While some of the patterns, like F124 and F126 are similar, there are significant differences between each pattern in this set. For example, F124 has five holes in the diagonal of the letter "N" and F126 has six holes in this part of the letter.

Of interest is the fact that nine of the users have been identified as First National Bank, two are listed as Franklin National Bank and one was the Fourth National Bank.
