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
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Musicians

Dr. Jason Heald currently serves as Director of Music at Umpqua Community College, and is an active composer, performer, educator, and clinician in the Pacific Northwest. He holds a Ph.D. in composition from University of Oregon, a master's degree from University of Portland, and a bachelor's degree from Lewis and Clark College. Dr. Heald is a prolific composer, with works published by Augsburg Press, ChoralWeb, UNC Jazz Press, Plymouth Music, Sound Music Publishing, and Call of the Wild Publishing.

Recent premiers and commissions include performances by the Oregon Musical Theatre Festival, Shreveport Opera, Vanguard Voices, Delgani Quartet, Consonare, Kantorei, The Singers -Minnesota Choral Artists, the Willamette Singers, Lake County Symphony Orchestra, Umpqua Chamber Orchestra, Peter Argondizza, guitarists Cameron O'Connor and James Bishop-Edwards, soprano Linda Larson, and Halcyon Trio Oregon, Recent awards include Grand Prize Winner, Eventide Arts Songfest (Dennis MA); Grand Prize winner, Cascadian Choral Composition Competition (Seattle, WA); Longfellow Chorus Award of Distinction in Choral Composition (Portland, ME), Vanguard Premieres Composition Contest (Detroit, MI); Sacred Voice Arts Song Finalist, (Salt Lake City, UT); Finalist, 21st Annual Ithaca College of Music Choral Composition Competition (Ithaca, NY); and Project Encore Composer, (New York, NY). Heald's orchestral concerts have featured Grammy award-winning artists Mason Williams and Tingstad and Rumbel, Craig Chaquico (Jefferson Starship), the Four Freshmen, Delgani String Quartet, and jazz vocalist Haley Loren. Dr. Heald has also been the recipient of many ASCAP symphonic and educational awards

Program

Mikado

- Arthur Sullivan (with W.S. Gilbert)

The Mikado, a comic opera, was an instant success in 1885 when it opened at the Savoy Theatre in London, running for 672 performances. It is one of the most often played musical theatre pieces in history. The Mikado is a satire of late 19th century British institutions, society and politics. By setting the opera in a fantasy Japan, an exotic locale far away from contemporary Britain, Gilbert (who wrote the libretto) was able to satirize British politics more freely and soften the impact of his criticisms of British social institutions. The operetta employs musical burlesque, a form of satire that parodies grand opera, adding a humorous layer to the music.

Piano Concerto No.3 in C minor, Op 37

Beethoven

The Piano Concerto No.3 was always thought to have been composed in 1800, although the year of its composition has been questioned by some contemporary musicologists. It was first performed on April 5, 1803, with Beethoven as soloist. During that same performance, the Second Symphony and the oratorio, *Christ on the Mount of Olives*, were also premiered. The Piano Concert No. 3 was published in 1804, and was dedicated to Prince Louis Ferdinand of Prussia. The first primary theme is reminiscent of that of Mozart's 24th Piano Concerto, also in C minor.

Irish Legends

Leroy Anderson

Leroy Anderson was an American composer of short, light concert pieces, many of which were introduced by the Boston Pops Orchestra under the direction of Arthur Fiedler. John Williams described him as "one of the great American masters of light orchestral music." Many of Anderson's compositions have been used as TV show theme songs. He wrote the *Irish Suite part I* in 1947. He also wrote *Sleigh Ride*, another famous song.

Anna Christina Streletz,

Her most recent solo project this spring was a recital titled 'Poems, Songs and the Sea' featuring works by Chaminade, Bloch and Chopin. She performed the concert locally and in Juneau, Alaska as part of the Juneau Council of Arts Piano Series founded by Jon Hays. She is an active member of the piano community in the valley and serves as treasurer on the board of the local district of Oregon Music Teachers Association.

Egyptian March, Op 335

-J. Strauss II

Also known as the Egyptischer Marsch (German) the march was commissioned for the inauguration of the Suez Canal, celebrated on November 17, 1869 in Port Said, where Emperor Franz Joseph I of Austria officiated at the ceremonial opening. In musical terms, Johann Strauss' "Egyptian March" has been described as a "representative example of an "alla turca," composition, a style often used by European composers to evoke the music of Turkish military bands.

Requiem in C minor

-Luigi Cherubini

The Requiem in C minor for mixed chorus was written by Luigi Cherubini in 1816 and premiered in January 1817 at a commemoration service for King Louis XVI of France on the twenty-fourth anniversary of his beheading during the French Revolution. The work was greatly admired by Beethoven, Schumann, Berlioz and Brahms. It was supposedly performed at Beethoven's funeral in 1827. The Requiem Mass consists of seven movements. In 1834, the work was prohibited by the archbishop of Paris because of its use of women's voices, so in 1836 Cherubini wrote a second Requiem, this one in D minor for a men's chorus. Cherubini's Requiem is notable for using long solo lines of choral voices, as opposed to individual vocal soloists as in most other Requiem Masses. Cherubini uses elements of Mozart and Beethoven, as well as traditional melodic devices used in liturgical music as far back as the Renaissance.
