

## Presidential Ponderings

Our own member, **Theron Christensen's** first book *Plotting Astonishment* has just been published and is now available on Amazon. It was good for me to read it. I plan to read it again. I believe the insights he shares has the power to raise your own performances to yet another level. With his permission, I share a portion of the book's introduction with you.



## Introduction: The Effect

*"To produce a magical effect, of original conception, is a work of high art."* --Nevil Maskelyne

Dear reader, I hold my breath as you turn the pages of this book for the first time. I was hesitant to add this work to the vast cacophony of magic literature. I am not well-known among magicians, nor do I pretend to be any sort of expert; and to publish your knowledge and opinion is to invite the scorn and rebuttal of many. But too many of my close friends and the nudge of my conscience have pushed me to produce the work which you hold in your hands. To start out, I would like to explain my intentions.

When Maskelyne and Devant published *Our Magic* in 1911, they urged magicians to recognize the importance of being original in magic. "Without originality," they said, "no man can become a great artist." Their efforts paid off. Today, magicians almost universally accept the importance of originality.

Just as Maskelyne observed over one hundred years ago, magicians tend to seek after originality in one of three ways. Some magicians invest their creative energy in engineering more intricate and deceptive *methods* for magic. Others devote their imagination to authoring unique and engaging *presentations* for magic. But this book focuses on the third, far more fundamental and difficult pursuit of making the magic itself creative and original.

The goal of this book is to help you create original magical *effects*. But to fully understand the mission of this book, I need to offer a few definitions to guide our discussion. Modern magicians, for instance, use the term "effect" with unpredictable and subjective meanings, which makes it difficult to discuss the topic in depth. For the purposes of this book, I consider the effect to mean **the most basic elements of a piece of magic as**

**experienced by the audience.** Sometimes magicians will prefer calling the effect the “plot” of the trick, the trick’s “concept,” or the magical “phenomenon,” but we are referring to the same thing.

Creating original magical effects will require you to drive a conceptual wedge between an *effect* and the *method* used to accomplish it. Recognize that causing a signed bill to appear in a lemon is the same effect regardless of whether you use a thumb tip, a gimmicked knife, or a secret assistant to get the money in the fruit. Of course, some methods are more *deceptive* than others, and, as we will later explore, some methods allow the performer to more clearly convey her intended effect, but do not fall into the trap of believing that creating an original method implies that you have also created an original effect.

You should also drive a conceptual wedge between a magical *effect* and its *presentation*. Presentation encompasses any scripting, staging, audience interaction, or storytelling that accompanies the magic you perform. An effect, on the other hand, can almost always be expressed in one sentence or less. Here are a few examples: “plucking dollar bills out of the sky,” “magically perceiving where in the audience someone has hidden a sewing needle,” or “walking through a spider web without damaging it—like Dracula.” If you find yourself describing an effect with more than one sentence, you are probably describing a presentation and not an effect

Finally, it is imperative to understand what I mean by an *original* effect. As I hope to emphasize throughout this book, I believe that for a magical effect to be considered *original* it requires two complementary and counterbalancing characteristics: **novelty and meaning**, both of which I will explain in more detail later on.

*Part I* encourages you to formulate a unique perspective and understanding of what constitutes magic. This, in turn, will act as a compass as you set out to create original magic. *Part II* discusses the first element of originality (novelty). *Part III* introduces the inspiration problem (the difficulty of generating ideas for original effects), discusses the second element of originality (meaning), and offers five exercises to help you stimulate your own ideas for novel and meaningful effects. *Part IV* will briefly discuss the process of developing a method for your new magic. Lastly, *Part*

*V* discloses a few of my own effects, which I hope you will find both novel and meaningful.

So, this book is about creating original magic; but this book serves another purpose, too. After I had completed the first draft, I realized that much of the advice I offer for thinking up original magic is also sound advice for selecting material more generally. In other words, even if you have no interest in creating original magic, I believe you will still find this book valuable for selecting which published and marketed effects to add to your personal repertoire of mysteries.

Regardless of your individual intentions, I hope that your journey towards magical achievement will be accelerated because of your willingness to read a book.
