FROM THE SECRETARY

You will by now have learnt of the tragic death of Ron Bowman. As our older members know Ron was the driving force behind the Society ever since its inception as the Study Group in 1957. His loss leaves a gap which it will be very hard to fill. An appreciation by the President appears later in this bulletin. As a temporary measure I have produced this bulletin and apologise in advance for the errors and inadequate nature.

I have of course written to Mrs Bowman on behalf of all our members. I have also visited her and collected the bulk of the Society material.

Perhaps the best tribute we can make is to ensure that the Society continues to flourish. Therefore we need an Editor and obviously a permanent appointment is very desirable. It is no good pretending that this is an easy task. It involves:

- (1) a considerable correspondence
- (2) typing the majority of the material for the bulletin six times a year
- (3) running off some 200 copies of each page
- (4) collating these into bulletins
- (5) sticking adhesive labels (typed by Mrs Cox) onto envelopes
- (6) inserting bulletins into envelopes, stamping and mailing Then you can devote a little time to your own collection!

As most of you know Ron made specialist studies of Railway Perfins and Local government Perfins. Both resulted in monographs which, like all our work, were to some extent incomplete. At the time of his death Ron was engaged in revising and extending these. It would be a very great pity if this work came to a stop and we would therefore like two more members to take up this work. There is of course not the same urgency as is entailed in the editorship.

DEATHS

Apart from that of Ron, it is also our melancholy duty to record the deaths of K. Rymer Young and Dave Stump. Mr Young was also a Founder member and an ex-President. Dave was a founder member of the Perfins Club (of USA) and had held every office including twenty years as Editor of their bulletin.

RON BOWMAN

Members of the Society will have been greatly shocked and saddened to learn of the sudden and tragic death, in his late fifties, of Ron Bowman and will be united in expressing heartfelt sympathy to his widow and family.

Ron began to take an interest in perfins in 1944 and it was entirely due to his enthusiasm and organising ability that a small-band of collectors was brought together in 1957 to found the G.B. Perfin Study Group which six years later was re-formed into the present Society. He not only became the first Secretary/Treasurer of the Group but almost at once took on responsibility for the bulletin and this became one of his main preoccupations for the next twenty-five years.

Others have given valuable assistance from time to time, but none would question that it is the dedication and persistance of Ron Bowman (at times the sole writer, editor, typist, duplicator operator and post-boy) which through the _ bulletin has kept the Society together and enabled it to prosper. He once remarked that it was only by means of a ruthless policy of throwing out unessential paper that he was able to prevent it taking over his whole household.

How Ron found time to collect perfins himself is impossible to say, yet he built up a fine collection with special strength in railways and local authorities which he researched and wrote up with meticulous care. He seldom missed a gathering of the Society and on meeting him one could not fail to be impressed by his knowledge of the hobby or to recognise his exceptional qualities of modest self-assurance and dependability.

In mid 1970 Ron appealed for more members to offer their assistance in running the Society and Michael Rucklidge took over from him the post of Secretary. At the time Michael wrote "As 'older' members know, Ron has been the back-bone of the Society since its inception. It is hardly too much to say that without him the Society would not exist today and certainly not in its flourishing form". Those words remain true, and even more so, twelve years on. Perhaps it is not too much to hope that Ron's example will encourage another member of the Society to come forward and carry on the selfless work which he carried out for so many years for the benefit, enlightment and pleasure of us all.

Alan R. Miskimin has travelled widely and took his personal perforator (ARM) with him. When he used it in the various different cities and countries he lived in he indicated the place by particularly positioning the perfin with respect to the stamp. Full details of the significance of the various positions are given.

0801 Revenue perfins of Brazil

Perf. Bull., Jan. 1981, 34, (1), 5

Six different perfins are known on the revenue stamps of Brazil_although three of them are different patterns of D & C. None of the perfins has been identified although D & C. on postage stamps was used by Dannemann & Cia. And Z.B/&Co. was similarly used by Zerrehner Bulow & Cia.

0802 El Salvador's Perfined stationary stamps Roy, R.

Perf. Bull., Jan. 1981, 34, (1), 6

In 1906, El Salvador issued a set of postage stamps and Accompanying postal stationery bearing the portrait of President Escalon. Subsequently, the Post Office cut the stamps from the postal stationery, perforated them with a numeral indicating the value and sold them as stamps.

0803 _The airmail bag

Boggs, W.S.

Aero Philat. Ann., Jan. 1955, 2, (3), 88

In response to an earlier article (see 0797), it is Ponied out that the E.I.P.A. 30 perfins were punched after the sheet had been folded into a block of 4, therefore, the Perforating die must have had four dies $-2.x\ 2.$

0804 Canal Zone - uncatalogued officials Charlat, L.W.

Aero Philat. Ann., Apr. 1955, 2, (4), 102-104

In 1941 the Canal Zone issued air mail stamps overprinted OFFICIAL/PANAMA CANAL. Prior to the issuance of these stamps, the perfin P was used to denote Official usage. The perfin P_is known on six stamps of the 1931 issue and five of the 1939 issue.

0805 Who knows the answer?

Houtris, D.

S.E.P.S. Bull., Sept./Oct. 1980, (189), 1

A perfin with the initials of a firm on a cover post-marked London.

A perfin cover postmarked London, 21st. May 1935 is identified only by the initials and address of the firm:- J. M. &. S Ld, 222 Upper Thames St., London, EC4. The full name of the user is requested (see 0775) (Complete)

0806 Ipswich firm's philatelic links Burrows, M. J.

S.E.P.S. Bull., Sept./Oct. 1980, (189), 1

The firm of S. H. Cowell Ltd. was established as printers, tea, coffee and wire merchants in the early 19th century. Over the years, the company had several philatelic links ranging from printing railway stamps for the Colne Valley and Halstead Railway Company to producing 1, Jhitfield King's catalogues. The culmination of this link with philately was their printing of "The Royal Philatelic Collection" in 1952. Two perfins are thought to have been used by Cowells - S H C and then W S C after the name of the firm was changed to W. S. Cowell Ltd.

0807 France to the 1930-31 1.50 Frs. air mails Goodkind, H. M.

Aero Philat. Ann., Apr. 1955, 2, (4), 109-112 & 116 Following an earlier article (see 0797) and in the light of new information, the French E.I.P.A. 30 perfin is reassessed. It is evident that the perforating was carried out in a haphazard manner as evidenced by an illustration of a pair of stamps not perfinned themselves but attached to a sheet margin which is perfinned. The occurrence and non-listing in the catalogues of the 1F.50 red perfinned E.I.P.A. 30 is explained as being due to unauthorised use of the perforating machine.

0808 Germany - The world's first air mail stamp San. 501 Goodkind, H. M.

Aero Philat. Ann., Apr. 1956, 3, (4), 93-98

The first air mail in the worl \overline{d} is thought to have been the Bork-Bruck service of Germany. A cover dated March 3rd 1912 is shown bearing the perfin GR. The advertising enclosure shows the perfin to belong to Georg Rothgiesser who owned the airfield "Mars" at Bork.

0809 Two new perfin listings

Decarie, M.

BNA Perf., Aug. 1980, 1, (7), 1

Two new Canadian and one new Newfoundland perfin are shown. L/Co and MG are both U.S. perfins used on Canadian revenue stamps. The Newfoundland perfin RD, which is also on a revenue stamp has not been identified.

0810 Ramblings on revenues

Dicketts, M.

BNA Perf., Aug. 1980, 1, (7), 2

The majority of new Canadian items being found are on revenue stamps. One of the reasons for this is that a great many U.S. companies kept stocks of Canadian revenue stamps in order to facilitate their cross-border trade and these were routinely perforated along with their U.S. stamps.

0811 Perfin positions: a new approach Tomasson, G. D. & Johnson, J.C. BNA Perf., Aug. 1980, 1, (7), 3-4

The geometrical relationship between a perfin and the stamp on which it is found is termed the position. In Canada in particular, this aspect of perfins has been studied in detail and codes have been evolved for identifying perfin positions based on eight perfin/stamp relationships. A new method is mooted in which the perfin is held in the correct position and the letters A - H ,identify the position of the stamps as if it rotated around a clock face. The advantages claimed for the new concept is that it is more systematic and should not require constant reference to a table for its use, as does the existing system. Also, it offers the possibility of extending the detail of listing perfins perforated at an angle to the eight basic positions.

The Baanc, of Trade perfin has been extensively forged. However, many of the forgeries are easily discovered if the full details of the date of use and circumstances of use are known, After covering this basic. information a full list of all known genuine perfins is given.

0814 The Board of Trade perforated official stamps of Great Britain: The forgeries Jackson, H.T.

G.B. Perfin Study Group, n.d. (1962), pp.6 A detailed account is given of each of the 9 known types of forgery of the board of Trade perfin - crown/BT.

0815 Coil stamps with perfins Lebland, G.

Bull. Liaison, Nov. 1978, (10), 3-4

Translation: S.E.P.S. TRANS 35, pp.4

There are two basic types of perfin found on coil stamps first is small, always in the same position on the stamp and reading from the face. These were perfinned by stamp affixing machines. The second type is the normal perfin, usually found on sheet' stamps.

The Sauven Perforating Machine Company started business in 1919 and produced both hand and treadle operated machines. Both types of machine are shown together With two typical Sauvan dies.

There are eleven additions to Ostergaard Hansen's catalogue of Danish perfins plus one correction and one confirmation.

0818 Postage due stamps

From 1921-1962, Denmark used special stamps to denote postage due. Since 1962, ordinary postage stamps have been used, cancelled with the words "postage due" in Danish. "Faelles f oreninger for Danmarks Brugs f oreninger" of Albertslund deposited its own perfinned stamps with its local post office for this purpose.

0819 Postal ferry stamps

Engelbrecht, P.

Perfinist, Dec. 1980, (4), 7

Only two perfins have been found used in conjunction with the Esbjerg - fano ferry service. The Landmansbank perfin was found on labels attached to post parcels and the Esbjerg Andels - Slagteri used perfinned postage stamps on its consignment notes, one of which is shown.

0820 Railway parcel stamps

Engelbrecht, F.

Perfinist, Dec. 1980, (4), 8

A list of perfins found on Danish Railway parcel stamps is given although the perfins are listed only by their Ostergaard Hansen catalogue number.

0821 Stamp Duty stamps

Engelbrecht, P.

Perfinist, Dec. 1980, (4), 9-10

Seven perfins are listed which have been found on Danish Stamp Duty revenues. One perfin has only been found on revenues and not on postage stamps whilst another is also known on Swedish revenues. A revenue document is illustrated which has been cancelled by perforation. Stamps bearing parts of this cancellation could be mistaken for perfins.

0822 Checklist of stamps punched by companies in the province of Quebec

Dalpe, J. G.

Jean - Guy Dalpe, Boucherville, Canada, pp.44

Every perfin which was used in Quebec is listed together with the Canada Specialised catalogue number of the stamps on which each perfin has been found. A rarity factor is also given for each perfin.

0823 Hospital perfins

S.E.P.S., 1968-1969, pp.12

Following brief details of the British hospital administrative system, an alphabetical list of all perfins known to have been used by hospitals is given. A few notes are included about the stamps found bearing each perfin together with occasional details about the user.

0824 S11a positively confirmed

BNA Perf., Sept. 1980, 1, (8), 1

The perforator which produced the second die (S11a) of the SUN/LIFE perfin of Canada has been located. It is a Cummins Model 52 with five heads. A proof perforation from this machine is shown.

0825 Another new perfin

Walburn, H. G.

BNA Perf., Sept. 1980, 1, (8), 1

The U.S. perfin LM/CO (L119) of the Lozier Motor Company has been found on a Canadian stamp. Both U.S. and Canadian stamps are shown.

0826 The S2a perforator story

BNA Perf., Sept. 1980, 1, (8), 2

The perforator that produced the S perfin (S2a) of the Swift Company has been located. It is owned by a collector of prairie Canadiana. The perforator is a Cummins Model 52 - 5 head machine and was purchased for use in Swift's Moose Jaw Office.

The perf in EC/&E has now been credited to Evans, Coleman & Evans Limited following the discovery of two covers, which are shown.

0829 More about Sloper and stamp security

A detailed account of the history of perfins. Joseph Sloper's efforts to obtain Post Uffice authority for companies to utilize his method of protectinE their stamps are outlined with the help of official documents of the period. During the early years, full name perfins were permitted by the Post Office, in error, and although they had prohibited the use of full names by 1874, their use still continues. Sloper's patent expired in '1872 and competitors began to appear, amongst whom was Francis A. Hancock, later one of Sloper's main rivals. Hancock was also a Letter Receiver for the Post Office and as such, received commission on all stamps he sold. This enabled him to sell perfinned stamps at face value and still effect a profit. Sloper's only remedy was to become himself a Post Office employee. Brief details of Sloper's other rivals are included.

0830 Perfins of railroads and railroad non-operatives, joint associations, bureaus and agencies Ayers, wv, G .

An alphabetical list of all U.S. perfins related to both American and Canadian railways is given together with illustrations of each perfin.

There are about 3,000 French perfins and a collection of every different stamp bearing every perfin is estimated to number about 30,000. To reduce the task, certain collectors specialise in a particular issue - for example the 25c sower, on which there are about 1000 perfins known, on a particular company - especially "Credit Lyonnaise" or "Comptoir National d'Escompte".
