THE CHICAGO, "I WILL" PERFINS by. Albert Spencer, Perfin Club Member #1261

Some time ago in the PERFIN BULLETIN there was a discussion about the Chicago , "I WILL" perfins (# I-116 - I-119.5).

Wanting to **know** more about it because of special musical philatelic interests, this writer queried our good librarian Floyd Walker for suggestions. He suggested writing the Chicago Chamber of Commerce. This the writer did (enclosing a SAE). The letter was turned over to the Chicago Historical Society which really extended itself in courtesy and helpfulness in providing the following information along with photostats of the sheet music of the Chicago, "I WILL" song.

Chicago's official motto is <u>Urbs in Horto</u>, meaning "City in a Garden". Many people think, however, that the city's motto is "I WILL", which has become, over the years, an unofficial motto for Chicago.

"I WILL" came about because of a contest held in 1892 by the Chicago <u>Inter-Ocean</u> newspaper. The paper offered prizes to artists submitting drawings personifying the spirit of Chicago, in honor of the World's Colombian Exposition.

Among the hundreds of drawings submitted, the judges picked that of Charles Holloway, of Chicago, for first place. His drawing showed a youthful, energestic looking woman in classical garb. She had a leather strap on her wrist, similar to those worn by athletes for muscle reinforcement, and she held a carpenter's square next to her hip. On her head was the crown of the Phoenix, the legendary bird that rose from the ashes, as Chicago did after the 1871 fire. But the most striking feature was the woman's breastplate, which bore the words"I WILL". This struck the city's fancy, and has remained Chicago's unofficial motto.

Holloway said that the idea for "I WILL" came from an old saying that popped into his head as he was creating the drawing - "When a woman says she will you may depend on it". His knowledge of literature was faulty, however, since the actual statement comes from a line in a play written by Aaron Hill, an 18th Century English author, "First a woman will or wor"tdepend on 't. If she will do it, she will, and there's an end on't.". The song was written in 1906. The cover of the sheet music is headed, "Chicago says "I WILL". It is illustrated with a drawing of a classically garbed lady, "Chicago", helping to her feet (from the ruins of a Greek styled building another female figure also in classic garb and labelled, "San Francisco". "Special Bonation to the San Francisco Sufferers' Fund" is noted on the cover, thus referring to the San Francisco earthquake in 1906.

Words of the song are by James E. Callahan. Music is by Lon Dinsmore. The verses and chorus are as follows:

> " March on Chicago - March along to everlasting fame; With energy and charity, Surround thy glorious name. March on Chicago - March along, add laurels to thy crown; Keep pressing on with loyalty- March on old Dearborn town.-

March on Chicago - March along to greatness now unknown; With enterprise and honesty, Enshrine each building stone. March on Chicago - March along, Augment thy fair renown, Expanding East, North, South and West, March on old Dearborn town.


And when in sorrow or in pain, We find our fellow man, This then Chicago's at the front, She'll do the best she can; For stricken friend or fallen foe, May then look up- not down, Humanity is broad indeed, in good old Dearborn town.


Chorus:


