

It's the 200 year anniversary of Lafayette's return to the newly formed United States of America in 1824. Recently French diplomats, Lafayette's direct descendants, and an actor playing Lafayette are retracing, Lafayette triumphant return to the United States, where he received with a hero's welcome when he arrived at Staten Island NY on August 15th 1824. From there Lafayette visited not only all of the original 13 colonies, but all 24 states that existed at that time, ending his tour on September 7th, 1825. Why do I mention this? Well, Lafayette was a young man when he first arrived to assist the Continental Army in June 1777. And being young and new to the colonies he naturally found friendship in another young man who also made a name for himself during and after the Revolutionary War. His name was Captain Stephen Olney of Rhode Island. The exploits of Stephen Only are re-

nowned with over 5,000 different scholarly articles written about him – including several about him being bayonetted in the stomach, and surviving, at the Battle of Yorktown 1781. One of Captain Onley's most famous and emotional moments in his life occurred in the summer of 1824 when General Lafayette visited Providence RI during his return. And I quote....

"As Lafayette walked up the State House steps, they strew his path with flower petals. At the top of the stair landing, he was greeted with affection by Captain Stephen Olney. Olney had served in the Second Rhode Island Regiment of Continentals at the Battle of Rhode Island and as commander of the Rhode Island Regiment under the command of Lafayette at the Siege of Yorktown in 1781. He met Captain Olney, his old comrade in arms, and each embraced the other with such warmth and affection that, according to one observer, "among the many hundreds who witnessed this honest and patriotic effusion of tenderness, scarcely a dry eye was to be seen."

Deputy Scott Bare: Sworn Staff Member of the Year. Deputy Scott Bare, with over a decade of law enforcement experience, eight of which have been with the El Dorado County Sheriff's Office, is an exemplary leader in his role as Office of Emergency Services (OES) Coordinator. His dedication to community safety is evident through his active violence survival training for schools, county staff, and places

of worship, as well as specialized training for local fire agencies. ## **AMERICA 250 Minute:**

**Washington's Farewell Address** is a letter written by President George Washington as a valedictory to "friends and fellow citizens" after 20 years of public service to the United States. He wrote it near the end of the second term of his presidency before retiring to his home at Mount Vernon in Virginia.

The letter was first published as **The Address of Gen. Washington to the People of America on His Declining the Presidency of the United States** in *Claypoole's American Daily Advertiser* on September 19, 1796, about ten weeks before the presidential electors cast their votes in the 1796 election. In it, he writes about the importance of national unity while warning Americans of the political dangers of regionalism, partisanship and foreign influence, which they must avoid to remain true to their values. It was almost immediately reprinted in newspapers around the country, and later in pamphlet form.

The first draft was originally prepared by James Madison in June 1792, as Washington contemplated retiring at the end of his first term in office. However, he set it aside and ran for a second term because of heated disputes between Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton and Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson which convinced Washington that the growing tensions would rip apart the country without his leadership. This included the state of foreign affairs, and divisions between the newly formed Federalist and Democratic -Republican parties.

As his second term came to a close four years later, Washington prepared a revision of the original letter with the help of Hamilton to write a new farewell address to announce his intention to decline a third term in office. He reflects on the emerging issues of the American political landscape in 1796, expresses his support for the government eight years after the adoption of the Constitution, defends his administration's record, and gives valedictory advice to the American people. The letter also attempted to reunite the country, which had partly turned against Washington following the controversial 1794 Jay Treaty.







## **AMERICA 250 Minute:**





Hopelessly trapped at Yorktown, Virginia, British General Lord Cornwallis surrenders 8,000 British soldiers and seamen to a larger Franco-American force on October 19, 1781, effectively bringing an end to the American Revolution.

Lord Cornwallis was one of the most capable British generals of the American Revolution. In 1776, he drove General George Washington's Patriots forces out of New Jersey, and in 1780 he won a stunning victory over General Horatio Gates' Patriot army at Camden, South Carolina. Cornwallis' subsequent invasion of North Carolina was less successful, however, and in April 1781 he led his weary and battered troops toward the Virginia coast, where he could maintain seaborne lines of communication with the large British army of General Henry Clinton in New York City. After conducting a series of raids against towns and plantations in Virginia, Cornwallis settled in the tidewater town of Yorktown in August. The British immediately began fortifying the town and the adjacent promontory of Gloucester Point across the York River.

General George Washington instructed the Marquis de Lafayette, who was in Virginia with an American army of around 5,000 men, to block Cornwallis' escape from Yorktown by land. In the meantime, Washington's 2,500 troops in New York were joined by a French army of 4,000 men under the Count de Rochambeau. Washington and Rochambeau made plans to attack Cornwallis with the assistance of a large French fleet under the Count de Grasse, and on August 21 they crossed the Hudson River to march south to Yorktown. Covering 200 miles in 15 days, the allied force reached the head of Chesapeake Bay in early September.

Meanwhile, a British fleet under Admiral Thomas Graves failed to break French naval superiority at the Battle of Virginia Capes on September 5, denying Cornwallis his expected reinforcements. Beginning September 14, de Grasse transported Washington and Rochambeau's men down the Chesapeake to Virginia, where they joined Lafayette and completed the encirclement of Yorktown on September 28. De Grasse landed another 3,000 French troops carried by his fleet. During the first two weeks of October, the 14,000 Franco-American troops gradually overcame the fortified British positions with the aid of de Grasse's warships. A large British fleet carrying 7,000 men set out to rescue Cornwallis, but it was too late.

# AMERICA 250 Minute: ~ continued ~





On October 19, General Cornwallis surrendered 7,087 officers and men, 900 seamen, 144 cannons, 15 galleys, a frigate, and 30 transport ships. Pleading illness, he did not attend the surrender ceremony, but his second-in-command, General Charles O'Hara, carried Cornwallis' sword to the American and French commanders. As the British and Hessian troops marched out to surrender, the British bands played the song "The World Turned Upside Down."

Although the war persisted on the high seas and in other theaters, the Patriot victory at Yorktown effectively ended fighting in the American colonies. Peace negotiations began in 1782, and on September 3, 1783, the Treaty of Paris was signed, formally recognizing the United States as a free and independent nation after eight years of war.
