## SECRETARY'S REPORT

Despite the personal difficulties encountered in keeping up with all the society work over the past year, the fiscal year ended with the Society's finances in a very healthy state.

Although the subscription of 10/- no longer covers our expenses we managed to end up with an increase over last year in our surplus cash.

This increase was largely due to two areas of extra income,
the sale of extra pages, and the sale of stamps. During the year a number of sets of back pages were sold to new members and several Identities Catalogues were sold to people outside the Society. Similarly, the few pages of Mr Jennings book that we were able to cope with brought in a little extra income.

In the case of the sale of stamps, this category includes, the commission on sales in the auction, sale of stamps donated by Mr Chambers, and $£ 3$ realised by Mr West on the remainders of the now defunct exchange packet.

Our expenses are likely to increase still further during the coming year but rve hope to more than offset this with the sale of extra pages as in previous years. With our finances in such a sound state, therefore, there should be no need to review the membership subscription.

Certain measures are being taken to make the running of the Society more efficiient, but this is likely to be more of a gain in time spent than in actual cash savings. Members will be informed of these measures where it affects them, and one of the first steps we are taking is explained below.

## SUBSCRIPTION

In order to reduce paper work and to eliminate the sending out of reminders at various times throughout the year, it is proposed that as from lst September 1968 all subscriptions will be due on lst September each year.

Members whose subscriptions fall due between now and lst September 1968 will please pay the following proportions to take them up to the latter date:

Subs due on 1st Oct., Nov., Dec. 1967 . . . . . . . 7/6d
Subs due on lst Jan., Feb., Mar. 1968 . . . . . . . 5/-
Subs due on lst April, May, June 1968 . . . . . . . 2/6d (or $12 / 6 d$ to $1 / 9 / 69$ )
Subs due on lst July, Aug. 1968 - to 1/9/69 . . . . 10/-
Our United States \& Canadian members affected will please pay similar proportions of their annual subscription

May we also ask our overseas members to remit in a form which does not incur additional exchange expenses wherever possible please.

Whilst on the subject of subscriptions we would like to remind certain members that theirs is now overdue, some so far overdue that memberships are in danger of lapsing.

A cross at the foot of the front page tells you that John Nelson has not received your remittance at the time of going to press, while the word FINAL means what it says - no more reminders -- no more bulletins until you are paid up.

A list of lots for our forthcoming auction is included with this issue and there appears to be plenty of lots to choose from.

The closing date may appear to be a long way off to some members but we have to allow sufficient time for our overseas members to get in their bids. It is, however, recommended that members outside Europe send their bids by airmail to doubly ensure arrival on time.

Please let Chris Carr have your bids and make this another successful auction.

Chris tells us that unsold lots of non G.B. material from previous auctions is still being held over due to the size of the present list. He also promises to have something to say on the amount of damaged material received.

## CENTENARY YEAR

To mark the 100th anniversary of the introduction of perfins, it has been suggested that in addition to the ld red only auction to be held next year, a meeting be arranged in London.

Some time in March has been proposed and it will almost certainly be on a Saturday. If any member feels that he or she would like to attend would they please let either Basil Tomkins or John Nelson know?

### 3.8 SUDAN

Two sets of Perforated Officials were used in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan. Those with the initials SG, standing for Sudan Government, for use in various Departments, such as Director of Works and (perhaps) Director of Railways, etc., and the Army Service stamps with their AS punctures.

Eight members were able to give some information Messrs Bartleson and Eades reported having examples of most of the stamps listed on the worksheets.

In preparing these notes reference has been made to the book "Stamps and Posts of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan" by H.G.D.Gisburn and G.Seymour Thompson (which was kindly lent to me by Mr Zades), and also to an article printed in the Nov. 1959 "Gibbons Stamp Monthly" written by Colonel H. E.Hebbert and entitled "The Anglo-Egyptian Sudan --Notes \& Uses of the Service Stamps".

## A. SUDAN GOVERNMENT

The first to be perforated was the 5 m .


Die 1. Egyptian stamp, overprinted "Soudan" in French \& Arabic in 1897, for use in the Sudan. It was issued with the SG perforation on Feb. 8th 1900 at Khartoum \& Wadi Halfa. The hand machine used must have been a small one, for the sheets or part sheets were folded, thus causing the initials on some stamps to be reversed, inverted, or inverted/reversed in adlition to the normal upright position.

Two stamps of the Sudan 1898 series, the lm. and 5 m . (Camel design with quatrefoil wmk.) were also perforated, but only a very small number of the latter (the figure of 500 is given by D.B. Armstrong in 1912). Colonel Hebbert says that there is a block of 25 of the 1 m . in the Bucking -ham Palace collection, but no example of the 5 m . He has two of the 5m. stamps.

It is said that these stamps were used as franks that one stamp would pay for the postage of letter or packet of any weight.

Stanley Gibbons, Part 1 lists two of the stamps under the section "Official Stamps".

In 1902 stamps were overprinted O.S.G.S, for official use but these do not concern us here.

> In 1911 stamps were again perforated "SG" and a block for use on the large camel stamps was made by Thomas de la Rue for a cost of £25. Die 2 is found on the stamps of $1902-11$ and on the 2,5 , and 10 piastre values of the 1927 issue.
