Once Upon a Time in Abilene

Good food, great writing, and fine songs fill the menu of the West Texas Book & Music Festival.

While a September dusk simmered, book lovers gathered at the Abilene Country Club for the Texas Cookbook Gala. As servers moved through the tables, authors and vintners stood and described each course and wine as it arrived.

After five chapters of foods and wines, ending with crispy Mexican wedding cookies, writers autographed their books with most proceeds going to the Abilene Public Library. The 2005 gala set just the right atmosphere for the West Texas Book & Music Festival-friendly, open, and plenty of good cooking.

Authors, Workshops, and Luncheons

For the festival's sixth edition this September 19-23, Friends of the Abilene Public Library and the Abilene Reporter-News will add a new note. Local artists in gospel, folk, jazz, and country will perform throughout the event.

Two dozen authors will speak, mix, and mingle at author luncheons, cooking demonstrations, workshops, and exhibitions. Some writers fan out to young

readers for "Authors in Schools." Last year Lester Galbreath, author of Campfire Tales, spun stories of cowboys and cattle drives to a rapt audience at Wylie Elementary School. Elsewhere participants nibbled box lunches in an upper room of the Abilene Public Library while Robb Walsh, author of The Tex-Mex Cookbook, delivered "History of Food in Texas."

More Authors and Autographs

On Saturday in the Abilene Civic Center, participants gulped down facts about publishing from Rue Judd, founder of Bright Sky Press in nearby Albany. "It's an opportunity to focus on an area so rich in history that has been given short shrift," she says of publishing books with West Texas subjects.

"We're an author incubator," commented Joan R. Neubauer in describing her and her husband Steve's Alpine publishing corporation, WordWright.biz.

Participants drifted to panels on ranching heritage, writing for children, and sports. Guests leading discussions included Western novelist Elmer Kelton, children's author Jan Peck, and sports writer W.K. Stratton.

Chapter One for Abilene

To a large extent the festival embodies a West Texas philosophy: pulling yourself up by your bootstraps. "We started it from scratch," comments Glenn Dromgoole, former editor of Abilene Reporter-News, who cofounded the event with Jane Jones. "We thought we could have a little session and have authors come and sell their books and give a percentage to the library," he continues. One hundred writers as speakers or guests appeared for the first event.

From one year to the next participants have included writers, readers, educators, chefs, and cops. This year, the festival will feature musicians as well.

Great food, however, sets this festival apart. The festival's closing Boots & Books Luncheon featured brisket from Sharon's Barbecue & Catering. For each table, festival organizers chose the perfect centerpiece for a West Texas book festival-a boot filled with a gusher of colored paper. GARY D. FORD
