#### TREASURER'S REPORT

As the accounts show we have had another successful year. Some items may require a little explanation.

- Auction \_ on receipts of £5500 the 15% commission £825. This will realise be reduced by the auctioneer's expenses. It is shown as more than this because the end of the financial year does not coincide with the completion an auction, and this year payments for auction 4 had not then been completed. This of course corrects itself next year.
- <u>Publications</u> continue to show a useful income by the run-down of stocks. We shall have to re-order some items so next year there may be a loss.
- Catalogue although there is an apparent loss on the Edwards Catalogue this is much less than the stock held, amounting to some 35, of which 25 are due to be despatched to the Perfins Club.
- Officer's Expenses include postage and purchase of various items of stationery (membership cards, notepaper, publicity material etc.)
- <u>Copier</u> a new copier has been obtained. The old one was worn out it had much more than paid for itself.

through my recently been going Perfin and remembered that I had two examples of overprinted G.B. stamps I know from articles published in which are also Perfins. Collecting' by Ian McQueen that examples of Levant have been found treated in this way and I know that B.O.F.I.C's were perforated for Telegraphic purposes. I have seen however no references The Overprinter or elsewhere, to the stamps of other territories being treated in this way. My two examples are both Morocco Agencies.

- a) S.G.58b perforated with B E M reading from left to right across the upper part of the stamp.
- b) S.G.160 perforated with B E M vertically reading from top to bottom.

In each case the Perfins are identical block capitals and the group measure 15.5mm long by 6.5mm high. I do not know what the letters stand for; would British Embassy Morocco be too obvious? Perhaps other readers will have other examples and ideas.

A second cover dated 1944, with the die 204.2, has the address 43 Weymouth Street, London W.1. Again with 'Established 1809'. Both covers name the firm.


Now a third cover has come my way with die 204.3. Dated 1915, it is a trade card and the name and address are 'MACHINERY, Machinery Publishing Co. Ltd., 27 Chancery Lane, Lon. W.C.' The message is to change the address number from 27 to 51/52.

A receipted bill from William Dawson & Sons Ltd., (with a 1d. E7 overprinted with the firm's name) which I also have in my collection, gives a little more information. Dated Feb. 1903, the address is 121, Cannon Street, Lon. E.C. Again 'Established 1809'. It goes on to state:-

"London & Country Advertising and Newspaper Offices. Branches at Cardiff, Exeter, Leicester and Plymouth. Head Office - Bream's Build's, London E.C., West End Branch 23, Northumberland Avenue, W.C. Advertisements inserted in all the Newspapers, Periodicals and other Publications of the United Kingdom and the Colonies."

I have loose perfins ranging from 1d. lilacs to G6 light colours of the 204.3 die. It appears to have been in use for a very, very long time.



# BALLYMACLINTON VILLAGE, CRYSTAL PALACE, FRANCO-BRITISH <u>EXHIBITION 1908-09.</u>

To all members who attended the spring meeting at Baden Powell House last year (1988) I apologise. You heard most of this story, and saw the items mentioned, but there are one or two new coincidences which have occurred since.

About 4 years ago I was looking through Advertising Cards at a Post Card Fair. Even without perfins on, these cards can be of interest to our hobby so I do glance at the names on the cards. At one stand I came across an Advertising Picture Postcard of "Ballymaclinton at the Crystal Palace - erected by the makers of McClinton's Soap". The printed message was from McClinton's Ltd., Donaghmore, Tyrone. It had a perfin on which did not match at all (D.B/&S). The postmark was also suspect, being Birmingham 1913 not from the Franco-British Exhibition.

As with all 'illegally used' perfins, I put it back in the box. An hour later I saw a mint postcard advertising "Colleen Soap" and the name and address were David Brown & Son, Ltd, and McClinton's Limited, Soap and Candle Manufacturers, Donaghmore, Tyrone.

Somewhere in my sub-conscious a bell rang. It took me 5 minutes of hard thought to remember what the connection was there had been 100's of cards through my hands in the meantime. The next problem was to find the dealer with the D.B/&S card and hope it had not been sold. Suffice it to say - I found it and bought it, together with the mint card which tied the perfin to the firm of David Brown & Son.

The story does not end here. The perfin was a new die, so a identity, and after it was published in the Bulletin in 1985 I a letter from a Mr. George E. R. Ithell. Mr. Ithell wanted to know how I knew the identity of the perfin, as Nora Wright had listed it in her Catalogue of Irish Perfins but did not know the identity of the user. This led to a most interesting correspondence and my purchase of the afore mentioned book.

Since then I have bought a few more Ballymaclinton Picture Post Cards from the 1908-09 Exhibition, but I have yet to come across another Perfin cover.


