The area code was from Nashville, but the message concerned the delivery of excess food from the team battling the Swan Lake fire near Sterling. It turns out the text was from the Food Line coordinator for the BLM and U.S. Forest Service. They were providing meals for the firefighters and all were being

redeployed as they had successfully extinguished the fire.

Federal guidelines required they donate the excess food to local Food Pantries. Homer was on the list. She agreed to drive the three hours round trip to bring a pickup load of meat, cheese and a variety of dry goods to Homer the next morning.

We met her at 10:30 and stored all she brought in the Bread Shed and cooler. Thanks, Colleen!
