I remembered that someone told me that the local copy shop had a heavy weight reproduction paper. They did. Now I have a set of excellent album pages for a 3 ring binder and a considerable project of mounting. In addition, I still have the original catalog for reference.

Since the copy was for my own personal use and I had purchased the original copy, this is a legitimate copy. Possibly this suggestion may be transferred to collectors using other catalogs published by the Club and it also might be an idea for the future to produce album pages for collectors similarly based on already available catalogs.

One caution, paper of this type is probably acidic and stamps mounted on them should probably be encased in high quality black backed mounts. Since I currently use Scott mounts for my Scandinavian collection, I continue to do so. These are a more expensive than hinges; however, by fastening only the upper part of the mount it is a simple matter to remove a stamp for study of the face or to replace it with a better copy.
