it noticed.

"Beauty, emotional power, or conceptual ideas". certainly don't see this in 99.99999% of the magic being done.



Copperfield's FLYING routine certainly tried to express the concept of flying, but how successful was it? people talk about "Boy, I'd love to fly like that" or did they ask "How did he do that?"

As a matter of fact, the day after that special aired, I had someone at work say, "That was really neat how he floated in the air." Not FLEW...floated. Ugh.

We've got "Boo".

So, we've got at best a minor art form that really can't progress much past that.

And that's ok. We'll always have "Boo."


