This item is a "front piece" manufactured for the Sloper company to affix to any literature that they would produce to advertise their "wares". The centre of the item has a "schematic" of one of the JS / & Co perfin dies that was used by the company to illustrate their product.

Without Joseph Sloper inventing and patenting the devices that puncture the letters and patterns on postage stamps and other financial documents, this display would not be here !! Although others copied and marketed similar devices, J. Sloper Esquire was the father of them all.








Sloper perfin enquiry



good old days, correspondence was kept for a while and both envelopes have been annotated with the year of arrival.





The missive from Debenham Tewson and Farmer estate agents and auctioneers, Cheapside, is to solicitors in Edinburgh. The stamp which is perfinned D. T & F, for the above named company.

Internal mail

Letter from London to Llangollen in the Principality of Wales. As with many letters of this period there is a solicitor involved as the recipient. The stamp is perfinned with G R / W, which is known to be the Great Western Railway. The die is one of the earlier ones used by the company, in that the perforation pins on the head are relatively close together and the lettering is as a whole letter, instead of showing the characteristic holes. The 1d red plate (145) is cancelled by a London district duplex of August 1871.

A Queen Victoria period letter carrying a 1d red (plate 134), used internally within London in 1874. The Charring Cross duplex cancels the one penny postage which is perfinned MBW. The reverse of the letter has the Metropolitan Board of Works "seal" on the flap, and identifies the user of the perfin as that London Authority.

Unfortunately the front only of a letter from Manchester to Torquay, the 5 x 1d reds cancelled by a horizontal oval (498 for Manchester) being the registered postage fee. The stamps (all plate 146) are perfinned S S & H, and as the rear of the cover is not to be found, identification is not yet possible. The letter carries a red oval registered Manchester handstamp dated December 1876.

Originally thought to be for Joseph Slopers own use in advertising, these stamps carry the perfin T / B & Co. Sloper used a similar die on the same issue of stamps to affix to advertising literature sent out to solicit business. But alas, these are a slightly different die, and are assumed to come from the archives of the company Thomas Bonar & Co. of Old Bond Street London.



This is the second largest block of 1d red plates known, and being identified as plate 118, this plate number went to press in 1868. As the earliest known use of perfins has been established (so far) as early 1869 this could represent one of Slopers first commissions. This block has no imperfections, trims or separation, and has part of the top selvedge still intact. It is also from the top left hand corner of the sheet starting with stamp A A / A A. Also, as a minor bonus, it shows a minor perforation flaw running down the left edge of the block of stamps. You are looking at a "classic" in G.B. perfin collecting.

PERFORATED INSIGNIA Internal mail A simple letter sent in 1875 internally within London. The QV 1d red plate postage (which someone has written 117, this being the plate number, in ink, on the front of the envelope !!) is perfinned L & S / 52. This is identified to Luchtenberg and Schmits, merchants, 52 Mark Lane, London. (they moved premises late in 1875 or early 1976 to 66 Mark Lane and their perfin became L & S / 66 !!) The use of numerals along with letters to make up a firms perfin is usually as outlined above, but as they are more unusual, in not being just letters, they are very collectable.

Foreign mail

An entire sent from the U.K. to Italy in 1872, the London duplex cancels 7d worth of postage which is perfinned H / C & Co. and identifies the user/sender as H Clarkson & Co. The entire travelled from London to Genoa initially being sent off on the 15^{th} march 1872, and apart from the red oval P D (paid to destination) cachet on the front there is no other transit marks except a Genoa arrival datestamp for the 18^{th} March. Not bad in that it only took 3 days to travel to Italy be train and boat !!



Internal mail

A "pay up or else" letter sent to Messr's Munn and Mace requiring them to pay their appropriate dues in time, to the Lord of the Manor. This entire, sent in October 1871 by Furley Hallett and Creery the stewards for the Lord of the Manor's Court Baron, which was to be held in the Dukes Head Inn in Hamstreet. The entire was sent by the use of the QV halfpenny (plate 6) stamp, which is perfinned F. H and is identified to the senders.

A simple QV period letter sent internally within London on the 12th February 1885. Although the address is somewhat brief the cover has an arrival mark of Paddington for the same day on the reverse. The 1d lilac postage is perfinned ST / J G and the embossed flap of the envelope identifies the user/sender as the St. James Gazette. The postage is cancelled by a clear but weak Hoster machine cancel, quite nice.



A QV period postal stationery embossed letter at the two and a halfpenny rate used with additional postage to sent it as a registered letter from Birmingham to Germany. The letter was registered in Birmingham on the 24th December 1901 and arrived in Offenbach on December the 26th. (the post offices worked over Christmas then !!)The additional QV postage is perfinned S & C and is identified to Steinhart & Co as per the company hand-stamp on the reverse. Apart from the initial registered cancel in Birmingham the cover has attracted the usual "R" in circle and blue crossed lines for registration. A company GERMANY hand stamp and a faint London registered cancel in transit. The revere of the cover shows the Birmingham, Offenbach and company cancels.

PERFORATED INSIGNIA Foreign mail 6d. plate 11 au ONDO NC2C one

A pair of QV period entires sent from London to France, both to the Perier Brothers and both from Truninger & Co of London. Each letter carries a 6d. postage (nice on cover) and this tied in with the red oval PD (paid to destination) was enough to send them to paris. The postage is perfinned T & Co and is identified to the sender, Truninger & Co. Each letter's postage is cancelled by a London duplex, one for November 1872 the other April 1873. As both letters were transferred by the same postal system the entires also show the "ANGL/AMB Calais" transit mark. Incidentally both letters arrived the next day after posting !!

The R v G is just the initials of the name of the company, the number 9 comes from the address at number 9 Fenchurch Street London. The combination of letters and numbers (especially on QV perfins) is not too common, and combined with a QV one and a halfpenny plate (17) is quite collectable.

Foreign mail

An entire sent from Manchester to Portugal in 1869. The letter was sent via France as per the manuscript endorsement and either by land or sea onward to Portugal. The red PD in a circle states paid to destination, and as yet I cannot ascertain what the "FRANCA" in the oval cachet denotes. (answers on a post card please !!)

The QV postage is perfinned S M / & Co and is identified to the sender by the company cachet of Schwann Moderna of Manchester applied to the front. The letter sent on the 16th November arrived in Lisbon five days later !!

Post script :- J Sloper only gained his patent and permission from the Post Office to perforate stamps in late 1868, at the time of going to press on this item (May 2002) this cover is the 10th earliest known carrying perfinned postage stamps !!

PERFORATED INSIGNIA Foreign mail

A fine cover from England to Spain, in August 1872. The letter sent by Frederick Huth & Co. of London to Barcelona. The cover is endorsed in manuscript "via France", so one assumes the three day journey was overland. The cover also carries (in red) a P D in circle (paid) cachet. The cancellation is a fine duplex with a London Inland section numeral in diamond (No 87) from EC North District Office. The 6d (plate 11) postage is perfinned HUTH and attributed to Frederick Huth and Co. A very fine example of perfinned material.

Let us get the technical stuff out of the way first, a Queen Victoria cover Nottingham to Dorset in December 1897. From the Digby Colliery Co. to G Outram and Co. The Queen Victoria halfpenny postage being perfinned D C C / N and as is obvious identified to the Digby Colliery Co. Nottingham as the user.

These items illustrate a nice piece of social history, a private coal mine supplying a local coal merchant. A Nottingham duplex (583) cancel on the cover (complete with coal stained fingerprints) showing people worked on Christmas eve then (not as now). The coal was sent in two waggons, one belonging to the Midland, the other to the Great Northern Railway. The delivery note states that a demurrage of 1s. 6d. then 2s. 0d. per day would be charged if the waggons were not unloaded within two days. Yet the "accounting" on the envelope says that the coal was being sold out of the truck in mid January. An allowance of 2 cwt. extra per truck was allowed by the colliery Co. not a practice that would be found today !!



The reverse of the letter shows the Flensburg arrival mark for the next day. Just to confuse me, the envelope flap bears the "seal" of the Committee of Council for Trade, but nevertheless, the well worn letter with the OV 5d Jubilee postage being perfinned "crown" / B T is a very collectable item !!

The backstamp shows the arrival as the 11th of September, the difference between the Julian and Gregorian calendars. (the amount of £25,000 is mentioned in the letter, quite a sum in 1882 !!)



The letter is uprated by the addition of a further one and a half pence to sent it on it's way to Bohemia. The additional postage is perfinned C / A N / S identified for use by the Army and Navy Co-op Society Ltd. A multiple perfinned cover is not very common. Old stocks of company postage is being used up, as the date is two months into the reign of KE VII, being March 1901. If one does not know where Bohemia was in 1901, a map is provided !!





A QV period letter from London to Suffolk in 1896. The sender, the Great Eastern Railway and the postage perfinned G E R come together nicely. The reverse of the envelope is more interesting than the front, in that it is an advertisement for the railway company in the goods services it offers throughout the eastern part of the United Kingdom.

A simple missive from Aberfeldy in Scotland (NW of Perth) to London in 1891. The Queen Victoria 1d lilac being perfinned "CURRIE". The cancel shows the Scottish 2 x double bars and the number 2 allocated to Aberfeldy. The identification of the perfin "CURRIE" is known to be for James Currie and Company, the Leith, Hull and Hamburg Steam Packet Company, based in Leith. (Leith now constitutes part of "greater" Edinburgh)





Internal mail

Another piece of useless information, in that, the perfin G R & Co shown on the postage of various covers on this and the next two pages was used by the firm of solicitors of Gregory Rowcliffe and Co. in London. As the letters shown only cover the period of the early 1880's this was the time when the perfin G R & Co. reflected the company name. It has been through several changes over the years, i.e. Gregory & Co, Gregory Rowcliffe and Rawle, Gregory Rowcliffe & Co, Rowcliffe Rawle & Co, Rawle Johnstone & Co, Gregory Rowcliffe & Co, and now Gregory Rowcliffe and Milners !! Because of this there are several perfins attributed to the firm, and is further complicated in that different partners of the firm used their own perfins !!, so there are a multitude of different dies. The firm started over two hundred years ago, Rowcliffes being solicitors in Somerset and Gregory, who practised in London acted as their agents. This because county solicitors were not allowed to practice within the city of London. This is just a brief insight into the life of one company when researching the use of perfins, others are much more complicated.







The postage is perfinned A & B S, although not officially identified, the reverse of the card mentions an A Bahr, and if his offspring were part of the firm the perfin A & B S would fit for "and son". The postage is cancelled by a Liverpool squared circle cancel, and the card only took two days to get to Beckenried in Switzerland, not the same today !!

A QV registered cover from London to Berlin in 1900. The cover carries the R in circle registration fee paid mark, which was applied at the Barbican post office. The QV Jubilee 3d and 4d postage stamps are perfinned A. H. which unfortunately has not yet been identified to a user.

Another QV registered cover to Berlin from London, this in 1896 and registered at Gracechurch Street post office. The cover, to the Dresdener bank, is from the London and South Western Bank, identified by the QV postage being perfinned L S W / BK.





A nice, if old and battered around the edges cover, from London to St. Catherines in Ontario Canada, sent in 1892. The QV postal stationery envelope for two and a half pence is uprated by the addition of a two and a half penny jubilee stamp, which is perfinned C S / & Co. This ties in with the belted oval crest on the reverse of Cooke Sons & Co. of Friday Street in London. The letter was carried across the Atlantic on the S.S. Auriana. The journey time to St. Catherines being only nine days !!

A simple letter sent from London to Libau in Russia. The postage being cancelled by a nice Lincoln duplex on the 17^{th} August 1892. The postage is perfinned R P / & Co and it does not take a genius to work out that it identifies with the senders details emblazoned on the front of the envelope, in this case Ruston Proctor and Co. Due to the differences in the Gregorian and Julian calendars the letter "arrived" nine days earlier than the dispatch date on the 8th August 1892.



The 1d lilac postage is perfinned JT / &S / Ld and is identified to the sender Joseph Travers.



It was posted in London on the 13th May 1895 and went via New York receiving a back-stamp of the 18th, and finally arriving at Montclair on the 20th May. A week to travel a few thousand miles, it takes that long to travel the length of the British Isles these days !!!



Foreign mail

A letter sent in 1896 to Abo in Finland from Glasgow. The QV postage, which is perfinned C \cdot A / G is identified to the Central Agency in Glasgow. (it is also written on the reverse of the letter !!) The "hand stamped" FINLAND is a slight mystery, in that who applied it. I assume the sender did to assist the Post Office in sorting the mail to the correct country, as the address is brief. But could it have been applied by the Post Office ?







A superb cover from London to Szcekociny in 1893. The QV postage is cancelled by a Lombard Street C.D.S. The stamp being perfinned R. B. and identified to the London branch of the Russian Bank for foreign trade. The contents of the envelope are written in French ! The route to be taken for delivery of the letter is outlined on the front of the envelope, first to Berlin Kattowitz, then station Myszkow and onto the destination of Szcekociny in Russian Poland.



OV 1d lilac error

In 1881 the QV 1d lilac was introduced. The normal practice in production was for the stamps to be printed onto the appropriate paper, gum applied to the reverse of the sheet, and then the sheet of stamps was perforated, this making them ready to be sent to a post office for public purchase.

In this instance the sheet of stamps was also given a perfin, this via a company such as Slopers, who would construct the appropriate die, in this instance R J P and then put the perforated insignia onto all the stamps in the sheet/sheets. however many the customer desired.



The perfin R J P is allocated a die number R3030.01, but the users identity is not yet established.

BUT, somehow, a piece of excess paper had become affixed to the main sheet of imperial crown watermarked paper. The due process of printing, gum application, perforation, and a perforated insignia had been completed. Eventually, this extra piece of paper came free, (an indent on the selvedge shows where it had been situated) BUT in doing so the 1d stamp is only "half" printed, resulting in a spectacular error. All in all a very very nice item !!!!

A policy issued to H J Pickin Esq. For the cover of £250 provided he paid the sum of 9/- (inclusive of 3/9d duty) a much larger amount of insurance tax than we pay today. But, each and every seven years,(provided policy renewed and premiums paid etc.) a 25% refund was mad, can you see an insurance company doing this today !! The term of the cover to run from Lady Day 1869 to Lady Day 1870.

The Railway Passenger Assurance Company, apart from providing the insurance cover intimated in the company title, also gave general insurance cover. The policy shown here was for a Mr. Hirkham for one years cover of £250 from the 21st April 1873. The premium being £1. 8s. 10d.
