# SECRETARY'S REPORT

There is not a great deal to report upon. There has been a slight loss in membership over the past year but our finances remain reasonably sound. The Balance Sheet for the year is given overleaf and it can be seen that our surplus funds have increased by a further £5 or so. This is largely due to the profits on the sale of chapters of Mr Jennings' book and the sale of back pages.

The balance sheet does not, at first glance, tell the full story for one might compare the duplicating costs with the income from subscriptions and think we were living beyond our means. This is not so. To simplify my accounting I lump all duplicating costs together and the costs shown include extra pages of current listings kept in stock for future sale, Mr Jennings book, and duplicating materials still in hand. In fact, when these are taken into account I estimate that the bulletin costs just under £30 per year. This is reasonably safe since in addition to the subscription, Mr Carr usually manages to make a few pounds per year for the Society with postal auctions etc.

My spare time has been extremely limited over the past few months and I offer my apologies if I have ommitted to answer anyones letter. I also thank those who have sent their good wishes.

It has been pointed out that, theoretically, postmarks could also be found from any part of the country, as between 1939 and 1950 one branch of the Department sent out many thousands of letters to all parts of England and Wales which were accompanied by labels franked with the DS/IR perforated stamps for reply, and it is therefore possible that some of these stamps could have survived.

The Dapartment was dissolved in June 1965.



## 17.1 ST. ALBANS (B) HERTFORDSHIRE

The City of St Albans is named after ALBAN, a Roman soldier of the occupation forces, who was the first Christian martyr in Britain. He was executed outside the Roman city of VERULAMIUM about AD 303.

During the Dark Abes Verulamium declined and the population moved out to the shrine of St. Alban some little distance away. Here the Normans built their huge Abbey and the present City grew around it.

Perfin: StA/C 2H 9,5,8/7 (4½)

Perfins were first introduced about 1950 and are obtained from Slopers.

# 17.2 ST. HELENS (CB) LANCASHIRE

St. Helens originally comprised a district of several villages and townships, and was not named as such until 1845 when the Urban District of St. Helen's was created.

A document of the 14th century refers to a chapel of "Sainct Elyn" in the area at Hardshaw so presumably the name was derived from this.

The Borough received its Charter of Incorporation in 1868 and was raised to the status of a county borough in 1888.

Slopers have supplied perfins to this authority for many years but the actual date of adoption is not known.

Die (i) has been recorded as being used by St. Helen's but the writer has only been able to confirm the use of the current die (ii)

# 17.3 ST. PANCRAS (B)\_LONDON, N.W.1.

The Borough derives its name from St. PANCRATIUS, the patron saint of children, who was put to death at the age of 14 in the year 303. St. Pancras Old Church, which is the oldest building in the Borough is dedicated to his memory also.

In the Domesday Book the Borough is shown as being divided into three manors, PANCRAS, TOTHELE & RUGEMERE.

Perfin: StP/BC 2H 9,5,8/11,7 (4½)

Period of use is unknown but they have been supplied by Slopers.

Present values are limited to U.RL first and second class letter rates.

- 1876-7. Sidney Allchin founds business.
- 1877. Poundage to Stamp Vendors revoked.
- 1878. Sloper becomes Postmaster.
- Sloper removes to 20 King William Street.
- 1879. Limitation of Poundage.
- 1882. All underprints ceased. Privilege withdrawn by Post Office.
- 1883. Death of Sidney Allchin.
- 1883-4. Braham founds business.
- 1886. Braham censured by Post Office. Initial Perforating Co., takes over Hancock's business.
- 1887. First American made perforating machine for cheques etc.
- 1890. Death of Joseph Sloper.
- Chambers of Commerce request for special common perforation
- 1892. Death of Hancock.
- 1894. Advertising rings around embossed stamps abolished. Merchants' Memorial to Postmaster General regarding Non-Negotiable stamps.
- 1897. Slopers' censured by Post Office.
- 1898. Initial Perforating Company fails and is struck-off.
- 1903. Underprinting revived.
- 1908. Perforation of postage stamps permitted in U.S.A.
- 1914. Slopers' remove to 22 Budge Row.
- 1919. Post Office orders puncturing of stamps for Telegraphic use Free postage privilege for Oxford Union Society members withdrawn.

- 1933. Hugh Vallencey publishes first pamphlet on perforated stamps.
- 1937. Slopers' publish pamphlet on the History of their Firm.
- 1941. Slopers' destroyed by enemy action. Slopers' remove to New Bridge Street.
- 1941-7. Charles Bein writes articles in West End Philatelist giving particulars of "Spifs".
- 1948. Vallencey pamphlet re-published.
- 1956. C. Jennings writes articles on "Security Endorsements" in "Stamp Collecting".
- 1957. Security Endorsement and Perfin Society of Great Britain founded.
