

Great British Postage Stamps known with Perfins


During April **Roy Gault** has updated virtually all the files that he has posted on the Society website that form "Great British Stamps Known with Perfins". The magnum opus now has nearly 500 pages and is proving to be a powerful reference source.

Catalogue Editor's Report- May 2016.

- The 2nd Edition of Section 'J' (Details and Silhouettes) was completed at the end of March 2016 the oldest section of the 'New Illustrated Catalogue of G.B. Perfins' first published way back in July 1996. Originally there were 1,644 DD, but this has now risen to 1,820 DD and 17,753 DDF correct to 31/03/2016.
- The 31st March 2016 has also been taken as the cut-off date for the issue of a set of Updates showing all New Dies and Deletions, available in both 'Detail' format as well as 'Silhouettes only'. All future new dies and deletions will appear in the Bulletin

regardless as to whether the die has an identified user or not. Since publication of each individual section of the catalogue there has been a net gain of 516 Perfin dies (584 New Dies less 68 Deletions).

To complete the publications marathon a complete set of 'Decimal Machins' sheets for *all sections* has been produced for insertion in the back of the 'New Illustrated Catalogue' Details catalogue. These are in the same format as those published over the last few years for letters 'W', 'S ', 'B ', 'C' and now 'J'.

Finally, as a thank-you to collectors who have purchased the 'NIC' over the years, and so contributed to the financial stability of the Perfin Society, these "Update sheets" and "Decimal Machins" sheets are to be made available free of charge, with just the postage and packaging to be paid for. In due course they will also be posted on the Perfin Society website as downloads.

Bury St Edmonds Stamp Fair

The Bury St Edmonds Stamp Fair took place in April 23rd and **Richard Husband** manned a table on behalf of the Society. Although the table was not in an ideal location it was well worth the effort to spread the word. In addition Richard has been invited by the Bury St Edmond Philatelic Society to give a full evening display in autumn.

<u>Albert Hildesheimer (1844 – 1924) – Bulletin 401/10</u>

Dave Hill has written in respect to the article on Albert Hildesheimer to highlight that they were a well known greeting card & postcard publisher as well as being an art publisher. The name Hildesheimer first begins to appear on the London art publishing (Siegmund) scene in 1876. S. Hildesheimer & Co., had premises at 15 Silk Street and 8 Chapel Street, London, E.C. Just a few streets away Albert Hildesheimer had set up his greetings card business at a similar



time, and very soon took into partnership C. W. Faulkner, who also went into postcards some years after this partnership ended.

Building & Civil Engineering Holiday Scheme – Bulletin 401/7



Jeff Turnbull has reported another Building & Civil Engineering Scheme perfin which bring the number of reported dies to three.

According to the J. Sloper Ledgers in the Society's possession, this perfin die "AJ/S" has not been found on postage stamps, and was probably only used to perfin these Holiday Savings Stamps. The user is identified as A.

Jackaman & Son Ltd, 13 Mackenzie Street, Slough. (Civil Engineers c1930s) apparently they were responsible for many of the large buildings of the time, mainly at large airports just being built at that time. Below is illustrated the entry (reduced) found in the Sloper records.



More Errors – Bulletin 390/27

In Bulletin 390 Roy Gault carried out a review of the various perfin errors encountered – both mistakes in the perfin, as well as in the stamp itself. This spectacular mis-perforation has perfin W7730.02M – W/UD used by the Wiltshire United Dairies. The piece has a cancellation of Golders Green – 23-12-81.



FIRST U.K. AERIAL POST John Marriner

The First United Kingdom Aerial Post owed its existence to the foresight and initiative of Captain (later Sir) Walter Windham, RN. It was Capt Windham who successfully organised the world's first Official Aerial Post in India during February 1911 at Allahabad, in connection with the United Provinces Exhibition. On his return to England, it occurred to Capt Windham that a similar project might be an appropriate and be a novel addition to the celebrations in London to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King George V in Westminster Abbey on 22 June, that same year, 1911.




Special pillar boxes were provided at stores where souvenir postal stationery was on sale. Both a postcard and an envelope were produced with both items being sold with a stamp already attached - $\frac{1}{2}$ d on the postcard and 1d on the envelope. A number of companies took the opportunity to add their own advertising to the postcard.

The historic first flight of the First UK Aerial Post, from London to Windsor, took place on Saturday 9^{th} September 1911. In all there were a total of 16 flights from London to Windsor with a total of

37 bags of mail weighing 926 lbs and just 4 flights in the reverse direction.

As the stationery was already supplied with a stamp the only chance of finding a perfinned item is with the additional postage required for overseas destinations. I never thought that I would find such an item but lo and behold, before your very eyes I can show you the postcard shown above. The machine cancel indicates that the card was initially flown from London to Windsor on the evening flight of the 15th September 1911. The perfin HYAM – H8080.01 was used by Hyam & Co Ltd., tailors in Oxford Street in London. As an added bonus the card was sent out to Colombo in Ceylon as it then was. The message reads "arriving by the next aeroplane post, look up" "will land at back of High Cross". I assume that "High Cross" was a large "plantation" in Ceylon.

And now a second perfinned item has turned up on ebay (sold for £245), which is shown below. This time it's one of the envelopes and what's more, it is a first flight cover on September 9th. The letter was sent to Alsace. However the 1½d added stamp although it's certainly perfinned the strike is only a partial so the exact die cannot be determined. The second row certainly reads "&Co.", but what the upper two letters are, is any bodies guess. I have tried to enhance the perfin holes and maybe a member can make an educated guess as to what the die is.



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SLOPER ADVERTISING CARDS John Marriner

Sloper sent examples of his work to prospective customers by pasting dummy overprints and perfins onto a card. This practice started whilst Sloper was still based in Budge Row. The only card that I have seen recorded from this early period was illustrated by Jean Alexander in Stamp Collecting (6/11/78) and is shown below. Alexander states that the card dates from November 1938 and this date ties in well with the two perfins on the card - M4730.01M and B1110.04BM which are recorded as used between 1935 and 1939.



In 1941 Budge Row was destroyed in the Blitz and Sloper moved to New Bridge St. With this move and the fact that there was a war on led to a much simpler advertising card being adopted. Illustrated later in this article is an example of this card from my own collection which dates from November 1956. The letter that accompanied the card is also shown overleaf and has the perforated signature of W.O. Hawkins – secretary of the company.

As can be seen it was an unsolicited letter to Clapp & Thomson on the off chance that it would result in a new customer. Unfortunately it looks like the letter fell on stony ground as there is no record that Clapp & Thomson ever adopted perfins.

A total of five cards have been recorded in the Bulletin over the years and the table here records the stamps shown on each of these cards.

This system was devised by us in 1858 and is adopted by thousands of commercial houses and public authorities etc., throughout Great Britain.

Stamps are forwarded by us in exchange for your cheque and a small commission charged for our service.

Any quantity of any denomination may be ordered from us and no charge is made for dies required.

During these difficult times it seems more than ever necessary to adopt safeguards and we feel sure from our experience you would have little difficulty in incorporating our system into your present arrangements. A few specimens are enclosed herewith.

If you are interested please write us and full particulars will be forwarded .



FROM HARNESSES TO AUTOMOBILE ACCESSORIES Roy Gault

Maurice Harps's article in the April Bulletin, 'Unravelling Provisional Identities', is an excellent piece of detective work producing what turned out to be a 'Magnificent Seven'. Here I can offer a more modest four, the catalyst for which was a report by *Jeff Turnbull* of an identified cover with "L.B/&C^o." - (L0370.01) being used by *Lowe, Bevan & Co* in Birmingham. The cover was postmarked Birmingham, 6th March 1913 which is within the 1905-1915 footprint for L0370.01.



The entry for L0370.01 in the New Illustrated catalogue points the way to "LB/&C^o" (L0360.01 - a suspected 'Braham' die) in use 1900-1905, (dates revised since publication), and "L.B./&C^o." (L0383.01), in use 1915-1920. As both are found with Birmingham postmarks, and form a chronological sequence with L0370.01, they are likely to have been used by the same user. A quick search of the Internet revealed that *Lowe, Bevan & Co* were in business in Birmingham from around 1900 through to the 1940's as Motor Car Fittings Manufacturers, which neatly ties together all three. However, there is also a reference to *Lowe, Sleigh, Bevan & Co*, a Silver Medal winner at the 1880 International Exhibition held in Melbourne, Australia.

An 1884 advertisement tells us that *Lowe, Sleigh, Bevan & Co* was established in 1747, as Coach & Saddler's Ironmongery, and Harness Mfrs, Clarence Works, in Birmingham. This gives us a suspected identity for "LSB/&C^o" (L4935.01 - also a suspected 'Braham' die), in use in Birmingham 1885-1900. They also made Railway Lamps!



WANTED - SLOPER REGISTRATION LABEL Maurice Harp

In the last issue of the Bulletin there was an announcement of the production of a memory stick containing the publications of the London Postal History Group. With such a vast data resource I thought I would do a search for anything perfin related and was surprised to find a detailed study on London Registration labels which included Sloper's name.

Deep within the list was the following entry under London EC. Sloper's Post Office was allocated the number "345" and at the time they were located in 30-34 New Bridge St.



Apparently each Post Office and Sub Post Office had a number allocated to them and this number was included on their registration labels. Major companies were also issued with their own labels.


I haven't been able to track down an example of Sloper's particular registration label but I did find the example shown below for "361" to illustrate the type of label that would have been used. Because the office would have not had a high demand for labels (less than 2000 per year) the labels would have been produced in coils rather than sheets.



Sloper moved to New Bridge Street in 1941 following the Blitz that destroyed the works at Budge Row. The company remained at New Bridge St until 1972. If anyone has a copy of a "345" label I would be delighted to see it.


ITEMS IN THE MAIL BAG Roy Gault

Two items have been sent in over recent weeks which merit a few lines in the Bulletin. The first, in mid April, is from *Dick Scheper* who responded to the Bulletin article - Another Sloper die with a Type II "&" - which featured "S.B/&C^o" on stamps from the Straits Settlements and the Spanish Philippines. Dick now reports the same die on two stamps from Hong Kong, so the plot thickens.



Can anyone help provide a link between Hong Kong and either *Sandilands, Buttery & Co* or *Smith, Bell & Co* (or both) to help resolve the user(s) of the die?

This second item came in on May Day from *Ron Mills* who reports another Dual-Perfin to add to the growing list of such items.




Here we have "S.J/S" (S4080.01), although with the stop missing, and "D.S./S." (D4580.01) both struck sideways on a KGVI ¹/₂d Dark Green, probably dating to c1939. Both Perfins were used in Sheffield: D4580.01 by *Drabble & Sanderson Ltd*, file and saw mfrs, and S4080.01 by *Spear & Jackson Ltd*, toolmakers. Ron tells me that the two companies are now part of the same group, but wonders whether they were associated in any way just before the start of WWII?

GREAT SOUTHERN RAILWAYS COMPANY Terry Comper

Provision for the creation of the Great Southern Railway company in Ireland was made under the Railways Act of 1924, which mandated the amalgamation (in the case of the 4 major railway companies) and absorption (of the 22 smaller companies) of all railways wholly within the Irish Free State. Only cross-border railways, most notably the Great Northern Railway, remained outside its control.

The Great Southern and Western Railway Company, the Midland Great Western Railway Company of Ireland and the Cork, Bandon and South Coast Railway Company agreed to terms for amalgamation, forming the Great Southern Railway Company.




All three companies were perfin users as can be seen from the dies illustrated above.

The Great Southern Railways Company itself was formed when the fourth major company, the Dublin and South Eastern Railway (who as


far as we know didn't use perfins), joined these companies under the Great Southern Railways Amalgamation Scheme of 1 January 1925. With such a rich heritage of perfin use it comes as no surprise that the Great Southern Railways continued the use of perfins.

The Mewhinney Catalog of Irish Perfins (Perfins Club 1994) identifies just three dies known to have been used by the Great Southern Railways (G17-G19). However I can now add another die (G15) to this list which I have on a rent receipt (see below).



THE PERFINS OF INDIA & INDIAN STATES Jeff Turnbull

I have posted two new catalogues on the Society's website and they are now available for download. These are "The Perfins of India & States" (189 pages) and "The Perfin Revenue Stamps of India & States" (105 pages). The last major catalogue of the perfinned stamps



of India was produced by Magnus Werner in 1990. Since that time of course a great deal of new information has come to hand. The production of this new catalogue has depended on the assistance of many Society members but the help from Peter Maybury and Bob Symanski should be highlighted.

The Perfin Revenue catalogue is a completely new publication covering an area of perfin collecting that to my knowledge hasn't been documented before.

Both catalogues illustrate the perfin dies by use of actual stamps as well as silhouettes and both catalogues are produced in full colour.

The other main feature of both catalogues is the illustration of covers and documents showing the use of the various dies.

If any member can provide additional information for either of these catalogues I would be delighted to hear from them. If you can provide scans as well that would be even better.



REYNOLDS & GIBSON, LIVERPOOL




King Edward VIII Air Mail cover with 4 x 1d red SG458 all perfinned R&G catalogued R1975.01M and identity of Reynold & Gibson, Cotton Brokers, 27 Cotton Exchange Buildings, Liverpool. Sent 12th January 1937 to Alassio, Italy and received on 14th January as per receipt back stamp. This die was in use between 1929 and 1939.



Reynolds and Gibson were founded in 1864 and traded successfully for nearly 100 years with other offices in London and Manchester. Their Senior Partners included Sir James Reynolds DSO, Conservative Member of Parliament for Liverpool Exchange 1929-1932, who gifted Woolton Woods and its adjoining field to the city during World War 1. He was followed as an MP by John Joseph Shute, another Senior Partner, from 1933 to 1945.

RESEARCHING DUNDEE FLOUR MILLS Richard Husband



I recently described this as a "run of the mill cover" to a fellow collector and he instantly burst out laughing. It is often easier to research the identity of a perfin user if the cover originates from because the National Library of Scotland Scotland (www.nls.uk/family-history/directories/post-office...) has approx. 700 Scottish Post Office street directories published between 1773 and 1911 available for free on-line viewing. The larger the town or city, the greater the number of directories that are likely to be available. Hence there are 115 different directories available for Glasgow, 52 for Dundee but only one for Airdrie. These directories are also available on other websites too. This particular perfin user was on page 220 of the Dundee directory for 1898/99 and the entry is reproduced below.

Dundee Flour Mills, East Dock street ; John F. White, proprietor

This perfin was slightly different because two rows of perforated initials appeared on the stamp, but this only served to make the suspected identity more certain. When I want free access to Kelly's Post Office London Directory, I search the microfiche at London's Guildhall Library. Do any members know of, and use successfully, other free trade and street directories available on-line? If so, please tell the Editor so he can compile a current list for us all to use



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POSTAL ORDER WITH PERFINNED 1D LILACS John Marriner



Illustrated here is a rather unusual item – an un-cashed 3/6d postal order dated April 30^{th} 1892 with three 1d lilacs added. What might not be so clear from the illustration is that the three lilacs are perfinned with die S/CLC/S – S1540.01b. This die was used by the Civil Service Co-operative Society.



As is well known the Post Office had instruction not to cash perfinned stamps and it would seem that this would include stamps added to postal orders. So we might speculate that an attempt was made to cash the postal order with the added stamps and that the encashment was refused. The sum of 3/6d was a considerable amount in Victorian times so it is strange that the postal order was never cashed.


NEW DANISH PERFIN CATALOGUE Sean Brady

Jan Krolak is a keen collector of perfins from Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland and England. He recently contacted me to let the Society know that during the last ten years, he has been working on a new catalogue of Danish perfins and Volume One is now finished.

Jan has made this catalogue available on the website <u>www.perfiner.dk</u> for free use and download. It is, of course, in Danish but with the help of Google translate should be of great use to anyone interested in this group of




perfins. The catalogue is a tour de force running to over 300 pages and not only contains the main catalogue but chapters on the history of perfins, development of perfins in Denmark, listing of POKO's and much, much more.



The format of the catalogue is the same as that used on previous Danish catalogues with illustrations of the dies made from both the front and back of the stamp. The website also has a series of articles, links to other perfin related websites, illustrations of various perfin machines and contact details for Jan. 
NEWSPAPER PARCEL STAMP PERFINS UPDATE Maurice Harp

The cover of the Bulletin bears a 2d green London & North Western newspaper parcel stamp. This particular newspaper parcel stamp, which has the perfin WHS/&S – W3890.01, has not been previously reported. A few other new reports have been made recently which are shown below. The first is F.P/&N - F3330.01 on a 4d Brown Great Eastern Railway. Although not clear in the scan below the stamp bears two impressions of the perfin. The stamp seems to have been folded in half prior to the perfin being struck.






Below are illustrated two more new values on parcel stamps both bearing perfin DUNN - D5000.01. Both are North Eastern Railway - the first a 1d Green and the second a 6d Black.



Lastly there is a $\frac{1}{2}d$ green Great Eastern Railway newspaper stamp with a William Dawson & Sons perfin D.S. – D4370.01.





William Dawson & Sons Ltd were wholesale & export booksellers and newsagents, so railway parcel stamps with the Dawson perfin are not unusual. Dawson were also



issued with their own cancel which is found on regular stamps.

LILLY & SKINNER COMBINATION PIECE. Roy Gault


Ron Mills has recently sent in this unassuming, undated, unidentified piece with what looks like an unknown "L/B" on a 1d stamp and "L&S/L^d" on a $\frac{1}{2}d$. Both are KGVI dark colours (issue 'Q').



The latter stamp is L5090.02, in use 1905-1941, and has a known user of *Lilly & Skinner*, Boot & Shoe Manufacturers, London.



The entry in the Sloper m/s ledger for *Lilley & Skinner* (illustrated above at a reduced scale) shows the pre-Blitz die "L&S/L^d" (L5090.02) being replaced by another "L&S/L^d" die (probably L5090.04a) but without any instructions for a 'Wartime Provisional'. Of note though is the "L/S" used specifically for coil stamps (rolls) both pre-Blitz (L4900.01a) and as a replacement. Again, there are no instructions concerning a 'Wartime Provisional', but on this occasion we know a Sloper Wartime Provisional (SWP) "L/S" was produced in the shape of "L/S" (L4900.01p), in use 1941-1945, although it's only known from a single stamp, a 2¹/₂d issue 'R'.



In conclusion, what I think we have is another "L/S" SWP, produced in a hurry by pin removal from a "B" to form a crude "S". The piece would date to soon after Sloper's premises were Blitzed in May 1941.
