NOTES FROM THE CATALOGUE EDITOR ROY GAULT.

The "I" pages of the New Illustrated Catalogue are now with the printer. John has ascertained that the price for the "I" pages of Illustrations with Details will be £3-50p U.K., £4-50p Europe and £6-50p Elsewhere. The price for 'elsewhere' has had to be increased because John has been making a considerable loss on the postage. Orders to John for the Catalogue, not Roy.

The letter "K" worksheets have been started and if anyone has any more new letter "K" material - dies or identities - please report to me.

The letter "J" will be the next to be put under the microscope so be looking out your new dies now please and send them in as soon as possible.

A great deal more information about perfins on the Irish 1922 overprint stamps has been sent in by Nora Wright, so there will be a slight delay in producing the final result of the survey. The results may well take the form of a booklet, probably along the lines of John Nelson's Wembley perfins.

THE NEW ILLUSTRATED CATALOGUE By DAVE HILL.

With the completion of the letter "I" in the New Illustrated Catalogue, I thought it might be useful to review the catalogue for those members who are not taking it.

In the Illustration with Details version there are usually 12 perfins to the page - as usual on one side of good quality paper so stamps can be mounted directly onto the page as a printed album if so desired. (See illustrated page) Sometimes the number of dies shown is less than 12 when there are many users for one perfin or when Roy has included a trade mark or logo of the user. There is a space against each perfin for period and dates of use; stamp issues and values upon which it is known; identity if known; postmarks seen. So, even if the identity is not known, there can still be plenty of information about a perfin. There is room also for notes – i.e. "stamps from sideways delivery coil", "evidence for single head die" or "thought to be a partial of". You can add information from the Bulletin or your own research.

It is worth noting that the perfins are shown as far as possible as they appear on the stamps. It is useful to know that a perfin usually appears sideways etc. With the latest research it is possible to indicate multiple headed dies so these are not catalogued as separate dies.

The notes include historical facts for important dies and even "potted histories" for some. Where the letters of the perfin do not match the user an explanation is given if it is known and even where research is not complete, its progress is given. An example which caught my eye was the die "SPG" of which many different dies are known. Although a wide variety of individual letter sizes and styles are known it has been found that they often appear in different combinations. A possible explanation is given, that they were formed by individual letter perfins "clamped" together as a printer clamped type together. (See illustration)

Each letter section ends with one of Roy's computer summaries of number of dies in use; life of dies; an analysis of most prolific issues and values; lists of perfins known on coil stamps; Regionals; Irish Issues; Line Engraved stamps. Finally there is a squared sheet ready for new dies. Of course, with so much detail, new information is being found which supersedes that


given but it is far better than the "Old" Illustrated, with just 49 illustrations of the perfin die given on each page. It was necessary to scribble any notes of usage or postmark within the perfin illustration and one never knew the results of others' research. For example:- you will find an unidentified perfin on piece with part of the name of the user; the New Illustrated should tell you the postmarks known and a search through a directory of that town should enable you to complete the name of the user and positively identify it.

Letters so far available are "I, O, Q, S, U, V, X, Y, Z, Designs and Numerals". The cost to members so far, for all these letters is:- £24-00p U.K.; £28-50p Europe; £36 Elsewhere.


The "Illustrations Only" version has just 36 illustrations to the page and for the largest section completed to date - the letter "S" - it is 48 pages long. The total cost for all letters published so far in this version is £13-50p U.K.; £17-50p Europe; £22 Elsewhere.

It is hoped to complete the catalogue by the year 2000. With 21,500 known GB perfin dies I leave it to members to compute eventual size and cost allowing for inflation. The letters so far issued, which apart from the "S" are some of the smallest sections, already fill one lever arch file. Obviously the eventual total cost will be high and I would urge members to buy the catalogue a letter at a time as they are published.

Of course, not all members collect perfins at this level, and many keen collectors still use old catalogues and even old catalogue numbering. Each to their own!




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


PERFINS - PARTIALS - OR JUST PLAIN RUBBISH?




This problem of stamps with incomplete perfin dies has troubled me for many years. Are they of any use? Should they be tucked away in a corner in case they can be deciphered? Should they be passed on? Should they be thrown away?




My personal opinion has always leaned towards the view that the majority should be totally destroyed. This opinion was cemented when a dealer offered me a huge bag of perfins at 20p each, the majority of which were, to my mind, rubbish. When I pointed out the very poor quality of these 'perfins' and that 20p was way over the top for such cut and torn stamps with partial and blind-pin perfins, I heard a rather disquieting statement.


I was told that he had a collector in the States who paid him 20p for all he could send, whatever the quality. I sincerely hope that person is not one of our members as he is getting a very raw deal and making it difficult to wean dealers away from the idea that any perfin means 'big bucks'.




How many hands had sorted those perfins before they were accumulated in that bag? Five? Ten? The first in line takes the best or those dies which are new to them, discarding the rest as duplicates. They are then passed to a friend or sent to the auction. As each succeeding collector goes through them, the uncommon and decent perfins get fewer and fewer. What then of the dross? Do collectors con dealers into thinking that they are "perfins"? Most dealers have only to see holes in the stamps to think of 10 to 20p each. It might be good business for the collector to 'get his own back' on a dealer but I ask you to remember that the rubbish is then sold back into the chain where it does not metamophose into decent perfins - it is still rubbish.



I know that there is the odd partial which can be deciphered: QV stamps which need to be looked at very carefully and checked against the Illustrated Catalogue: examples of progressive pin loss in certain dies: these can be spotted by the more experienced collectors. However, I am making a plea for the real rubbish to be destroyed and not to be passed on until it gets gathered together in a huge bag similar to the one I saw last month. The majority of these were dies with so many missing pins, blind pins, torn or cut stamps and double strikes, that it was impossible to tell the original letter configuration. The dealer was not very pleased when I suggested that the whole bag should be burned to prevent them getting back into circulation



The stamps illustrated through this article are some of the "best rubbish" I have not yet destroyed. (I say 'destroyed' quite deliberately as opposed to 'thrown away'.) One or two you can guess the die but are they worth saving in that condition?



I would like to hear your views on this subject, especially if you think these stamps should not be destroyed and the reasons for your opinion. If you have had any experiences of poor perfins being offered to you, let the rest of the members know about it by writing to the Bulletin Editor.

BILL COKAYNE (Sloper ex-director) supplies the information:-

"To quote the late technical director of Slopers (Mr Alfred Slater) there was originally a tower at the Western end of the building in Blackburn Road, the base structure of which was still in place when the company closed at August '91. The 'Royal' part of the title was assumed from the Royal Letters Patent and Warrant from Queen Victoria. These documents were seen by various visiting members of the Perfin Society just prior to the closure of the works."

JOHN NELSON found the name WILLIAM DUFF & CO., 113 Cannon St. London E.C. as Merchants and Bankers.

JOHN MATHEWS adds the following, taken from a 1914 Kelly's London Directory:- "DUFF, William & Co., were merchants & bankers, whose office was next door to "The British Trade Review" in the London Joint Stock Bank Ltd Building at 113 Cannon St., London E.C. (corner of St. Swithin's Lane).





Illustrations for The High Commissioner for New Zealand perfins




MORE FROM THE SLOPER LEDGERS From Stephen Steere.

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GREGORY, ROWCLIFFE & CO. By DAVE HILL.

With a few notes from Rosemary Smith.

Gregory, Rowcliffe & Co., solicitors, were founded over 200 years ago and have had an office at No.l Bedford Row, London W.C.1 for much of that time. This is near London's "stampland" which could account for the fact that covers with their perfins are so frequently seen.

When I wrote to them they sent me a book giving their history but could tell me nothing about their perfins. The book lists the company's names over the years but this does not tie up with known usage of the various perfins.


As most of these covers are common there must be many more earlier and later dates. Please report new ones to Rosemary.

There may be a number of reasons why these names, dates and perfins do not match. One may be that the different partners may have used their own perfins (Gregory-G&C, Rowcliffe-R&C°). Also the firm's name did not appear on the letter headings until 1914, just the address, although the telegraphic address "Rowcliffes" did appear from about 1890. The identities in some cases may have been taken from a partner's manuscript signature on the letter.

Rosemary has two envelopes with initials of firm and address embossed on the flap. The first envelope has a 1d lilac, perfin G1005.01, dated 7-6-87 and the embossed initials GR&R. The second envelope has a 1d EVII stamp, perfin R1060.01, dated 21-7-08 and embossed initials RJ&Co. These initials do match the known name of the firm at that date. So keep a look out for these different initials on the flap of Rowcliffe covers.

It would appear that in the early days Rowcliffes were Somerset solicitors and Gregorys acted as their London agents as county solicitors were not allowed to practice in London. I do not know whether any of the Rowcliffe perfins are known used from Somerset. It also seems that the London office was in two almost separate parts so two machines may have been used in different parts of the office.

It is a pity that despite the very helpful attitude of the firm when I wrote, the information was not more conclusive.





HORNSBY & SONS From Dave Hill.

I summarised in Bulletin 262 some records from Post Office Archives relating to perfins. One of these related to the Postmaster at Grantham perforating stamps for Hornsby & Sons in 1908. With the records was an impression of a 12 head die "RH/&S". When I came to check it I found that the die was not in the Illustrated Catalogue and that was where I left the matter at the time.


We have an impression of the die, an identity and a statement that the die was used but the die is unknown. Therefore, I have concluded that examples of this perfin are lurking in someone's collection and it has been confused with one of the known dies. Whilst looking for the new dies from the Sloper Ledgers for Stephen (see elsewhere in the Bulletin) please check your RH/&S perfins against the Illustration below and let me know if any fit.

The photocopy from the Archives is on yellow paper and does not reproduce very well. These five of the 12 head die are the clearest ones.




JOHN FOWLER & CO., LEEDS From Mike Oxley.

This photocopy is of an item which I have acquired. The envelope does not have a perfin but the name of the firm is perforated through the flap



Looking in my Tomkins I see that John Fowler & Co., Leeds is identified as using two perfins:- J2770.02 - JF/&Co - (which appears to have been used by their London office) and J2790.01 - J.F/&Co.. I wonder if we will ever see the perfin used on one of these perforated envelopes? A nice item to look for.




MULTIPLE DIES By DAVE HILL.

Research into multiple dies is another way of reducing the number of dies the user of which has not been identified. Providing the user of one of the dies and the make-up of the multidie is known, then it follows that the other dies can be ascribed to this same user.

This is not only achieved by seeing the multidie on a block of definitive stamps but also by noting overlapping impressions on commemorative stamps. Illustrated are stamps from what, at first sight, may seem to be an uninteresting duplication of the same die but closer examination reveals they fit together to give an impression of a 2x2 multidie. So look again at those apparently uninteresting duplications!

Example of overlapping dies on commemorative stamps.








"UG/L" and "JG" PROVISIONAL PERFINS By DAVE HILL.



I acquired a copy of the United Grand Lodge provisional perfin UG/L (U0870.01p) and noted from Roy's Provisionals Catalogue that the position of the "L" varies, as you would expect in a provisional, but the "U" & "G" are always the same distance apart. So it would seem that Sloper made a die "UG" in this period but examination of Roy's Catalogue of Provisional Dies reveals no intended user for a "UG" perfin, so why not make it "UG/L"?




However, I note that the provisional "JG" (J3010.05p) has exactly the same spacing and presume that the "UG" die was for the "UG/L" provisional and with some pins removed it made the "JG" provisional.

I would be pleased to have any comments on this theory. I have asked some collectors of Masonic Philately for details of any covers they have - the "UG" perfin may yet appear used by the United Grand Lodge.
