#### TREASURER'S REPORT

I am pleased to be able to report another successful year for the Society both in consolidation of our financial position and the growth of our membership.

The Statement above reflects the expected increase in receipts from current subscriptions and improvement in most other sources of our income. On the debit side we have had to meet higher costs in the form of raised postal charges and prices for materials, but despite this we have shown a satisfactory surplus and no increase in the annual subscription for 1969/70 is proposed.

Our membership at the end of the year was precisely 100, a net increase of 16, and subscribers to Mr Jennings' book numbered 43, a net increase of 2.

Although the Financial Statement is presented in the simplest form, it is in fact, compiled from my books of account which required several hundred separate entries during the year. Keeping up to date takes up a great deal of my spare time, and in order to help me in reducing the work involved, I would like to remind all members that:

- (a) Remittances, other than annual subscriptions, will not be acknowledged unless requested.
- (b) All cheques and postal orders should be made payable to the Society.
- (c) U.K. members, please pay all sums over 2/6 by cheque or postal order. I can only use up so many stamps.
- (d) All members abroad please send bank notes or INTERNATIONAL MONEY ORDERS. Please do not send cheques. I know that they give you the least trouble but they involve me in a laborious paying-in procedure, on top of which the Society has in most cases to bear the Bank's collection charges.

#### SECRETARY/EDITOR'S REPORT

Actually there is very little I can add to the above report except to concur with John Nelsons sentiments. Whilst the increase in membership is extremely pleasing the growing popularity of our Society does increse the workload on the officers, and I would like to remind members that it is a labour of love. Naturally we derive some satisfaction and pleasure out of doing the job, but since the majority are family men with children at home our spare time is limited. Please try to help to reduce the workload as suggested above.

For my part I intend to reduce both John Nelson's and my own workload during the coming year by making, an intensive effort to complete publication of Mr Jennings' book. There are 116 pages

still to go and I expect to get these out in three or four batches, not necessarily mailed with the bulletin. Since the Society is in a fairly sound financial position we propose to reduce the price of the remaining pages to 12/6d (\$1.50) for the 116. Those subscribers who are not already in credit by this amount or a smaller sum are asked to remit in one lump sum to reduce book keeping. Those in credit by more than this amount will be refunded in some way.

If anyone else is interested in obtaining this work would they please speak now? The "Contents Page" from the book will be attached to this issue so that you may see what it deals with. I do not have complete sets of back pages at the moment so a fair amount of work will be involved in completing them. Once all orders are in I will set about duplicating the required number, after which the stencils will be destroyed.

The price to new subscribers will be £2:12:6d (\$6.30).

NOTE: There will be no instalment of Mr Jenning's book going out with this issue. Hopefully, the first bigger batch will appear in about two weeks.

#### 4.9. WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The British first settled in Western Australia in 1829, and 25 years later postage stamps were issued in the Colony. Circular holes, of two sizes, are to be found on the issues of 1854-85 and stamps so punctured were for use on Official correspondence. Stamps may sometimes be found with two or even three holes of the same size, or of different sizes, but the reason for this is not known. The punch was not used after 1886. The 1d and 2d values are said to be the ones most frequently seen.

Stanley Gibbons have a note about these punctured stamps in their Part 1, and offer any in stock for the same price as stamps without the hole.

(a) Circular hole of 3mm. on early issues.

DIE 1.

(b) Circular hole of 4mm. on later issues.

In 1902 the State Government asked for stamps to be overprinted with the initials "WA" (Western Australia), for use in their departments, but the Postmaster General did not grant the request. However, in June 1903 permission was given for stamps to be perforated with the letters "WA" and arrangements were made for the perforating to be carried out in Melbourne, where the stamps of Western Australia were printed.

This die was used from 1903-05, and examples may probably be found on the stamps as listed below.

Prices are considered to be the same as for normal stamps. It is understood that members have examples of stamps with the mark # given in the above lists.

By 1905 stamps with the perforated letters "OS" were made available for use in the Commonwealth Departments. The State Departments then discontinued their use of the "WA" perfin, and had stamps perforated "OS" instead for their official use.

"OS" is sideways on "Swan" stamps.

#### 13.11 NANTWICH (UDC) CHESHIRE

The name is derived from the "NANT" (vale) of the river Weaver and from the Saxon "WICH" signifying a "salt town". Another frequent spelling encountered in the Middle Ages is NAMPTWICH.

The salt works which gave Nantwich its importance drew their supplies from local brine pits and springs. In the reign of King Henry V111 some 400 salt works existed. Salt is no longer extracted in Nantwich although the salt spring still exists apparently with its full brine strength.

Perfin NU/DC 2H 11,8/9,7 (4½)

Slopers have been supplying stamps to this Authority since the mid 1950's but the exact date of introduction is not known. It is interesting to note that one of the lower two pins forming the "U" is missing on the current Q.E.ll 4d and 5d stamps received from the Council - most unusual for Slopers.
