The US Catalog lists the user of perfin design K71 as "Kilbourne & Jacobs." Those initials are a perfect match for the design K&J. The embossed envelope,

shown in reduced size on the top of page 77, also bears a 3¢ purple Thomas Jefferson stamp punched with the K&J of perfin pattern K71. There are several possibilities here. They are:

- The current entry in the catalog is incorrect.
- 2 The catalog entry is based on a former version of the company which later joined with the Case Crane Company
- 3 Kilbourne & Jacobs was a spin off from The Case Crane and Kilbourne Jacobs Company.
