The Food Pantry Walk-in freezer suffered a compressor fan motor failure.


Andy and his team were johnny-on-the-spot and got things back up and running.

A Potato Mission.

It seems simple enough. The Homer Food Pantry strives to provide potatoes for our clients each and every week. That is often a lofty goal.

Don and Donna from Homer's Oceanside Farms have recently been

donating at least 100 pounds of potatoes each week to meet our goal.

But their support goes well beyond that gift. As in years past, they have partnered with the Homer Kachemak Bay Rotary Club to provide 100 seed potatoes to the club membership. These are divided into packages of 4 potatoes per member. So far, 26 Rotarians have volunteered to be host families to worthy potato plants. These seed potatoes are cut into pieces...each

with at least two eyes, and planted in the rich Homer soil. Apply a little organic fertilizer, water generously, and in a few months, we will begin the harvest.

For several years these efforts have

provided well over 300 pounds of potatoes each season. The club also awards prizes to the Rotarian who has the largest single potato and the highest yield.

As in most worthwhile projects like this, it requires both teamwork and an outstanding partnership.

The Homer Food Pantry appreciates the enthusiasm which so many bring to something as simple, yet so vital, as a potato.

We would like to challenge other groups or individuals to join in the Potato Mission.
