TELEGRAPH PERFINS

As a result of the notes published in a recent News-Sheet Mr Muggleton received a letter from our President giving further types which may be found. Also in the letter were some very interesting observations and we are publishing the relevant parts below.

- 1877 6d olive Plate 1 Spray watermark ---- J/P&C
- 1876 1/- green Plate 5 Watermark Spray ---- N&P (Nurdin and Peacock), block 4, postmarked "Picadilly Circus B.O. Dec 10. 77"
- 1876 1/- green Plate 5 Watermark Spray ---- B&L/H block 4 Postmarked "Hull Dec 8. 77"
- 1876 5/- pale carmine Plate 1 Watermark Maltese Cross G&Co (Gruning & Co. Liverpool). Postmark "...ater St. Liverpool. Dec 14. 77"

The above are in Mr Jennings' collection and his letter went on to say, "As these Telegraph stamps were in use from February lst 1876 to November lst 1881, when fees were 1/- for 20 words and 3d for every additional 5 words, many of these were in the hands of firms who had frequent use for telegrams, and it is only natural that they should puncture these in the same way as their ordinary postage stamps to prevent them being purloined or wrongly used by their staffs.

However, they must be a good deal harder to come by today than postage stamps with punctures".

INTRODUCTION.

The identifications given herein represent less than 20% of the total of known perfin types used during the past 95 years.

Only those that have been positively identified with the aid of a supporting cover or by the users, or those whose name is perforated in full, and thereby self evident, are included, except those marked Ø which although not supported by covers are thought to be correct as suggested by the postmark and date.

Additions will be made from time to time to these lists, when sufficient 'new' identifications have been made to enable the publication of an additional page for any particular letter.

Introduction.

For the purpose of recording perfin types in the best possible manner and without actually illustrating each individual type a system has been adopted which enables details of the letters comprising a design to be written down in catalogue form.

This system is based on the method used by the Perfin Club of U. S. A. but has been extended to cover the further differences which appear in the perfins of Great Britain.

Method Employed.

Perfin types are listed horizontally across the Catalogue page as follows:

- 1) Catalogue Number.
- 2) The letterd forming the Perfin.
- 3) The number of holes in each letter.
- 4) Height of the letters.
- 5) Type of ampersand, where necessary.
- 6) Name of the concern using the Perfin.

1. Catalogue Number.

This is the number given to a particular type of perfin in the Simplified Listing, which shows all recorded <u>types</u>, but neglects varying heights and differing numbers of holes. Where more than one perfin of similar lettering exists these are shown as follows:- 3.1 3.2 for two sizes of the perfin AA.

2. Letters.

The letters are written in one line with an oblique stroke separating the letters of any distinct rows. For example a perfin listed as HB/&Co would appear on the stamp in two lines with the HB directly above the "&Co". Fancy letters or those with serifs are underlined.

3. Number of Holes.

The number of holes comprising the letters are written down in a similar manner to the letters themselves.

4. Height.

The height of the first letter only is given, in most cases following the number of holes. The height is measured to the nearest ½ millimeter above, from the centre of the lowest hole to the centre of the topmost.

5. Type of Ampersand. There are four different types of ampersand each having four possible sub-types:-Straight top., square cut back Ι Straight top, rounded back Ia As type 1 with tail on foot Ib As type la with tail on foot Iab II Triangular top, square cut back Triangular top, rounded back. IIa As type II with tail. IIb IIab As type IIa with tail. Diamond top, square cut back. III Diamond top, rounded hack IIIa As type III with tail. IIIb IIIab As type IIIa with tail. IV Rounded top, square cut back. Rounded top, rounded back. IVa IVb As type IV with tail. IVab As type IVa with tail.

The type of ampersand is shown after the heights (in brackets)

<u>6. Name of Concern.</u> This is given in the final column.

Conclusion.

An asterisk * in the Catalogue entry shows that this is a new identification not in the previous list and the sign Ø indicates that this identification although not supported by documentary evidence is thought to be correct as suggested by the postmark and date of use.

Thus the mythical concern HB/&Co given on the preceeding page might appear in ihe catalogue as follows.

DISPLAYING PERFINS.

The ideal way of displaying perfins in the album is to make a photographic print of the perfin and to mount it together with the stamp in the album. However, an extremely good and inexpensive method is to make a tracing of the design. This can be done by placing the stand on a transparent surface with a source of light beneath, laying a piece of tracing paper over the top and picking out the dots with a pen dipped in Indian ink. This gives a fairly accurate representation of the design which can be mounted in the album to suit ones own inclination. IDENTIFICATIONS.

12.7 MERTON (B) LONDON

The London Borough of Merton was formed on 1st April 1965 by amalgamation of the former areas governed by the Councils of Merton and Morden, Mitcham, and Wimbledon. See under separate headings for further details.

Perfin: LBM No other details

12.8 MERTON & MORDEN (UDC) SURREY

The early history of the district is not clear but some evidence of Roman occupation has been discovered. Merton parish church contains a seat which was used by Lord Nelson when he lived at Merton Place, a house which has since been demolished.

This authority ceased to exist on 1st April 1965 when it was enlarged and created a borough in the new Greater London Council.

Perfin: M&/MC 2H 11,12/11,7 (4½) la

Perfins were introduced about 1936 and were supplied by Slopers until 31st April 1965, although stocks in hand at that time were used to exhaustion.

12.9 MIDDLESBOROUGH (CB) YORKSHIRE

Prior to 1830, Middlesborough was a little known village of some 40 inhabitants. In 1830 the Stockton a Darlington Railway was extended to a new riverside quay site at Middlesborough, constructed for tile shipment of coal from the South Durham coalfields.

By 1840 the population had risen to 5,000, then in 1851, iron ore was discovered in the Eston and Cleveland Hills and Middlesborough was converted from a coal town to an iron town of national importance.

In 1853 the town received its Charter of Incorporation and by 1872 had a population of 40,000. It became a County Borough in 1889 and today has a population of some 158,100.

Perfin: MC H 11,7 (4½)

Perfins have been in use since approximately 1924 and are obtained from Slopers.

12.10 MIDDLETON (B) LANCASHIRE

Middleton which received its Charter in 1886, has present day industries of, cotton spinning, calico printing and dyeing, chemical manufacture, engineering, and jam making to employ the major proportion of its 59,000 people.

Perfin: MC H 15,8 (5½)

Perfins are produced in the Council Offices on a single die machine of unknown make and age.

RULES

- Requests for literature to be accompanied by a 1/- postal order to cover postage and "Recorded Behivery" fee, (large items excepted).
- 2. Literature may be retained for one month unless required by another member.
- 3. Borrowers to be responsible for maintaining items in a reasonable condition (fair wear and tear excepted), and to pack them for transit in such a manner to prevent accidental damage.
- 3. Librarian to have the power to amend rules 1 and 2 for members outside the British Isles.
- 4. Rule 1 does not apply to heavy items (such as the Register of Defunct Companies. If members do not wish to pay, the postage on these, but desire information from them, the Librarian will supply the information on receipt of a 6d search fee and stamped addressed envelope.
