




To date only Three (3) different dies have been recorded used on the stamps of the Gold Coast.

Perfin Obliterator "CANCELLED"

Used by the Judiciary, c1900-1910.

A Carpet die used to cancel Documents, only found in partial on stamps. Perfin through the stamp & Document. Found on QVic & EDVII stamps with postal cancels!, also on stamps with the JUDICIAL overprint.

NOTE: - It is thought that the stamps with postal cancels may have been removed from the original documents and further used fraudulently for postage.



OIL RIVERS PROTECTORATE GREAT BRITAIN USED IN AKASSA

This pair of stamps one with the C.M.S perfin of the Church Missionary Society were used by the Missionary's in the Niger Delta of the Oil Rivers Protectorate.

Letters and parcels were posted back home to the U.K via the Royal Niger Company at Akassa. (See cancellation below).

As depicted on the page above the only known perfin stamps to emanate from the Oil Rivers were British stamps which had been used there by the Missionaries, the stamps would have had the perfin of the Church Missionary Society.






<u>Salt River</u> is a mainly industrial suburb of Cape Town located near Table Bay to the east of the city. It is named after a river of the same name, this being a continuation of the Black River. The name Salt River is a corruption of the Dutch for sweet or fresh river. Salt River is now served by a railway station of the same name





After Sierra Leone became a Crown Colony in January 1808 the Military presence there consisted only of the Royal Africa Corps, which was composed of almost entirely white troops. Because of the climatic conditions the mortality rate was severe and this led to their replacement by a detachment of the West Indian Regiment, which came from Barbados in 1812, and which used Bruce Island • as a recruiting depot.

By May 1819 there were a total of five companies of the Second West Indian Regiment all sent from Jamaica to Garrison Sierra Leone and the Isles of Los and the Gambia.
