# 3.4 HYDERABAD

The Editor of the Philatelic Magazine has kindly given permission to reproduce the following article, entitled "Perforated Service", which appeared in the issue of May 17th 1957.

# PERFORATED SERVICE

With the incorporation of the State of Hyderabad into the Indian Union, there has been a mounting interest in the obsolete stamps of the State. The increased demand has resulted in the unearthing of some strange varieties, one of which is a sheet of the half anna brick-red issued for official use.

The word "SAFKARI" meaning "OFFICIAL" or "SERVICE", is perforated on every stamp. These perforations are also to be seen on the upper border of the sheet which suggests that the entire sheet was perforated on a machine. The perf -orations are regular and flawless. The Persian script of the word "SARKARI" is also perfect in every respect and suggests that it was designed by a mature calleographer.

It may be recalled that the Official stamps with overprints "SARKARI" were first issued in 1873 but discontinued in 1878 and Government letters were sent without stamps. It was sufficient to write the word "SARKARI" on the top of the cover and the name of the sending office below.

The Government again decided in 1909 to issue official stamps as certain Jagirdars and Paigah officers (small Feudatory States) took undue advantage and sent letters without stamps by writing the word "SARKARI" on the covers and it became difficult for the Post Office to distinguish them from the Government letters.

From the information which I could gather, it appears that prior to the re-issue of official stamps with "SARKARI overprints in 1909 the stamps department of the Government of Hyderabad tried perforated "SARKARI". These were withdrawn soon after as complaints were received from the Postmasters that, when separating the stamps from the sheets they were damaged as the paper loses its strength due to perforation in the middle, and stamps overprinted with the old dies were issued again.

No other information about this Official has been received.

## 3.5. NEW ZEALAND

The initials NZ were perforated on stamps of Great Britain for use by the office of the High Commissioner for New Zealand in London.

Of the 13 worksheets returned, only 4 gave information about these stamps. Mr.E.J.Enschede made an important addition to the findings by establishing 1922 as the earliest known year of use so far. He has an example of S.G.366 etc 2d orange with postmark dated 29.4.22. He also listed his other examples of the perfin on 9 different stamps, and sent prints of them.

Period of use from at least 29 April 1922 until some time in 1955 when it is said that postage was paid by frank -ing meter.

The Dies Four types of the NZ perfins were illustrated in the April 1961 issue of Gibbons Stamp Monthly, but the few examples reported by members are either Type 1, or seem to be type 2. There is no more than a millimetre difference between the spacing of the letters in type 2 and 4, but the type 3 with its odly shaped Z is distinctive.

It is not known what make of machine was used, or how many stamps were perforated at a time.

The following list is compiled from only those stamps reported by members, and it is probable that many others were perforated during the period of use.
