If you have a "black light" that will permit you to read messages written in ultra-violet ink, you need to take a look at your first-day-of-use cover for the PF Perfins.

Each one of the covers has been marked with ultra-violet ink (invisible to the eye in normal light) as a safeguard against pos-

sible attempts to create phony covers.
It seems that John Burns ran up against pyramiding postal regulations when he put the covers together. Because he used precancels on the covers, he had to secure a bulk mailing permit for the covers--and the PO would not run the covers through the normal dater-canceller. So a special cancel was applied and the bulk mailing permit was sent in for validation.

But the USPS then revoked the mailing permit on the grounds that Johnhad used too much postage on the covers! By this time, John was wavering somewhere between nervous breakdown and a compelling desire to deck somebody. Fortunately, calm and caution prevailed and John turned to ultra-violet

ink instead.

And thus if you read your cover under untra-violet light, you'll find proof that the cover is legitimate -- plus a personal

message from John Burns.

The covers, which are still available from Burns at 65¢ each, will make nice souvenirs of the Perfins Club show at SESCAL this fall. And complete sets of the five patterns off cover are also available

for 55¢ each.

And of course any member can write John for a supply of current U. S. postage with the PS pattern. Just send along an amount equal to the amount of postage you want. There is no charge for the Perfin itself. However, please enclose a stamped return envelope if you order just the postage.

Now, if you'll find an ultraviolet light and decipher the markings John put on the covers, and send John a note telling him what you found, he'll make you a SESCALPF!

And he'll send you a certificate to prove

it.

And if you don't have any of the special covers, you can still order them from John Burns (7641 Carbon Circle, La Palma, Calif. 90623). The covers are 65¢ each, and complete sets of the five special PF patterns are 55¢ each.

In addition, members can order special stationery and envelopes promoting the show. And postage supplies carrying the PF pattern may be ordered from Burns at face value.

Members are urged to get involved in the SESCAL show. It certainly promises to be the most interesting--and the largest--Perfins Club National Exhibit ever staged.
