Northern Ireland Regionals

The first regional definitive issued for the area designated Northern Ireland made its appearance on 18th August 1958. Since that time several different values and varieties have been issued.

However, these emissions do not seem to have a very prolific use as Perfins. In the recent census the highest count was three. These being in the Jack Brandt collection.

Although intended for use in the appropriate area, the regional issues can be used anywhere within the United Kingdom. So it follows that any G.B. Perfin could be used on the N. Ireland regionals. An appropriate example of this usage is the publicity Perfin used by the Security Endorsement & Perfin Society of Great Britain:

263 SEP./S 10,10,10/1/11 17½mm

This SEPS Perfin is also known used on the regionals of Guernsey, Isle of Man, Jersey, Scotland and Wales.

Checking through my own Irish section, I find examples, all on the 3d. value, on cover, legitimately used in N. Ireland of:

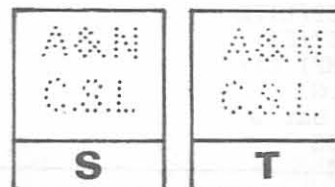
This does seem to indicate a temporary measure, possibly a different supplier, while the first die was being repaired.

Further Notes on A&N/C.S.L Postal Stationery

All the postal stationery envelopes that I have seen emanating from the A&N/CSL have been perforated before make-up. Over the years I have seen two different Perfins on the envelope; dates are:

Fig. S 17 September 1894 to November 1903

Fig. T 22 July 1910 (various minor differences. Pins form straight bar to A.)



The Victorian wrappers are worth a second look. As they were used, the single-die Perfin shows distinct signs of wear or damage.

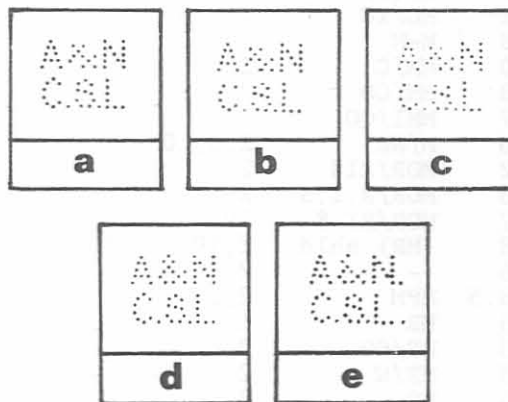


Fig. a 20 June 1888 pins in & missing
