


Companies, documents and perfins

Odds and ends !!


After a company/organisation had deliberated, cogitated and otherwise formed an opinion as to what was to be their identifying perfin to be used on their postage; and placing an order with a company like Slopers to produce the machine which would make the perfin; all this with a considerable amount of time, effort and expense; so that eventually the machine would arrive at the office. Would you believe that after all this the perfin machine was entrusted to the care of the most junior employee, the office boy !!!





This is a brilliant example of a single headed die perfin machine, but as the office boy was idle, he folded up this block of six stamps and "stuffed" it into the perforating machine a couple of times. The result being mirror images, reversed and upside down perfins, and shown here pins from the perforator had been broken off the letter "C", but, hey who cares !?!?










In the beginning

As outlined earlier, protective underprints and overprints were used by firms and organisations to prevent fraudulent use of their postage stamps. Initially illustrated are three values in current use at the time by the company Copestake, Moore, Crampton, and Co. London. (large ampersand)





The Post Office permitted this practice, which started in 1867. But, only five firms availed themselves to this offer, where the underprinting was applied before the gum. By 1882, when this practice was terminated by the Post Office, over 40 firms or organisations had taken up underprinting their postage. These latter firms had their identification printed on the postage after the gum had been applied.






































During WW II the Sloper works in London suffered damage due to interference from the inconsiderate Luftwaffe. Norman services could not easily be maintained, so, to keep up a service to their customers, (it is surprising how people and practices carry on "normally" under great adversity) instead of a complete perfin being struck in one "pass" of the machine, each individual letter had to be perfinned separately. The same combination of letters is achieved but the variations in position is immense. Shown here is the die/dies used for the production of the perfinned stamps for the company O'Brien Thomas & Co.





















Foreign mail

A simple post card sent from London to Nairobi in 1905. The sender, the Army and navy Co-operative Society Ltd., giving information about a parcel to be sent out to the Rev. Fallon in British East Africa. The KE VII postal stationery card has been uprated by the additional postage, which is perfinned C / A N / S and is identified to the sender. The London machine cancel had obliterated the additional postage but had missed the postal stationery printed postage, so with their usual efficiency the London Post Office had used a London squared circle hand stamp to do the business. The front of the post card also carries a Mombassa arrival mark, this where the card was brought into British east Africa by sea, on it's way to Nairobi.

received goods from Copestake Crampton & Co the drapers Aldrich Bryant & Co near Diss were sent a bill, this initially on March 18th 1909, arriving in Diss on the 19th March. The postage is perfinned C C / & Co which identifies to the sender above. Aldrich & Bryant sent the invoice and remittance back and it was processed on the 21st April 1904, then posted it back to Aldrich & Bryant the same day, this time with another stamp perfinned as above placed on top of the original. The endorsed paid/receipt eventually arrived back at Diss on the 22nd April for despatch to Ricklinghall. Just as an "extra" the invoice has a revenue stamp applied over-printed with Received / for Copestake & Co /


Perfins and overprints True or false ??

I obtained this KE VII stamp with the Royal Household official overprint because it also had a perfin !! The overprint is a forgery, and a dealer with a conscience has marked on the front of the stamp "faux" to prevent it being sold as genuine. But, what was done to the stamp first, the perfin or the overprint. The stamp is also used with a Bessbrook cds cancel.

Why put an overprint on a worthless stamp with a perfin ? Why put a perfin through a (if genuine) overprinted stamp ? How did it get used ? The mystery continues, so answers on a post card please !!



Mint KE VII stamps

A bottom row (plus margin) of the KE VII one and a halfpenny value printed by Somerset House. The second printing of this issue, giving a reddish purple and yellow green shade. They were printed on ordinary paper with imperial crown watermark.

The stamps are perfinned B & S / C (catalogued as B6560.02), unfortunately as yet no identity as to the user. Either the stamps were purloined from the company (so much for being perfinned !!) for a private collector, or they may have surfaced out of company archives, answers on a post card please !!
