

Below is a progress report on the 720B for my on-going projects.


The fuselage was painted to follow the form of Pan Am markings. When the kit decals failed, I looked and looked for replacements or a sky scheme that matched the paint. What I learned from the decal suppliers is that they print to order. One supplier's printer was down and was locked down with Covid and couldn't get out to get things fixed.

The other option was a supplier in Russia. He had the perfect replacement but...it would be July before they got here and I don't wait that long. So the PanAm scheme was abandoned . . .





But, I found a guy who has a set of Alaskan markings ready to go and their scheme follows the fuselage colors already painted. So..my Pan Am will be an Alaskan Air 720b. Wheww, that's quite an explanation! But, the truth...


The quarantine has given me a bit more time to work on projects that have been sitting for a while. I've brought most of these models to previous meetings in the past – but they're all reaching the final stages at the same time.

Here's the 1/72 Airfix Hurricane trio takeoff diorama. All three will be mounted on very thin wire. So in order to make the attachment point a bit more stable, I drilled a hole under the cockpit and added a styrene tube into which the wire will fit. (see arrow)





These were temporarily mounted on a block of wood for this picture. The plan is to mount the Hurricanes spaced out a little more appropriately on a larger piece of wood, and there will be an airfield background behind them.



The 1/72 MPC / Airfix Kingfisher is 99% done. There is one piece of canopy behind the pilot that still needs to be added, along with an antenna wire. The rear cockpit isn't as detailed as planned. I kinda ran out of steam on this one and just wanted to finish it off





Tiny star-and-bar decals for the 1/72 Heller Feisler Storch finally arrived in the mail from a company called Fundekals. I didn't have any in my stash of unused decals that were small enough for this kit. The Storch still needs a bit of filling around the front windscreen, touch up paint, and dull coating.





Lastly – work began on the Secret Santa gift that I received at Christmas the meeting 2019. The 1/72 Hasegawa Lockeed P2V-7 Neptune will be built as in-flight, which simplifies the build quite a bit. The interior detail is sparse on this kit (nothing in the main body), but the exterior has very fine detail. About 50% of the decals are applied (all the big ones). If this plane makes it to a show in the future – It'll have to be entered in the "out-of-the-box" category. It doesn't really fit into any other category as it has two prop engines (seen above) and two jet engines that have not been added yet. It's a very interesting aircraft – worth the Wiki search!


The second picture is a close up of the truck with weathering by pastel chalks and an acetate windshield.


Dave is also working on a 1/24 1982 corvette. It is for a friend's friend who owned the real car.

The setting for the Ju-52 is supposed to be a snowy dirt field in Hitler's Russian Campaign.













So — here we are, very slowly dragging the F101-B !/48 out of the chaos, getting closer


to forming a flying shape from all these plastic pieces -




All the while looking forward and dreaming of the day we can move forward and get started on the 1/72 FH-1 Phantom by Special Hobby


