ILLUSTRATED CATALOGUE

Basil Tomkins reports that the support forr this project has been very poor and that any idea of our Society producing such a catalogue will have to be dropped. The Society has insufficient funds to finance such a project on a speculative basis so we would have to rely on financial support from members. This has not been forthcoming however, there is no point in proceeding further.

Members who have already sent money to Basil will have had it returned by now with our thanks and regrets.

All is not lost, however, since two of our American members 1 & 2/72/Page 1

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are, through the auspices of the American Perfins Club, starting researching for an illustrated catalogue of G.B. We quote from the American Perfins Club bulletin,

"Dr. Harvey G. Tiles (851) and Robert McKee (900) are doing research for an illustrated catalog of British Perfins. They have already compiled data on about 7000 patterns, but they estimate that there are another 3000 patterns they have not yet catalogued. Most of these are of the pre-1915 variety; the modern material has been well covered."

This item which appeared in the October 1971 issue, went on to say that Dr. Tilles would like to hear from anyone with pre-1915 material with a view to checking this against the information alredy to hand.

In the November 1971 issue the following appeared,

"In the next issue, we hope to publish an illustrated worksheet of all the known British Perfins beginning with the letter 'I'. If the response to this plan is favorable, we will consider publishing illustrated worksheets of all the British Perfins as space is available. Members will be asked to make whatever additions to each worksheet they can."

We have not yet seen the December issue of The Perfins Club bulletin but Basil Tomkins is writing to Dr. Tilles offering to co-operate by providing material from this side of the Atlantic. It is envisaged that Basil could act as co-ordinator of any material provided by U.K. members.

We will report on this further in our next issue.

That is it for this issue. We could certainly do with some contributions from other sources in addition to those from Miss Thornton and Basil Tomkins. Before many more issues have gone by we shall have completed all available material on the Officials and that will create a vacuum.

Can anyone suggest a new project? We have one or two ideas ourselves but all entail more work than we are able to cope with alone. Can anyone help?

Mr B. Pritt has kindly written to inform me about his examples of perfins on Russian stamps, and he has also lent me copies of the Journal published by the British Society of Russian Philately which have reference to them.

In reply to a query in the "British Journal of Russian Philately" in 1954 about "Perforated Initials and Number on Romanov Stamps" there was an answer given in the Journal No. 14/15 May 1954. I am pleased to have permission to quote this as follows:

"While several members wrote stating that these are Officials, we are. indebted to Mr. Worth for the following information regarding their use."

"Tsarist Russia had no Postage Due stamps, and if a letter was underpaid the amount due, as usual double the amount of the underpayment was collected by the postman when he delivered the letter. If the addressee refused to pay, the letter was taken back by the postman to the post office. In this way there was a check on the amount collect -ed by every postman, for on coming back to the post office he had to hand over the money or the returned letter. Every day, the amounts so collected in cash by the postman of a particular post office were entered in a book and stamps to the value of the total amount were affixed in the book. These stamps were perforated with the initial of the post office and tied with a dated postmark to the page of the book. In most cases these stamps were of high denomination to make up the alrge amount collected and entered in the book. As the total amount collected in a day would probably come to an odd figure, say 26 Rub. 28 kop., the 28 kop. would have to be in small denomination stamps and the 26 Rub. made up of the highest denomination stamps to save space in the accounting book.

"Mr. Werth says he has various stamps with these perforations which are by no means uniform, either inn position or shape of the perforated letters, e.g.

- B.K. sideways (vert.) on 15 kop. Romanov 7-10-13 (B.K. = W Office)
- M.P. over V sideways (horizontal) on 2 Rub. Romanov (Moscow General Post Office)

Note "V" is the Roman five. Date not clear.

- M.P. over 1 vertical on 5 Rub. Romanov. Postmark
 Moscow 7-7-14
- M.P. over 66 horizontal on 3 Rub. Romanov. Postmark Moscow 23-9-13.

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M.P. over 19 vertical on 5 Rub. Romanox. Postmark Moscow 22-5-15

When the postmark is clear, the number of the office is repeated at the bottom of the postmark.

"While all the above are on Romanov stamps, Mr. Werth says he remembers seeing this type of perforation on the arms type stamps. He mentions that the last stamp above is in copper-red ink and must have been one of the last printings.

"In all his copies the figures "1" has a stroke to the figure, whereas in the example given in Notes and Queries the "11" is without strokes. It must be a Roman "2".

"During the Revolution these books were pilfered from the post office archives and the stamps torn out and sold to dealers, thus finding their way to collectors. The same thing happened to the Post Office Savings books in which amounts deposited were accounted for by Saving and stamps and cancelled with an ordinary postmark. When later the Saving and Control stamps were used as postage stamps, it became impossible to tell if a used stamp was from a letter or a savings book,"

"Mr. Werth thinks that as a general rule the post offices tried to use for accounting purposes stamps which were not in big demand, or which were to be taken out of circulation or which had some error. The Finnish stamp S.G.146 3½ Rub. yellow and black was withdrawn and used almost entirely (with but few exceptions) for inter-postal reckoning purposes. The Finnish authorities used a special postmark for this purpose and the stamps are easily recognisable as having been used in this way.


There was a further note in the Journal dated April 1955.

"The question on Perforated initials on Romanov stamps in Journal No 11 was answered in Journal 14/15. I have also been shown a Russian Levant stamp No-87b perforated with the letters O Π about 7 mm high, which is suggested might stand for "Orientalnya Potcha" (Mr. B. Pritt notes the name as Odessa Potohta).

Mr. B. Pritt has also sent me the following information which he received from Leningrad. His correspondant writes,
"In the Petrogad Journal "Philatelia" for the year
1917 No.3, page 26 was a small article entitled "Latest

News", and that instead of postmarking the stamps they were perforated as precancels". His correspondant knows of Russian stamps, 1909-1917 issue, used for pre-payment of money transfers and parcels.

"In his own collection, he writes, that he possesses similar Moscow perfins from 1-66 with some omissions, as well as 1 Rub. Romanov issue with "Kiev" perfin, as well as stamps-of the 1909-17 issue with Polish perfin "ZAPLACONO". He has some Sov:Let stamps with perfin, saying "paid" and "handed over" (in Russian)."



A few examples of MOSCOW. Other numbers reported by Mr. Pritt are: - 3, 6, V1, 9, 10, 14, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 35, 40, 55, 66.



Mr. Pritt's own examples are from the set S.G. 92-106 and 107-123 as well as 77 and 78. The postmarks range from 1913 to 1920.

<u>2.6. HUNGARY</u> Additional Information

Mr M. O. Welsh has combiled a most interesting-comparative list of the three-hole perfins of Hungary, (1) from his own collection, (2) from S.G. Part II (1968), and (3) from the list on pages 42-43 of the Catalogue of Official Perfins.

In his letter Mr Welsh says, "What I particularly wonder about is whether the 1919-20 issue was so perforated - four examples are listed on page 43. Gibbons does not list any in this set and I have seen none. Because of the stamps' inscription "MAGYAR POSTA" in place of "MAGYAR KIR POSTA" I rather wonder if they were removed from sale - with the change of regime - before 1921 when the perfin was introduced. This is only guesswork on my part - I have no particular knowledge of these issues. I just wonder if there is reliable evidence of their existence.
