Interview with Ron Gerard

Practice, practice, practice. That is just one of the many take-aways I gleaned from a fascinating lunch with **Ron Gerard**. As I sat down at the table, Ron smiled and handed me his business card, which disappeared before my very eyes when I reached to take it from him. Without hesitation, he showed me how he did that trick and a few others before the interview concluded! This was not a surprise, though. Ron was one of the first people I met at my first Magic Society meeting last year. He is such an enthusiastic, supportive person. I can count on him to explain things and help me fumble through trying to learn the most basic magic tricks. I was very much looking forward to learning his magic story.

Ron has quite a long and interesting history with our Magic Society. Since the 1980's, he has been a member in several roles, such as membership chairman, banquet coordinator and performer for our annual banquet, and served a stint as club President. He first caught the magic bug in a very interesting way while he was working as a pharmacist.

His drug store was among the first in Omaha to obtain a new blood pressure device that attracted a long line of patrons outside the store. Several men standing in line were obviously friends. They were practicing something using hand gestures, definitely not sign language, as they awaited their turn at the newfangled B.P. machine. Curious, Ron was drawn to that unique group, who seemed to be having a pretty fun time manipulating cards and coins while in the queue. His assistant coworker, **Connie Tushner**, was the wife of one of the men in this

group and introduced Ron to the mix. They just happened to be several magicians! (Thank goodness they weren't clowns...I am kind of creeped out by some clowns. Think IT.)

Soon, Ron was welcomed into the world of magic by these very fine professionals, who became his mentors and introduced him to our Omaha Magic Society. Walter Graham, Denny Rourke, Pete Petrashek, Mike Tushner and other esteemed magicians took Ron under their wing. Thus, began his magical journey and transformation into the comedic magician, Dr. Spoof.



Ron's tricks were honed on his drive to work. In his car, he would practice slight-of-hand card, coin and rope tricks. Immediately, I had a vision of Ron being pulled over for a minor traffic violation. The officer sees coins and ropes on the passenger side of the vehicle and arrests Ron on suspicion of either being a bank robber or a serial killer. Oh, Ron, you are a very lucky man indeed. Through lots of diligence and support from his new group of friends, Ron expanded his repertoire into a myriad of magic, including skills involving disappearing, misdirection, escape and levitation. One of his first major tricks was the Floating Woman. Walter **Graham** generously taught this trick to Ron. You've probably seen this performed. A hoop is passed through the elevated, prone body of a volunteer or assistant to prove that no other support besides the air and the power of concentration was used.

Bill Wisch Lecture




