You might even put this to the test at our May club meeting. I'm going to.

He was a wealth of knowledge with dozens of effects that he shared on top of the ones I have already mentioned. Scott finished out his lecture with a Q and A where he shared his approach to inventing magic and his creative process.

This month, I got to sit down with **Theron Christensen**,

who's Magic Story started when he was 11 years old and experienced his first magic show. During the performance he was asked to come up and help with a trick and he was hooked from that moment on. That sense of amazement stuck with him and when he later saw another magician in Middle School who performed Gene Anderson's Torn and Restored Newspaper, Theron's amazement changed to intense curiosity. He went from that sense of wonder watching magic, to wanting to learn how these seemingly impossible feats could be accomplished.




He began performing in High School as his skill and interest grew and by the time he was in undergraduate school at Brigham Young University, he was well on his way to becoming a full-time professional magician. While at Brigham Young he met and married Kate who supported and assisted him as he developed his act. After nearly two years of performing professionally full-time, he and his wife made the decision to move to Lincoln while he attended Law School. During that time, he continued to perform, invent original effects, and spend hours poring over books on magic theory.



During our conversation, I especially enjoyed listening to Theron talk about the book he has been writing. His time spent studying creative minds like Tommy Wonder and Paul Daniel's as well as Omaha's David Abbott were just some of the influences that lead him to create "Plotting Astonishment" which he points to as his attempt to answer one of the most unanswerable questions in the Art of Magic: how do you come up with an original magical effect?

For those of us who wonder what it means for magic to be "original," or what the difference is between "originality" and "novelty," or how to stimulate inspiration for original magic on a regular basis, this will be a book well worth reading.





Sadly, for us, Theron will be leaving the area in August to take a position with a law firm in Iowa. But until that happens, I encourage you to take a moment the next time you see him at a Club meeting to see what else he is working on, and where he is heading next.
