The Minister's letter from Verity. Dear friends,

I have just experienced my first cold snap – in Devon, as I was on holiday – with a dusting of snow. Cold is different in Devon; already I find the Midlands air much drier, which makes sense, as it's so much further from the sea.

It's fascinating how much of our Christmas celebrations relate to the cold and the snow, when you think of where Jesus was born. The stable which probably formed one end of a Middle Eastern home offered warmth in a very different climate and culture to our own. The dusting of snow on the desert on our Christmas card this year might be found in the mountains to the East – in Afghanistan, as we know it today, perhaps. It is less likely in lowland plains not far from the Mediterranean. On the rare occasion it does snow in Bethlehem, I imagine it is at least as different as Devon snow compared to Midlands snow; no snowmen flying through the air, no igloos or robins...

I was late booking somewhere to stay for my holiday; over 91% of accommodation was already booked, mostly in the very areas I wanted to be, though nobody knew why. I ended up in a room above a simple pub. I thought a lot about Mary and Joseph at the inn. Sometimes our real needs are less than we imagine. A clean comfortable bed, privacy, water on tap, a kettle ... the fridge and TV seemed luxurious! I took only a few clothes (and a hot water bottle!), leaving all my homely clutter behind. What gave my holiday meaning was not the room I slept in, but space, mental and physical, and the friendship of the people I met up with.

Did God choose to enter the world the way he did, because the stable was all he needed, and he was more interested in mixing with people?

Among all the fripperies and complexities of this season of the year, it may help to take stock; what do I, or we, actually need? What is the balance between gathering and enjoying things, and spending time with people? Is this what is needed? Will there be space for Christ in our 'mas'?

Every Christmas, I love to spend an hour as darkness falls with a lit candle, song, and prayer, remembering everyone who is missing someone special to them this year; someone who has died, or is in hospital, or far away. I will also pray for those who are alone for reasons other than choice. It's a very special uninterrupted hour. For me, this is when I become aware of Christ's presence.

May you find Christ close in whatever space you make; in the way you exchange presents, in the singing, the decorations, the feasting, the people, the walks, the games, the TV ... for each of us the space made for Christ to come near will be different. I pray that such spaces may be made, not only here, but in all the trouble spots of the world, and wherever people are hurting, isolated, or afraid.

We don't need a lot. The climate of our lives may well vary. To transform the cold and dark of our climate and, sometimes, of our culture, into a celebration of hope, there may be a wisdom in making space for the gift of Jesus, the Prince of Peace. I hope you have a very happy Christmas!

... and then we start 2026, with a Covenant, giving us the opportunity to respond to the gift of Jesus with the gift to God of our own lives. Sometimes we may feel this is a poor exchange - what do we have to offer. British society is not the best at giving accolades, and perhaps the whole concept of public acknowledgement makes us cringe. Times like Advent, the New Year, and Lent, have us questioning ourselves, and making promises of abstinence or of 'doing better'. This is great when the rest of the year is spent rejoicing in the qualities we see in one another, but my impression is that we don't really engage in such a balance.

As we continue to explore who and where and whose we are as God's people in this place at this time, I wonder whether we could find opportunities to whisper in the ears of those whose gifts are less often in the limelight, just how much we appreciate what they do or who they are. When someone 'oozes' Christ, could we let them know the goodness of the impact that has?

Please look out for more information about EXPLORE in January; I look forward to making maps with you of your locality, to identifying what's special about the people of this area, and to pondering what kind of God we serve, and where Christ might be found in such a place and time as this. Hopefully, there will also be at least one meeting in late January at which we can learn of the many opportunities, resources, and support which exist to help us in our mission today.

Then, in February, we can start putting this all together, to express the kind of churches we are, and hope to be, as the space for Christ grows not only in our hearts, but all around us.

Wishing you a blessed Christmas, a joyful New Year, and a 2026 full of goodness and wisdom.





GARDENING NOTES FOR DECEMBER/JANUARY

December is the first month of winter and 21st is the day when the sun is 'way down south', seeming to appear stationary over the Tropic of Capricorn, the hours of daylight at their shortest over the northern hemisphere.

Jobs in the garden will have to be undertaken as and when the weather allows - both time and daylight will be limited. If nothing else, try to keep the garden tidy and prepare the ground for the coming season.

If not already done, it is not too late to <u>lightly</u> trim long shoots of roses to prevent 'wind rock during the winter. However, if the weather is frosty or cold leave well alone and don't cut back too hard as this could lead to soft, sappy growth during mild spells which will only be killed by frosts. Don't compost shoots that have blackspot - <u>burn it!</u>

Where soil has become compacted, or you've recently walked over it, use a spade or fork to gently chip or break up the upper layers, allowing frost action to get to work. Don't dig too deeply; this will take tool-to-cold soil down deeper into the bed. Limited planting is still possible where the weather allows, but only if soil conditions are favourable. Don't plant if it's frozen or waterlogged. Deciduous hedging should be planted as soon as possible.

Keep a check on forced bulbs for Christmas flowering, as they should be nearing the point where they will need moving into a cool and well-lit position. Frost can loosen the soil around recently planted shrubs and trees, so periodically check for 'lifted' plants and re-firm where necessary. 'Wind rock' can also loosen plants, so check for this at the same time.

For early-winter colour you can do no better than the charming hardy cyclamen *coum*. Often in flower just before Christmas, C.Coum is very hardy and, I believe, should be established in every garden or a small alpine trough. Flowers can be white, delicate shell pink, beautiful rose or deep magenta, the glossy dark-green to patterned silver, kidney-shaped foliage only adds to its charm!

A carpet of *C.coum* around the base of a mature tree in the darkest days of the winter can really lift the heart. The soil should be well drained and the site slightly shaded during the summer, remaining moist during autumn through to spring. Top dress the site with leaf mould and grit, and be sparing with the fertiliser, and they will reward you with a truly spectacular carpet of colour. One note of caution, hardy cyclamen are generally dormant during the summer, so remember where you planted them and don't hoe them out! Leaving the site undisturbed will see the carpet of colour increasing in size year by year, with young seedlings appearing which should be left to mature in situ!

It may be cold outside, the ground frozen solid with frost or unworkable, but the shortest day is at hand, it can only get lighter from the $21^{\rm st}$ onwards, the new gardening year starts soon!

Have a very Merry Christmas and a Huppy New Year. Whatever you're doing, enjoy your garden - it's the only one you've got!

Remember Christ is not just for Christmas. He is there for the rest of your life. No room at the inn, forced out by Herod, but He lived. Let us all be the people He wanted us to be. 'Love one another as I have loved you.' All the world should embrace Jesus at Christmas and for every day onwards.

The Dusty Road

"The road is long with many a winding turn". So goes the Hollies song 'He ain't heavy, he's my brother". Yes, and so it was for Jesus on His journey to Egypt. But first of all a trip to Bethlehem for Mary and Joseph. They had to heed a census call, as everyone in the country did. Mary was heavily pregnant so would have made the trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. Donkeys had been used for years, both for riding and as pack animals. If a couple had one Donkey the man usually walked alongside while the lady rode. And so the couple made their way to Bethlehem along the dusty road. No room at the inn but Joseph and Mary found a dwelling, then it was simply "Call the midwife".

Historians are undecided on which route the couple would have taken. Jewish relationships with the Samaritans were strained, so taking the longer road would have been safer and the easier option. This was easier for Mary because the Bible doesn't say she rode the donkey. If it's likely she walked in her condition she would only have covered 10 miles a day, taking around 10 days to do the trip. Just imagine, in a traffic free world, could you walk from Kidderminster to Bristol down the M5? This is perfectly flat.

Some people think they may have taken the shorter route to get there more quickly, but tougher, the equivalent of our imaginary walk to Bristol, but taking in the Worcestershire way and the Malvern Hills – try it! Anyhow, Joseph and Mary did get to Bethlehem for the birth of Jesus, the rest they say is history. An easy life now? No, they had to travel again a 50-mile flight into Egypt with the babe Jesus in arms. Herod had declared all babies must die. Again, they travelled on a donkey. A camel or a Horse would have been quicker, but these were animals connected with war and so would have been declined. Here they remained until an all clear was given and it was safe to return to their home in Nazareth. They had endured another long journey, some 120 miles. An Angel had appeared to Joseph in Egypt and told him to take Jesus back to Israel for those who wanted to take his life were dead. A remarkable early life-start for Baby Jesus. Then Jesus seemed to disappear. He turns up 12 years later in a temple in Jerusalem. What happened? He was probably recovering from Donkey-lag.


















How Father Christmas got where he is today

One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. If he looks tired, just remember that he has been around a long time and gone through a lot of transformations.

Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian.

Nicholas was a serious theologian: he was a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say today. He even, reportedly, slapped another bishop in a squabble over the exact nature of the Trinity.

Nicholas died in Myra about AD343, but the stories of his generosity and kindness were just beginning. One enduring tale tells of the three girls whom he rescued from certain prostitution by giving them gold for their dowries. When the father confronted him to thank him, Nicholas said he should thank God alone.

In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character. Meanwhile, Dutch and German settlers had taken him to America with them as Sinter Klaas and Sankt Nicklas.

It was in America that Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom. The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, turned from his lifework of writing a Hebrew/English lexicon, to write a fun poem for his children one Christmas. His 'The Visit of St Nicholas' is now universally known by its first line: 'T'was the Night Before Christmas'.

From Clement Moore we discovered that St Nicholas is round and pink-cheeked and white-bearded, and that he travels at night with sleigh, reindeer and a sack of toys on his back. It was Clement Moore who also revealed that St Nicholas enters houses down chimneys and fills children's stockings with toys and sweets.

So how did we find out that Father Christmas wears red? That was the US Coca-Cola advertising campaign of 1931, who finally released the latest, up-to-date pictures of Father Christmas: wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt.

These days, it is good that Father Christmas uses reindeer and doesn't have to pay for petrol. In order to get around all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will have to travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. For all those of us who are already exhausted just rushing around getting ready for Christmas, that is a sobering thought.

Christmas Unwrapped

All of us have received unwanted gifts at Christmas. For Joseph the gift of a child, as recorded in Matthew chapter 1, was not something he really wanted. Although he was engaged to Mary, her pregnancy would be grounds for divorce. Not surprisingly, with the associated social disgrace, Joseph wanted to divorce Mary quietly (Matthew 1:19). However, God intervened in a dream: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call Him Immanuel, which means, God with us.' (1:23). In a scary and uncertain world, what does the message of Immanuel say to us today?

God is present with us

God assured Joseph that He was working in all that Joseph was going through. The eternal and creator God entered time and space as a baby. This baby is both uniquely divine but also fully human. This means that we can know God personally, not just know about Him. The Holy Spirit is committed to making Jesus' life and character real in us, and bringing meaning to our circumstances, just as He worked in Mary's life.

God is on our side

Christmas touches some raw nerves in our lives, including stress, family rows, loneliness and financial pressures. However, God does not remain aloof from our experiences. In Jesus He enters our world of hopes and fears, joys and disappointments. He understands what we are going through, as He is alongside us. By the cross and resurrection, He gave His life that we might know His love, joy, peace and forgiveness.

For Joseph, as well as us, the Christmas message is one of hope in an uncertain world. It is a time to re-consider the claims of *Immanuel* ('God with us') as we entrust ourselves to Him for the coming year.

How to care for your real Christmas tree

If you want your tree to last as long as possible this year, the following should help: Cut off about half an inch from the bottom of the trunk. This opens the pores of the tree. Then place it outside in a cool shaded place, standing in water until required.

Once you have brought it in, place it in a water-holding stand, well away from direct heat such as radiators. Top up the container every day – you will be amazed how much water the tree drinks. These ideas come from the British Christmas Tree Growers Association (BCTGA)

Safe driving this winter

The temperatures are dropping now, and it is a good idea to nurture your car battery. Cold, damp weather can make it as reluctant as you are to get going in the morning.

The RAC recommends the following to take best care of your battery: Before you switch off your engine at the end of a journey, turn off the lights, wipers and heaters. This prevents any unnecessary drain on the battery next time you start the car.

Check that everything is switched off before your turn on the ignition. Avoid using the heater longer than necessary, as it puts high demands on the vehicle's battery.

Check that you don't leave interior lights, satnavs or phone chargers connected.

If possible, park in a garage.

10 years ago, on 19th Dec 2015 that Jimmy Hill, football player, manager and host of the BBC football TV series *Match of the Day* (1973-88) died.




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
