NEURODIVERSITY AFFIRMING PHRASES TO USE IN ASSESSMENT REPORTS FOR AUTISTIC CHILDREN

| Demonstrated appropriate eye contact/ social communication with the therapist | Interacted with me in the following ways during the assessment |
| Has severe delays in using expressive grammar accurately | Has difficulty using accurate grammar when speaking, e.g This can lead to other people misunderstanding their messages and can negatively impact interactions |
| Interrupts frequently | Shows excitement and interjects often within a conversation. In some cases, communication partners may interpret this as rudeness, however these interjections appear to be a way for to share their enjoyment and connection with what another person is sharing. |
| Doesn't use verbal communication yet | Communicates in the following ways: |
| Isn't using their AAC device independently | Is able to use their AAC device with the following supports in place: |
| Doesn't show appropriate skills for pretend play, hitting the doll on the floor repetitively, rather than feeding it | Has a play preference for sensory exploration of toys and objects, e.g. appearing to enjoy listening to the sound a doll made when it hit the floor, many times |
| Repetitively talked about her topic of interest, the Titanic, rather than taking turns with the therapist talking about each others' preferred topics | has a strong interest in the Titanic, and shared many interesting facts with me during our session. She responded really positively and appeared to feel relaxed in our interaction when I showed an interest in learning more about her topic of interest. |
| Parent reported that hits his brother regularly and the family has difficulty controlling or stopping this challenging behaviour. | Parent reported that often hits his brother. This generally happens when has not slept well the night before, and it usually happens when his brother takes the remote control for the TV and changes away from's favourite show appears to be communicating that he is upset at that change he hadn't expected, while he was doing a preferred, regulating activity. |

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
