Our Church Bell

With the recent removal of our steeple for repainting and repair, the bell could be seen for the first time, albeit from a distance, since 2001 when that maintenance was last performed. It was cast by G.W. Coffin in Cincinnati, Ohio, by the Buckeye Bell Foundry in 1864. Dr. William W. Slayden, M.D. (1873-1947) wrote on June 5, 1940, largely from memory, the following:

"The present church was built about 1902. The bell in the belfry has a rather unique and interesting history. It was brought from the North during the Civil War, to Johnsonville on a Federal gunboat, and was used as such as a Federal gunboat bell. This fleet of boats was attacked from the west side of the river by Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest and his brave and dashing band of cavalrymen. They were completely routed and set on fire as they floated down the river and down in Stewart County, this particular boat using this bell sank. Some Stewart Countians pillaged the boat, taking off among other things, this bell and buried it in the sand and after the War was over sold it to the Masonic Lodge at Waverly, Tennessee. It was swung in the belfry of the little brick church on Church Street, and when the Methodists and Masons built a combination Church and Masonic Hall the bell was brought over to the new building and then when the old church and hall was torn down and the present church was erected the Church purchased the bell from the Masons and swung it in the present belfry. As it does weekly now it has called all the populace to worship for the past 75 years. When its appealing tones fall on our ears, wherever we are and whatever we may be doing, we should pause in our mad rush after secular and material and sordid things and utter a silent prayer for our well being and continued preservation, and beg for His guidance in all things. Through all the years the church has met its obligations and all in all has wrought well. We should stand with bowed head and reverent mein (mind?) in the presence of such an institution."
