APPENDIX
B.P.A. Society Affiliations

The following is a summary of the facilities and advantages that affiliation to the British Philatelic Association offers to members of Societies.

1. Members of an affiliated Society are entitled to use the services of the Expert Committee and the B.P.A. Collector's Advisory Bureau on the same terms as a full member of the Association providing the stamps are submitted through the Secretary of the Society.
2. Members of an affiliated Society are entitled to use such other protection services the Association makes available to full members e.g. arbitrations in disputes, information as to the standing of a collector or dealer with whom business transactions are proposed, and assistance in the recovery of stamps or money due to members.
3. Admission to exhibitions and conventions organised by the B.P.A. is offered to members of affiliated Societies, either at reduced rates or, on occasions, without any charge at all.
4. An affiliated Society may call on the services of the B.P.A. for assistance in the provision of speakers at their meetings and judges for competitions.
5. An affiliated Society receives regularly the B.P.A. journal PHILATELY, the number of copies varying from one to three according to the membership of the society.
6. An affiliated Society may hire from the B.P.A. exhibition frames each designed to display nine standard size sheets, at a specially reduced fee.
7. Affiliated Societies receive priority in the matter of entries in the "Philatelic Societies Year Book". Only affiliated societies are guaranteed publication of their full programmes in this annual handbook.
8. Affiliated Societies may order, on special terms, copies of the poster which has been designed to draw attention to the hobby to people of all ages, and on each poster a space has been left blank on which can be overprinted announcements of local exhibitions and displays.
