The Argentine Perforation CancellationsType 1

C y T (Correos y Telegrafos )  
Without addition of handstamp.

Type 2

A star without handstamp.

Type 3

A double horizontal row of perforations, gauging 10½ with or without handstamp.

Type 4

A single hole 4mm in diameter. Generally without, but occasionally with handstamp.

Type 5

INUTILIZADO (Cancelled). With or without handstamp.

Type 5a

As type 5 but with pen or pencil lines as a supplementary control.

All stamps issued for ordinary postal use between 1892 and 1930 are more or less likely to exist with one of these perforations, The "Catalogo de los Sellos Postales de la Republica Argentina" published in 1958, (from which the information comes) lists some 265 stamps which have been recorded as procanceled by perforation.

The perforating machines were in use from 1891 to 1931.

NOTES There are no lists of stamps in the article by Mr Coles.

6.2. COLOMBIA

Stanley Gibbons (Part 111) have the following note after their list of Official Stamps of Colombia,

"Although Nos. 012 and 013 usually have 'ANULADA' Punched through them before use, the above prices, both used and unused, are for unpunched stamps."

012 and 023 are the two highest values of the Officials - 012 being the 5p. grey (No.509) and 013 is the 10p. deep brow (No.510).

Although Colombia was included in Worksheet No.18 I have had very little information about this perfin, and do not know the reason why it was sometimes applied to these two values of the Official stamps.

Mr A.S.Bartleson sent me tracings of parts of two different ANULADA perfins, and these are reproduced below.

ANULS      ANUL

It will be seen that the full word is larger than a single stamp, therefore it was either made to go over a couple of stamps, or its original use may have been for some other purpose.
