other expanding file, this time a much smaller one, which in this instance contains only perfins beginning with the letter A. The final step is to break up the contents of each pocket once more into the necessary sub-sections, and these T place in correct alphabetical order in a small stamp album of the stock book type, with 7 transparent strips per page, which will probably be filled to capacity with the A's. Then at long last the finely ground material is ready for comparsion with the mounted material in the album and a beginning can be made with the picking out of new perfins and the addition to the page of new denominations or otherwise desirable items such as pairs or blocks, double perfs, interesting freaks, postmarks, etc. Of course, pages have to be rearranged and remounted at times, and new pages inserted but that is part of the game and common to all types of collecting on loose leaves.

Right from the beginning I started to compile an index of my perfins in a separate book and I have continued it ever since. I no longer enter page numbers but it still serves its purpose: you are sometimes under the impression that you have seen a certain perfin already and not finding it in the album you begin to wonder whether the page has been misplaced; a glance at the index clears things up very quickly (at least in my case.) What is not in the index is not in the album and vice versa. The index is incomplete in as far as details are concerned, there is only one entry for C. B. & Co. and for variants the album has to be referred to.

If anyone should ask for my reason for collecting perfins according to issues, my reply would be this: I look upon each perfin as upon "a stamp issued in an unknown country" and I am trying to ascertain the first and all subsequent issues of that country, same as orthodox stamp collectors had to do years ago when there was no such thing as a Scott, Gibbons, or Yvert catalogue. Substitute for the word "country" the words "Business firm" and you have it in a nutshell. I am naturally trying all the time to ascertain user's identities as well and I have definitely nailed down large numbers of them, but many of the older ones will, I am afraid, remain unknown for ever.
