

Since that time Greg has performed magic around the world, winning many prestigious awards and accolades. In my March Letter my featured Magician was **Rocco Silano**. From an article in *The William Peterson Beacon* of April 22, 1980 there is a story about his performance and a bit of his mentor. The article states: "As Silano's sorcery continued, it was obvious that he was well taught. For the last four months Silano has taken private lessons from **Bill Wisch**, the successor to **Slydini**, the famous 83-year-old magician. Slydini, 'who is one of the best' according to Silano, does not teach any more. One of the routines Silano has learned from Wisch is Slydini's cigarette production routine known as poetry in magic."




**Bill Wisch** lectured at our club in November of 2019.

### What's Your Magic Story?

This month it was my pleasure to sit down to lunch at Petrow's with **Tom Zepf** for what I hope will be the first of many such opportunities. He caught the magic bug as a young boy of 10 in Cincinnati, OH and would go on to join the IBM's Cincinnati Ring 71 in 1954 at the age of 19. He is a member of the Order of Merlin Excelsior.

**Tom** did his undergraduate studies at Xavier University in Cincinnati and his graduate studies at Saint Louis University and moved to Omaha to take a position with Creighton University. Before retiring at the end of the 2001-2002 academic year he gave 40 years of service to their physics department. During that time, he chaired

the physics department from 1963 to 1973, served as the chief health professions advisor for the College of Arts and Sciences in 1975 to 1981 and again chaired the department from 1981 to 1993, receiving Creighton's Distinguished Faculty Service Award in 1987 and the Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1997. His research focused on condensed matter physics and laser optics (I hear the theme from the Big Bang Theory each time I read that sentence.)

When he moved to Omaha, he became a member of the Omaha Magical Society, SAM Assembly 7 in 1962, and served at President of the OMS in 1963-64 and 2014, receiving the Omaha Magical Society's David P. Abbott Award in 2010. It is safe to say he strives for excellence in everything he does. In talking to him about the various

presentations he has done over the years, there were two in particular that stood out. The first was one of his favorite programs to present, "The Mind's Eye: A Lighthearted Look at Extra Sensory Perception" in which he guides participants through various ESP-like experiences where the spectator is the one to accomplish seemingly impossible feats. His favorite closer was an effect so astonishing that it elicited a very strong reaction from the participant, often a startled scream of utter disbelief.



The second is the 40+ year tradition of the **Haunted Physics Lab** at Creighton presented every year for the Halloween season. Many of our OMS members have witnessed first-hand this testament to

Tom's passion for physics combined with magic principles. The four decades old tradition consists of 30 stations which showcase different physics phenomena. Zepf puts it best himself in an article published in the Physics Teachers Journal early in 2000, "Halloween celebrates a frightful, irrational confrontation with mystery, whereas in physics we approach the mysteries of the universe rationally." But words cannot describe the Haunted Lab sufficiently.

# May Re-Cap by Matt Spielman

Mark Wilson 's Complete Course in Magic was the focus for our May OMS meeting. More than 300 tricks ranging from coin, stage, card, mentalism, and beyond are taught in this book targeted to the beginner magician. Despite being written for a beginner the book contains solid ideas and routines that even an intermediate or master magician can appreciate and slip into their routine. Kicking off the night **Neil Bable** performed "Million to One" (pg. 325) with a slight twist using cheese slices instead of cards. It was a fantastic mentalism routine that allowed the audience to pick a number between 1-10 and somehow choose the one cheese slice out of the 10 with a blue back.



After the first performance everyone in the group was provided a copy of Mark Wilson's book and was instructed to pick their favorite section from the table of contents which is broken down by the different genres of magic covered. Once a selection was made, we broke off into groups to illustrate our

favorite trick from that genre on a large piece of paper along the walls. Before continuing further, we gathered for **Thomas Gray's** performance of "The Card Through Handkerchief" (pg. 70). After having a selected card buried in the deck it was then wrapped in a handkerchief seemingly lost and sealed. Thomas was able to put a fun story to the trick and even got the group to chant "heaven and demons" summoning the culmination of the trick with the selected card melting through the handkerchief and on to the floor.



Our last group activity had each group go over their favorite trick chosen from the book and why it was important to them. Despite the illustrations ranging from good to bad the group discussions reaffirmed what a great value the book is and many examples were given of how the book has impacted their journey in the world of magic. I performed the final trick of the night, New Card Monte (pg. 117) using UNO cards. Two cards were chosen from the pack and then inserted back into the empty card box. I then openly showed the audience my selection and placed it into my pocket. After asking the audience if they paid attention, I then revealed the cards swapped places with my selection returning the card box and the other in my pocket. Mark Wilson's Complete Course in Magic is a great collection of magic and can somehow be found for \$10 or less, it comes highly recommended from our group.










# Larry's Logic

#### Middle of the act

For me, the middle of the act starts after the second trick, and extends to the next to last trick of the act.

This is where it's easy to put new material in. If it's super-long (and for me, that's 7 minutes or so), I'll shove it toward the back of the act.

Other than that, just about anything goes.



BUT...you want to remember your Henning Nelms' INTEREST CURVE from his book "MAGIC AND SHOWMANSHIP – A HANDBOOK FOR CONJURERS".

Now, I don't agree with EVERYTHING about this 'curve' but it definitely provides value as you build your act.

Now my act doesn't exactly follow this curve, but the idea of planning for ups and downs is something I like to do. So, in between 2 UP points is where I'll stick a new piece. That way, the potential disappointment of a failed routine will be lessened by having 2 GOOD routines bracketing it.

Another thing I tend to do is stick almost ALL of my spectator assisted tricks in the middle and late middle, since I've already proven myself.

I did a survey of my own once. Now, this may surprise you, but people I've known through my professional life and not through magic usually don't know that I do magic. I keep this on the down low.

Even people that have known me for +20 years, and know I do magic, probably haven't seen me do a trick, since I don't just "spontaneously" do tricks.

So, some dear friends of mine (+20 years) asked me to perform at a party they were having. Many of their friends I knew and had worked with. So, a total VIRGIN group for me.

I did my show.....and then....1 year later, I sent everyone I knew who was at the party a survey. I asked them to tell me what I had done.

The most anyone remembered was 3 tricks. In total, removing duplicates, the ENTIRE group remembered 5 items. AND IN EVERY CASE, they remembered WHO helped me more than they remembered the trick itself.

For example, almost everyone remembered the EGG BAG. But what they said was, "You did a trick with Sharon and a bag. I don't remember the exact trick, but I remember Sharon's face at the end."

So, my act went from about 60% spectator assisted to closer to 85% assisted.

And this is what's in the MIDDLE.

Sunday was the wrap up with **Joseph Gabriel** giving a very nice and informative lecture.





Rather than a series of magic tricks that can be done ON your smartphone with a special app, this periodic series in The Flash Paper will contain magic tricks you can do OVER your smartphone - calling another person and performing the magic with them. Since the person on

the other end of the phone won't be able to see you, one of the better parts is that each of these columns will be the actual script you could read in delivering your magic.

#### **Magic At the Dinner Table**



Before we begin, I need you to place on a table in front of you a knife, a fork and a spoon. You can place them in any order. However, they do need to be in a row. You could put the knife on the left or the right or in the middle. The same could be said for both the spoon and the fork. Place them carefully in a row.

Now we're going to mix them up as I give you some brief instructions. All I ask is that you simply listen carefully and follow my instructions exactly.

First. . . exchange the spoon with the item on its right. If there is no item on the spoon's right, just leave the spoon where it is. Again, let me say it slowly . . . change the spoon's position with the item on the spoon's right. If there is no item to the right of the spoon, just leave the spoon where it is. Have you done that? Good.

Secondly... exchange the knife with the item on its left. If there is no item on the knife's left, just leave the knife

where it is. Again, let me say it slowly . . . change the knife's position with the item to the left of the knife. If there is no item on the knife's left, just leave the knife where it is.

Finally . . . exchange the fork with the item on its right. If there is no item to the right of the fork, just leave the fork where it is. Again, let me say it slowly. . . change the fork's position with the item on the fork's right. If there is no item on the fork's right, just leave the fork where it is. Now take the item on the far-left end of the row and carefully sit on it. Again, let me say pick up the item on the far-left end of the row and carefully sit on it. Then pick up in your right hand the sharper of the two 2 objects remaining on the table. Pick up in your right hand the sharper of the two items remaining on the table.

Finally, hold the last object in your left hand. Hold the last object in your left hand.

Now. . . please stare at the object in your left hand. I will attempt to pick up your thoughts. Concentrate on that object. In fact, if you could picture yourself using it, it would help me lock onto your thoughts. I'm receiving an image of you eating a bowl of breakfast cereal. No one eats breakfast cereal with a knife or fork. . . so you must be holding the spoon in your left hand.

Now. . . shift your focus to your right hand. Picture yourself using that utensil. OW! I'm seeing a stabbing motion. That could either be a knife or a fork. However, I believe that it's the knife! No wait . . . I'm seeing it clearer now. It's the fork! Am I right?

Then you must surely be careful as you reach underneath yourself and remove the knife. Careful! Careful!

#### **OMS Leadership Transition Announced**


