A word from your Minister General ...

Recently, I had an interesting encounter with a gentleman in our parking lot on a sunny Tuesday afternoon. As usual \sim 'timing is everything'... I just happened to be passing by and so I was the one to deliver the news to him that on Tuesday the *Gift Shop* is 'closed'! He dealt with that information okay; he proceeded to inform me that he was going 'up the hill' to see his name in the brick walkway because he made a donation to the Friars! News from St. Francis Convent, Graymoor

We often hear the words, "time flies, where does time go?" It seems like the days and months keep flying by as we move into the month of June.

Where did time go? Within the months of March, April and May we have shared many special feast days as well as our usual activities at the Motherhouse. We continue to have our monthly House Meetings, birthday and feast day celebrations, Day of Recollection on the First Friday of each month and the Friday Holy Hour for the intention of vocations.

Catholic Sisters Week took place March 8-14, 2021. The Annual event emphasizes all the good works that vowed religious contributed to Society. This year Catholic Sisters Week presented a challenge to End Hunger. The Leadership Conference of Women Religious, Region IV, invited Sisters throughout the country to join for a collaborative effort to serve persons in need. In recognition of this week, we gathered on Thursday, March 11 at 2:00 pm in the Main Dining room. Sr. Margaret Sikora shared information on the topic of food insecurity in Syria and how it has grown dramatically during the pandemic affecting 60% of the population, most of them children. Sisters were asked if they would contribute in aiding those who are afflicted by hunger. Sisters again rose to the occasion by their monetary gift as they contributed \$1,250.00 to the Catholic Near East Welfare Association. (Fr. Elias Mallon, SA is the External Affairs Officer for CNEWA which supports charitable educational, health & development projects in the Middle East.) Sr. Mary Electa Barber shared her unique vocation call that led her to the Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement. Sister told how the Sisters of the Atonement, through their example of joy and hospitality, was part of her discernment in choosing our Congregation.

On Wednesday, March 17, we celebrated the **Feast of St. Patrick** with a celebratory liturgy followed by a delicious traditional Irish dinner. We gathered in the Residence Dining room at 3:00 pm to enjoy Irish music, Irish coffee and cookies. The evening closed with a Bingo Bonanza.

On March 27, Sr. Mary Kathleen Murray died peacefully in the Lurana Health Care Residence. At her Wake, Sr. Paul Marie referred to Sr. Mary Kathleen as, "a woman of great prayer

and faith, a true atonement who bore her sufferings with joy." May Sr. Mary

Kathleen rest in the peace of Christ that surpasses all understanding.

Holy Week was a blessed time of special grace as together we journeyed through Holy Week services with gratitude to Father Dennis Polanco, our celebrant for Holy Thursday liturgy and Father Brian Terry, our celebrant for Easter Sunday. As always, the music and choir was very special and sounded angelic with their rousing *Alleluias* to the Risen Lord.

On April 12, we celebrated the 151st Anniversary of Lurana Mary White's birth by having a special cake made for her birthday. On April 15, we gathered in chapel to celebrate the 68th Anniversary of her death. During the prayer service, several eulogies were read describing the life and death of Mother Lurana and captured so well Father Paul's description of her as, "The greatest woman he had ever known." It was fitting to recall the memory of our Foundress during the Easter Season, the 'Season of Hope,' as we called to mind Lurana's unwavering faith and hope in Divine Providence. We asked for her continued blessings upon us as we journey forward in confident hope.



Fr. Hiramatsu blessed Sister's remains (a clipping of Sr. Mary Laetitia's hair which is a tradition) during the celebration of Mass in the small chapel; then her remains were interred in the Friars' mausoleum in Tsurumi.









"News from our Mission in the Philippines"

The new normality of our lives since the Pandemic began remains basically the same. Quarantine measures may change from *Enhanced* to *General*, but our lives remain uneventful.

Sr. Virginia is busy with the daily tasks at Mother Lurana Ministries Community and Development Center. Sr. Rosa treats patients at the clinic usually only during the General Quarantine when people ages 18 to 60 are able to leave their homes. During the Enhanced Quarantine, only essential personnel are able to leave their homes, there is no public transportation and a strict curfew is in place. Since the Enhanced Quarantine was being enforced we were unable to attend any Holy Week services. During the hours of Holy Thursday, Eucharistic Adoration was held for the children, house parents, and Sisters. Stations of the Cross was held in the court-yard. Eucharistic Adoration was held on Easter.

Sr. Helen has continued to tutor the children in English. Sr. Helen is catechizing the children through word games and discussions of the Sunday Gospel. For example, the children have enjoyed Lenten Bingo, Holy Week Bingo, Easter Bingo and Pentecost Bingo. They became familiar with the English words, resurrection, sacrifice, almsgiving, fasting, and many others. From the oldest to the youngest child the meaning of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection was discovered and appreciated.

Sr. Rosa renewed her vows on March 15, 2021. We were fortunate that it was a time of General Quarantine. It was a simple ceremony held in the chapel after the Sunday Mass. Fr. Javier & Fr. Melchor (who are Sr. Rosa's patients), and Fr. Alan, (a friend of many years to the community), and the Sisters of Immaculate of St. Clare, the children, and staff witnessed the renewal. Even though everyone was wearing masks and socially distancing, the celebratory atmosphere was detected by all. The celebration continued with a meal prepared by the kitchen staff and served in the Feeding Hall which had been decorated by the staff.

On May 26th, Fr. Alan celebrated a memorial Mass for Sr. Susan. The staff, children, and Sisters prayed the rosary before Mass. During Fr. Alan's homily, he spoke of Sr. Susan's humility and her ability to listen with a caring heart. After, the Mass we gathered in the Feeding Hall for a simple meal. Sr. Susan's image looked down upon us to remind us of her ministry in the Philippines and also her encouragement to us to serve others. We continue to pray for everyone's safety and well-being.

Associados Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement no Brasil em ação ~ Mesmo com a pandemia, os Associados Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement no Brasil continuam a se encontrar, via on-line, toda última segunda-feira do mês, para unirmos em oração e partilhar a vida, além da reza do Ofício Divino. E estamos, também, engajados em todas as ações de nossa igreja.

No Brasil todo ano no período quaresmal realiza-se a campanha da fraternidade que é convocada pela CNBB — Confederação Nacional do Bispos. É um convite da igreja católica para pensarmos, avaliarmos e identificarmos caminhos para superação das dificuldades do mundo em que vivemos. Cada ano é uma temática diferente. No ano de 2021 a Campanha da Fraternidade foi Ecumênica com o tema — FRATERNIDADE E DIALÓGO: COMPROMISSO DE AMOR.

Nós associados, como grupo de fé cristã, realizamos nove encontros virtuais, ao longo de 40 dias, onde refletimos sobre o ecumenismo no Brasil e no mundo, a partir do lema – Cristo é a nossa paz: do que era dividido fez uma unidade (Ef 2,14).

Chegamos a conclusão que a caminhada ecumênica da igreja está longe do ideal. Nós cristãos precisamos de mais união para promovermos a conversão para a cultura do amor e da paz, por meio do diálogo inter-religioso e convivência ecumênica, sem que percamos a nossa identidade religiosa.

Encerramos os nossos encontros de quaresma com a Via-Crucis. Foi uma experiência enriquecedora.

Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement Associates in Brazil in action ~ Even with the Pandemic, Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement in Brazil continue to, meet online, every last Monday of the month, to unite in prayer and share life, in addition to the prayer of the Divine Office. And we are also engaged in all the actions of our church.

In Brazil every year in the Lenten period, the fraternity campaign is held, which is convened by the CNBB – National Confederation of Bishops. It is an invitation from the Catholic Church to think, evaluate and identify ways to overcome the difficulties of the world in which we live. Each year is a different theme. In 2021 the Fraternity Campaign was ecumenical with the theme - FRATERNITY AND DIALÓGO: COMMITMENT OF LOVE.

We associates, as a Christian faith group, held nine virtual meetings over 40 days, where we reflect on ecumenism in Brazil and in the world, from the motto – *Christ is our peace: from what was divided made a unity* (Eph 2,14).

We have come to the conclusion that the ecumenical walk of the church is far from ideal. We Christians need more unity to promote conversion to the culture of love and peace through interreligious dialogue and ecumenical coexistence, without losing our religious identity. We have closed our Lent meetings with via-crucis. It was an enriching experience.

In Memory of . . .

Sister Mary Kathleen Murray, a Franciscan Sister of the Atonement from Graymoor, entered into the Kingdom of God's glory during the early morning hours of Saturday, March 27, 2021 in the Lurana Healthcare Residence at St. Francis Convent, Garrison, New York. Born on May 20, 1934 in Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal, Ireland to Kathleen (Marsh) and Vincent Murray, Mary Kathleen was one of five children. Besides her parents, she is predeceased by two brothers: Rev. Patrick F. Murray and Vincent Murray. She is survived by her sister, Teresa Murray, and her brother, Monsignor Raymond Murray, both of Northern Ireland.

Having entered the Community as a Postulant in Ireland on August 15, 1950, Sister later became a Novice on October 2, 1951 and professed her Vows on the feast day of Saint Francis, October 4, 1952. She professed her Perpetual Vows on August 30, 1958. As an Atonement missionary for 69 years, Sister Mary Kathleen served for numerous years in parishes where she coordinated religious education programs, taught the Catholic faith to numerous children and adults, visited the sick and elderly in their homes and in hospitals. Sister also ministered in a children's crisis program supporting them in their efforts to recover from the trauma of domestic violence in the home. Sister Mary Kathleen was a gifted musician and had "dancing fingers" upon the keys of a piano. On every mission, music was a great part of her ministerial responsibilities as she led choirs and congregations to praise the Lord in song. Sister also had a special ability to 'give time' to others and had a quick and sharp memory for remembering the names of everyone whom she was asked to pray for. She was a "prayer warrior" for many who asked for her supportive prayers. Sister's favorite scripture verse was: "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me!" (Philippians 4:13)

Sister's ministries for the Lord took her from Ireland, to the Eastern and Western Coasts of the United States, as well as into Western Canada. Her first mission in 1952 was in Alamosa, Colorado. From there, she sowed the Word of God in New Jersey (Deal), Rhode Island (Harrisville), California (Woodland), New Hampshire (Lincoln, North Conway & Pittsfield), Utah (West Jordan), Canada (Edmonton, AB), Washington, DC at our Washington Retreat House). She returned to Graymoor in September 1999 to assume the role of Co-Coordinator of the Motherhouse and tend to the needs of the facility and Sisters at that time. In 2004, she became the Motherhouse liturgist for two years, retiring at the age of 71 due to health issues. When no longer able to be involved in active ministry, praying for others became her primary ministry. When asked, "How do you want to be remembered?," Sister Mary Kathleen said, " ... for being just who I was!" She had a hearty laugh, a twinkle in her eyes, and a bright smile upon her face.

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic, services were private for the Community only. Sister's funeral Mass was held on Wednesday, March 31, 2021. She was buried in the Sisters' cemetery. In Memory of ...

Sister Dr. Lorelei Francis Fuchs, age 70, a Franciscan Sister of the Atonement from Graymoor, transitioned into God's glory during the evening of Thursday, June 17, 2021 in the Lurana Healthcare Residence at St. Francis Convent, just three days shy of her 71st birthday. Lorelei Lorraine was born to Frederick and Irene (Heitmeyer) Fuchs in Long Island City, New York on June 20, 1950. Besides her Sisters in Community, Sister Lorelei is survived by her sister, Elaine Spinelli of New York, and her nephews, Joseph & Anthony, and their families. She is pre-deceased by her parents and her sister, Linda Fuchs.

Lorelei, at age 25, entered the Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement on November 1, 1975. She became a novice on September 8, 1976 and received the name Sister Lorelei Francis. Sister professed her first vows on

May 20, 1978 and her final vows on August 11, 1984. As an Atonement missionary for 43 years, Sister Lorelei was best known for her work after 1989 in the field of ecumenism. Sister received a Master of Arts in Theology in 1991 from University of Notre Dame, Indiana, then, a Master of Arts in Theology (MTh) and a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (STL) from Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Louvain, Belgium, where she also received her Doctorate degree in Sacred Theology (PhD) in 2003. Her dissertation was entitled: *Koinonia and the Quest for an Ecumenical Ecclesiology: From Foundations through Dialogue to Symbolic competence for Communionality*. In her early years in religious life (1978-1985), Sister ministered in various parish assignments as a faith Formator, teacher of religious education, liturgical coordinator and involved in all aspects of parish ministry. She was gifted in music, singing and played the guitar. In 1985, she was missioned to Rome, Italy to minister at Foyer Unitas, an ecumenical guesthouse of hospitality. Sister was quick to learn languages and became quite fluent in Italian, French and some German. She remained in Italy into 1987, ministering at the community's international guesthouse in Assisi, 1986-87 and in 2016. After this, she studied at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana and received a Master of Arts in Theology in 1991.

Her journey in the field of ecumenism brought her to New York City in 1991 where she worked at the Graymoor Ecumenical Institute (G.E.I.) as an associate director within the Institute. In 1993, it became the G.E.I.I. (Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute). She remained with the Institute until 2006. As an Associate Director of the Institute, Sister served on the National Council of Churches Faith and Order Commission, was an associate editor of Ecumenical Trends, and from 1993-2003 was editor of the GEII resource materials for the annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. She also staffed the Institute's LARC Desk (Lutheran-Anglican-Roman Catholic relations). She wrote numerous articles and gave presentations throughout the United States and also at the Centro Pro Unione in Rome. Sister's ministries were academic, theological and ecumenical. She traveled throughout the United States, and Europe, especially Italy, France and Germany participating in conferences, dialogues, and giving lectures. She also facilitated ecumenical retreats and parish missions. In October 2015, Sister Lorelei presented a conference on ecumenism at the Sisters' mission in Paliparan, Cavite, Philippines.

Though Sister's health began to decline in 2016, she continued with some ministries at St. Francis Convent at Graymoor, and in 2016/2017 in the community's Washington Retreat House, Washington, DC. In Memory of ...

Sister Ann Kathleen (Mary Bridget) Clancy, age 96, a Franciscan Sister of the Atonement, entered into the Kingdom of God's glory on Thursday, June 17, 2021 at the Lurana Healthcare Residence of St. Francis Convent at Graymoor in Garrison, New York. Sister Ann Kathleen was born on February 23, 1925 in Ballinagleragh, Co. Leitrim, Ireland. Survived by her Sisters in Community, nieces, nephews and cousins, Sister is pre-deceased by her parents, Kate (Gilmartin) and John Clancy, and her three brothers: James, Stephen & Dermot.

Mary Bridget, at the age of 22, entered the Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement in Rossinver, Ireland on June 7, 1947 and became a postulant. After a time there, she and seven other postulants sailed from Ireland to New York and Sister recalled the warm welcome they received upon arriving at Graymoor after the long boat trip. The homesickness and the sense of being 'in a far-away land' did not last long after they experienced the love and warmth of the greeting by Sister Mary Celine, the Directress of Postulants at that time. This feeling of welcome has meant a great deal to her over the years and Sister Ann Kathleen, herself, was always a very welcoming person.

On September 28, 1948, Sister became a Novice at Graymoor. She professed her First Vows on October 1, 1949 and her Perpetual Vows on August 27, 1955. As an Atonement missionary for 72 years, Sister Ann Kathleen served in various parishes within the United States primarily as a parish minister, teaching the faith through religious education class, pastoral care of the sick and

homebound, and reaching out to those in need.

Early in her religious life, Sister ministered for three years in the Community's retreat ministry at the Washington Retreat House, Washington, DC. Other responsibilities included years of parish ministry in the following parishes: Connecticut (Mt. Carmel), Michigan (Milford), New Jersey (Camden), New York (Ticonderoga, Port Leyden & Brushton), Oregon (Bandon & Lakeview), and Rhode Island (Harrisville). Sister was an energetic, versatile and caring person. Sisters who knew Sr. Ann Kathleen saw her as a friend whose love and sensitivity enriched their lives. They admired her generosity as she gave of herself in the service of her Sisters. She had a hearty laugh and enjoyed good times in the company of her friends and family. She enjoyed being with cheerful people, enjoyed music, art, sports, and especially hockey! In the early 90's, Sister's caring heart led her to minister for four years with those suffering from the effects of AIDS at Yale, New Haven. Shortly after this ministry, she returned to the Motherhouse at Graymoor where she was a driver to take Sisters to appointments and also ministered in our Sisters' Gift Shop for a number of years. As her health began to decline in 2018, Sister became a resident in the Lurana Healthcare Residence where she resided until her death.

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic, services were private for the Atonement Community members only. Sister's funeral Mass was on **Monday, June 21, 2021**. All services were held in the Motherhouse chapel and Sister was buried in the Sisters' cemetery. Sister Edward Marie Tesiero (*Edwina Mary*), a Franciscan Sister of the Atonement from Graymoor, peacefully entered into God's glory on Sunday morning, July 25, 2021 in the Lurana Healthcare Residence of Saint Francis Convent at Graymoor in Garrison, New York. Born in Amsterdam, New York on October 15, 1935 to Sarah (Boyd) and Edward Tesiero, Sister is predeceased by her parents and her sister, Marilyn Sickler. She is survived by her Sisters in Community, her brother Edward Tesiero of Amsterdam, NY and her nieces and nephews.

Edwina Mary entered the Community on September 8, 1959. She received the name Sister Edward Marie on May 5, 1960 when she became a Novice. She professed her first vows on May 15, 1961 and

her final vows on August 27, 1966. As an Atonement missionary for 60 years, she served in parish, catechetical, pastoral and educational ministries throughout her years as a Sister.

Sister's first mission assignment was in 1962 at Mt. Carmel, CT. From there, she ministered in Maine (Limerick), California (Merced, Bakersfield), Oregon (Bandon), New York (Albany, Graymoor, Canajoharie, Amsterdam, Schuylerville, Massena & Morristown), New Hampshire (North Conway), and a 3-month stay in Bethlehem, So. Africa. From 1991-1996, Sister served on the Leadership Team of the congregation and from 2001-2006 she was the appointed Secretary General. She returned to Graymoor in January 2018.

The year before she entered the community, 1958, Edwina received a bachelor's degree from the College of St. Rose, Albany, NY. In 1970, she studied Theology for one year at Regina Mundi in Rome, Italy and in 1971 began studies at St. Louis University, Missouri where she received an MA in Theology in 1973. From 1975 to 1980, Sister Edward Marie was the Directress of Higher Studies for the junior Sisters of the congregation. Sister Edward Marie was well known as a catechist and director of religious education in the numerous parishes in which she ministered. Sister once wrote, "My finest and most treasured memories are moments when, as a catechist, I observed surprise and joy come over a child's (or teen's or adult's) face as he or she 'caught' and recognized the truth of God's Presence as real, and in them, and with them in their personal life."

Sister's funeral Mass was held in the Motherhouse Chapel on Saturday, July 31, 2021 at 11:00 a.m. Burial was in the Sisters' cemetery.
