4. Receipt of lots will be acknowledged if a stamped addressed envelope is enclosed with lots.
5. Vendors will be charged $10 \%$ commission plus the cost of sending the sale proceeds.
6. Closing date for the receipt of lots, which must be sent to Chris Carr at above address, is let July, Not more than 70 lots will be accepted for this auction so do not leave it until it is too late.

## How to Obtain the Society Perfin

Members may have their mint stamps perforated with the society perfin, for use on their correspondence or for their collection, subject to the following conditions,

1. Only mint decimal stamps will now be perforated, these should be in horizontal strips as the machine is fed from side to side. Blocks cannot be perforated.
2. A commission of 3 p per request will be charged, the proceeds going to the society funds. This commission may be paid in mint stamps.
3. Return postage will be paid by the member and his perforated stamps will be used unless otherwise requested.
4. All requests direct to Chris Carr. Overseas members are asked asked to write first stating their requirements and Chris Carr will advise them of the method of payment.
5. All perfins will be upright and will read from the face of the stamp. No errors, varieties or freaks will be produced, neither will sterling value or used stamps be perforated.

### 7.1. CANADA

Since the Official Perfins of Canada have been so well documented elsewhere, particularly the O.H.M.S, type, it is proposed to give the briefest details only in this section for the sake of completeness. Readers wishing for more specialised details should consult the two handbooks noted below.

Stamps were first perforated O.H.M.S. (Die 1) in 1923 for use by the offices of the Assistant General Receiver and was continued until 1935 when the Bank of Canada took over these offices.

Later, in 1939, The Treasury Board ordered that perfins be introduced for use by Government Departments, and the Post Office was authorised to attend to the perforating and distribution of stamps. The date set for the introduction of Official Perfins was let July 1939.

A new machine was ordered containing Die 11 and this was put into use towards the end of September,but in the mean time the Die 1 machine was borrowed and stamps perforated on it distributed as required.
