BOOKS FOR SALE

Dave Hill says these were noted for sale in the Guildhall Library.

1. Reprint of Dickens Dictionary of London 1888, price £10-99p. This is not a business directory but has lots of information on charities, hospitals etc. Reprinted by Old House Books, Moretonhampstead, Devon.

2. 1846 Kellys London Post Office Directory; 792 pages; £17-75p; plus postage £3-50 UK. Reprinted by Michael Winton, Eagle Cottage, 33A Newmarket Road, Norwich NR2 2HN.

Michael Winton has reprinted a number of early Pigot County Directories (mentioned in an earlier Bulletin). This directory is from before the advent of perfins but could prove useful for those long established businesses.

SLOPER PERFINS GOING BEGGING

DAVE HILL has found a quantity of Slopers perfin JS/&C° (6970.08) on the £1 machin. They obviously were used to send parcels of perfinned stamps to Slopers clients. Dave can't think how to dispose of these; there is too much duplication to put in the auction or packet. If any member wants one, send a S.A.E. to him. If he runs out he also has blocks of 75p and 50p.

Dave adds that one thing the JS/&Co accumulation shows is that Slopers did not use a multiple die but used a single head die. This enabled them to use the same die for the large and small format stamps. Many of the large users of perfins such as the PRU and Barclays Bank had multiple dies for definitive size stamps and single dies for commemoratives and high values.

Dave also has many NH/HD perfins on 1979 covers addressed to Basingstoke District Hospital. Again, send a S.A.E. if you would like one of these.

"LT" - LONDON TRANSPORT - PERFIN

All are from 1969-72 with logo of London Transport on the back of the envelope but no other identity.

STORING AND DISPLAYING PERFINS

The following two articles on this subject reflect two distinct aspects of this problem. The first article, written by Alastair Walter, shows how someone stores their perfins to their personal satisfaction: the second, by John Marriner, shows how perfins can be mounted for display to a club, society or into a competition.

Following John's own thoughts on the subject, I (Ed.) have tried to give an accurate break-down of his competition entry which was the winner at the May meeting in London.

From Alastair Walter

"My method of display differs from those mentioned in previous Bulletins in that mine does not rely on sticking stamps, illustrations etc to pages with mounts. Instead, I use Hagner type black pages in 4-ring Ring Binders (ordinary black binders can be bought for £1-£2 each).


"If I only have one example of a perfin, I put it in the strip face down, to show the perfin. If I have any other stamps of the same die, they go to the right of that, face up. On the face down stamps I write the catalogue number (taken from Edwards or New Illustrated) in minute figures in pencil.

"Depending on the number of stamps (i.e. different stamps/reigns) I have with a particular die, one die takes up anything from part of a row to 3 pages (Barclays Bank: PAC!). I tend to fill rows with seven or eight stamps rather than leave one row per die. With 6, 7 or 8 strips to a page I can fit around 50 stamps to a page.

"I don't "write up" my perfins at all, and I only collect loose stamps (not covers usually) and put stamps face down to show the die rather than using any illustrations. So, together with the Hagner system, this allows me to move the stamps at will.

"Each page (cost-about 25p) can be used over and over again. With the way I add perfins "en masse", hinges and mounts would drive me mad; I'd be writing up the collection over and over again every couple of months.

"The following two pages, if put together, show one of my Hagner sheets."

"Knowledge and experienced gained by belonging to other local clubs and societies is used in displaying my material. I know that black is the "norm" for backing covers etc., but I am a firm believer in using other colours. The text is backed by yellow and the material by blue for my "perfins" collection. My handwriting is akin to a drunken spider dipped in ink, so I am fortunate enough to use a word processor for text, then transpose it onto colour before affixing it to the page.

"Within the display itself, I tried to illustrate the subject of "perfins" to the layman, whilst combining my own pleasure of displaying and expounding on the material. The material is presented on album pages, covered by exhibition protectors and backed by stiff card to enable the sheets to be "firm" on display boards.

"The general rule of minimum text and let the exhibit do the talking is what I tried to achieve. I illustrated pages from the identification catalogues, and did a breakdown of one perfin to show "how it's done". I tried to display covers and stamps (including overprints) in roughly equal proportions.

"I often fail to show the in depth knowledge of catalogue numbers, dies etc., because of experiences in the past: I have had to sit through a display when the speaker has spent too long describing the almost imperceptible differences between 'Die I's and Die II's', which does nothing to add to the enjoyment for the layman. I believe that philately, whatever the branch, should be enjoyable and give pleasure to the one displaying, yet stimulate the interest of the audience.

"Incidentally, I myself think that black faced page stock books are perfect for holding one's perfin material."





Example of stamp perfinned J T & S Ld






Part page from ident. catalogue



SEEN IN AUCTION

HARRY SKINNER spotted this one and there is mention of the lot in The Perfins Bulletin, May 1995 issue.

STAMP EXPORTER AUCTIONS (a division of Sandafayre). Sale No.76 - closing date - 28th June 1995.

Lot No.4034 - PERFINS UNITED STATES (65,000) probably the world's greatest study, housed in 3 large cartons, neatly mounted on pages in 13 fat binders. All different, and identified by company name or Government agency, such as Bank, Insurance Co., Fruit Growers, Railway, Water & Power, Health, Telephone, Board of Education, Advertising etc. Arranged alphabetically and in Scott number order. Mainly from the 1920/40 PRESIDENTIAL definitives to the 1960's commemoratives, Airs, Special Delivery and other special purpose stamps. This collection represents a true labour of love and an unbelievable undertaking that has taken a lifetime to assemble. Estimate:- £10,000.

(Ed:- if anyone hears of the selling price, please let me know as I am sure the outcome will be of interest to some of our members).

MEMBERS' COMMENTS ON PREVIOUS ARTICLES

PERFIN "W.DAY" Bulletin 276 Page 22-24.

A copy of this perfin is in Paul Redmond's material which HARRY SKINNER is putting through the auction. Watch for the lot coming up. The perfin is on QV 3d Jubilee C.D.S. pink ST.NICHOLAS IPSWICH date unreadable. The catalogue editor has now seen it and it will be illustrated in the New Illustrated Catalogue.

PERFIN "RNB/WB(WD)" Bulletin 273 Pg.10; 276 Pg.8.

STEPHEN STEERE says this is another Sloper die awaiting proof. The latest Sloper record book and the Red Account book show the identity changed from RADNORSHIRE & NORTH BRECONSHIRE WATER BOARD to the new die RNB/WD and the identity of WELSH NATIONAL WATER DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY, RADNORSHIRE & NORTH BRECONSHIRE WATER DIVISION, "ARDWYN", PARK TERRACE, LLANDRINDOD WELLS, RADS.

ALASTAIR WALTER has the RNB/WD on a 4½p machin, dated 2-4-75. Alastair thinks this is earlier than the period of use of 6½p and 8½p stamps previously recorded. It would appear that this RNB/WD is a deliberate modification of the earlier RNB/WB die.

PERFIN "ARMS TYPE" Des.0160.01 Bulletin 274/20; 275/6; 276/6 & 11.

MORA WRIGHT, who was the first person to query this in Bulletin 252 Pg.4, has written to agree with John Nelson's assumption of Identity - Francis Falkner.

She has the full design in the shield (0160.01) used as a paid stamp and confirms the Christian name 'FRANCIS' but cannot make out the surname of the signature. She has this design on 1d lilac and QV Jubilee issues - all with Dublin postmarks; the large crossed flags (F's) (1405.01m) without shield on KE7 stamps, again with Dublin postmarks.

She also has copies of the die "Des 3" in the Irish Catalogue (see Bulletin 275/7) on G.B. KGV McKennals, G.B. Overprints and also on the Irish 2d Map stamp. These too have Dublin postmarks.

CONSTANTINE & PICKERING STEAMSHIP COMPANY of MIDDLESBROUGH



I have been trying to compile a list of North East perfin users, and I recently obtained a second copy of a perfin which enabled me to make out the postmark, which was Middlesbrough! A visit to the Public Library gave me a positive identity for C6170 (CSP/SSCS), the Constantine and Pickering Steamship Company of Middlesbrough. My copies are C6170 but I suspect the identity will also be correct for C6175 (C&P/SISC°) though I have no copies to check the postmark. If copies exist with legible postmarks, please report. The following is a brief history of the company.

In 1885 Joseph Constantine and Warley Pickering Junior, trading as "Messrs Constantine and Pickering", bought their first ship. By 1896 their fleet had expanded to two barques and six steamships, all of which were registered in Norway.


In 1897 the decision was made to build up a fleet under the British flag, and the name of the firm was changed to "Constantine and Pickering Steamship Company" while the ship-chandlery business continued to trade as "Constantine, Pickering and Company". A second company, the "Meteor Steamship Company limited" was formed in 1907 to own coasting and short-sea ships.

The company was also reorganised in 1918 because Mr. Warley Pickering retired and in 1920 the "Joseph Constantine Steamship Line Limited" was registered. The fleet declined to two ships by 1922, the emphasis over this period having been on brokerage and agency work with the formation of "Joseph Constantine and Sons (London) Limited" in 1921, but steps were taken to rebuild the fleet to its former strength. However, after the retirement of



Mr. R.A. Constantine in 1963, it was decided to wind up the company, and in 1966 it was replaced by a new parent company "Constantine Holdings Limited". The ships were sold by 1968 and the freight forwarding, packing and shipping services were expanded.

Sounds a bit like a police enquiry, but a number of leads are being followed as a result of the first 'Six of the Best' which appeared in Bulletin 275. However, nothing definite has been unearthed that I can report back but thanks to those who responded to the challenge. This time all six are new dies, half of which are 'Full Names' which might point to their user, and a fourth involves a shield, presumably a company logo.



As before, I would be pleased to hear from anyone who can shed any light on any of these, or possibly come up with alternative suggestions for the unusual 'P' and reversed 'J'.

TELEGRAPH, TELEPHONE AND CABLE COMPANY PERFINS - PART TWO By MR.W.T.GLOVER



W. T. Henley began making scientific instruments and in so doing met Charles Wheatstone who was developing his electric telegraph. Henley made most of the early instruments. From this he went on to manufacturing and laying submarine telegraph cables both for his own firm and as sub contractor to the Telegraph Construction and Maintenance Company.

After getting into difficulties Henley's firm was reorganised as W.T. Henley's Telegraph Works Company in 1880. The factory was at North Woolwich. The head office being at 51-53 Hatton Garden, London E.C.1.

Just after W.W.2 it was taken over by AEI but retained its identity until 1960 when it was absorbed into AEI, the factory at North Woolwich being closed.



On 2 May 1883 the Western Electric Company, the manufacturing arm of American Telephone & Telegraph, (AT&T), opened an office at 59 Moorgate, London E.C.2, to sell Bell telephones and equipment manufactured in the USA and Belgium.

In 1898 WE bought cable manufacturer Fowler-Waring Cables Company based at North Woolwich. The factory was sold in a reorganisation programme in the early 1970's.

In 1925 WE sold its overseas offices and works to International Telephone and Telegraph and this company changed the name or the UK firm to Standard Telephone and Cables Limited.

The head office moved to Connaught House, Aldwych, London WC2 in November 1922. The next move took place in 1965 when head office moved to 190 The Strand, London WC2. Sometime post 1983 head office moved to Christchurch Way, Greenwich, London SE10.





Leased its first trans Atlantic cable from American Telephone and Telegraph in 1881. Had a second cable laid in the following year. Leased cables from Anglo American and in effect the two companies operated as one.

Also leased cables from the Direct United States Telegraph Company until these were taken over by the GPO in 1920. In the early 1940's Western Union were forced to sell their overseas interests by the US Government. Unable to find a buyer they finally formed a separate and totally independent company. Western Union International Inc in 1963.

I have an envelope of WU with a meter slogan dated 9 May 1930 London EC2 (this I would take to be their head telegraph office) and another stamped with a 1951 KGVI 2½d unperfinned with postmark GLASGOW 31-5-51. They undoubtedly had a good number of offices both in London and the provinces; much like Cable and Wireless.
