A word from your Minister General



On July 9, 2017 our Leadership Team recognized the completion of one year of service in our five-year term. With the passage of a complete year, sharing a *State of the Community* report for membership allowed me to convey a true picture of the ‘now’ reality and also share my personal accountability for this role of Minister General.

As we set sail in confident hope, we pray the Spirit will continue to enlighten us to be instruments of peace and joy with all whom we encounter.



Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation

Food. We all eat. We all need food for our sustenance. Does our awareness of the relationship between Food and Environment affect our food choices? World Environment Day on June 5th was a reminder of the need to care for our environment so we can pass on a sustainable Mother Earth capable of feeding and providing for future generations.

Do you know how changing climate impacts on food production?

Droughts, floods, temperature swings caused by greenhouse gases disrupt planting and harvesting seasons, and quantities of food available for consumption.

“Agriculture is among the greatest contributors to global warming, emitting more greenhouse gases than all our cars, trucks, trains and airplanes combined largely from methane released by cattle and rice farms, nitrous oxide from fertilized fields, and carbon dioxide from the cutting of rain forests to grow crops or raise livestock.”

“Farming is the thirstiest user of our precious water supplies and a major polluter, as run-off from fertilizers and manure disrupts fragile lakes, rivers, and coastal ecosystems across the globe.”

“Agriculture also accelerates the loss of biodiversity. As we've cleared areas of grassland and forest for farms, we've lost crucial habitat, making agriculture a major driver of wildlife extinction.” (*Excerpt from Jonathon Foley, National Geographic*)

“Livestock accounts for almost half of the greenhouse gas emissions produced by agriculture. Meat from ruminants fares poorly compared with other foods. Kilograms of CO₂ equivalent per kilogram of consumed food are as follows: Emissions from corn-fed cattle: Lamb, 39.2; Beef, 27.0; Cheese, 13.5; Pork, 12.1; Chicken, 6.9.”
US EPA, Environmental Working Group, Union of Concerned Scientists.

“The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development...”
In *Laudato Si*, Number 13, Pope Francis challenges us throughout the encyclical to be mindful of the effects of climate change on the marginalized not only for basic needs as food, but also for our home Mother Earth. The UN General Assembly adopted Sustainable Development Goals in 2015 and goals 2 and 12 speak to the issue regarding world hunger and food consumption and our responsibility to assist those suffering from malnutrition.

Rev. Dr. Olav Fykse Tveit, *Secretary General of World Council of Churches*, described food “as a ‘gift of God’ that contributes to both our physical and spiritual sustenance. He noted on May 21, 2017 that 20-million people are at risk of starvation and millions more are suffering from drought and food shortages ... Each day, Tveit said, we pray the Lord's prayer and we appeal to God to ‘give us this day our daily bread.’ It is a prayer for food and all that we need to be sustained as God's creation.” ~ Br. Kevin Cauley, *Carbon Rangers*

As we ask God to give us our daily bread, are we mindful of our brothers and sisters in need? **How can our food choices promote its sustainability for all peoples?**

- **The headline read: 258 Miles, One Lap Around the Building At A Time** ~ featuring a picture of Sr. Frances Arduini with her award ribbon and certificate for participating in the Lenten Walk-a-thon. Each lap was marked with a pencil scratch by her name on the clipboard at the end of the hallway in the Assisted Living Wing.
- **A new intern at the newspaper, Mary-Margaret Dwyer**, came to cover the big story. She is from Haldane High School's Class of 2017 of Cold Spring, NY. Mary-Margaret is going to university in September 2017 to begin her studies in journalism.
- **There were 10 Sisters who signed up to be walkers** (Sisters Francis Arduini, Theresa Ann Clarizio, Margaret Liam Glenane, Loretta Guevarra, Mary Harper, Rosanne McDonald, Marjorie Moon, Margaret Sikora, Leila Spaulding, and Betty Kolb, RSHM). - **The Walk-a-thon raised \$1,812.50** ~ and \$1,000 of that amount went to the Garrison Volunteer Ambulance Corp. Equal amounts of \$271.00 went to our mission in the Philippines, Catholic Relief Services and to assist the Motherhouse.




Lights! Camera! Action!






News from our Sisters in Japan





“We have Mass in our Convent chapel once a month and parishioners join with us to celebrate. Seated in the first row of this group are the four of us Sisters, Fr. Ichioka, our Pastor and two of the Sisters of Mercy. Father put this picture on his Facebook page and one of the mothers of our kindergarten saw it and she decided to come here for Mass. Three of the other people are from the Yamato Church (where we lived before moving into the new convent in Chigasaki). One of them plays the organ for the Mass.”



“This is a picture of my first English Class here in Chigasaki. The two students studied with me in Yamato and they wanted to continue; so when I started classes here they came to class as well as Mass. They travel here by train or car, taking nearly an hour. They are serious students. Our classes are held in the little house (which is located on our property just behind the new convent). We use this house for various classes and hope to have more use of it in the future. It is listed as *Novitiate and House of Prayer.*”



“These are my students in my second class in Chigaski. We meet every Wednesday afternoon. One of the women drives from Nakayama every week; it takes a good hour.”



“This is my first grade class in Chigasaki. Today was our third class. She says English is hard but she has fun while learning. I try to combine some fun time along with the reading and writing. Today we played a memory game with her English words. As she turned the cards over, she read the word and made pairs. At the end of the class we played the old stand-by, Fish.”




“Srs. Mary Stella and Angela Marie had their last religion class of the semester on July 15, 2017. Today, the children’s mother also came to class. They started in chapel with prayer, then moved to the other building to play. They talked about Jonah and then they played “fishpond” (see photos). Inside each fish was a small prize. Then they ate ice cream and enjoyed the rest of their class time.

Apart from these activities, Sr. Mary Stella is also involved with 100 weeks of Scripture and a preparation class for the parents of children who were baptized earlier this year. Sr. Angela Marie is involved with *Lectio Divina*. Sr. Paul Miki works one day a month at the parish’s gift shop. She is also a Eucharist Minister for the parish. Everyone is keeping well and we are gradually fitting into our new parish home.”


The Birthday Party

The Healing Clinic

Standing on the shoulders

Nearly 22 years of my life I have ministered in the Diocese of Ogdensburg. I worked in Saco, Maine; Lindsey, California; and Elmira, New York; before coming to my home diocese.

I was asked to come to the diocese in 1968 and worked for the Diocesan Office of Religious Education under Father Stephen Nevin. Atonement Sisters Marcia LaFave and William James

I left Ogdensburg in 1975 to complete graduate studies at Catholic University and then returned to Saco, Maine for a second ministry assignment with the Holy Cross Fathers. I was released from Saco to care for my mother in her blindness.

I returned to ministry in 1993 with Father John Yonkovig in St. Peter's, Plattsburgh and was elected to Major Superior of Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement in 2001.

In 2007 Bishop Robert Cunningham asked me to assume the roles of Episco-



A Habit of Goodness

Graymoor's Sister Loretta celebrates 75 years of service

On June 17 Sister Loretta Guevarra, 92, celebrated her 75th year as a Franciscan Sister of the Atonement. Born in Los Angeles in 1924 as Leonor Guevarra, she joined the Graymoor community in Garrison in 1942 and took her final vows as a nun in 1949.

As an Atonement missionary, the sister served for 31 years in Brazil, as well as in California, Oregon, Utah and New York City. She returned to Garrison last year to

reside at the St. Francis Convent, where Michael Turton met with her on July 18.

What did your parents do for a living?

My parents were Mexican. My father owned a hacienda in California. He gave young Mexican workers a patch of land and housing and in return they worked on the farm.

Did you give a lot of thought to becoming a nun or was it a spur of the moment decision?

I wanted to enter the convent when I was 12 years old, (Continued on Page 11)

We Remember Your Great Love



Sr. Susan Boyle, SA
February 15, 1932 – May 26, 2017

Sr. Susan was born to Sarah (McGuinness) and William J. Boyle in Whitehill, Eglinton, Co. Derry in No. Ireland.

Susan entered the Postulancy of the FSA in Rossinver, Co. Leitrim, Eire on June 19, 1951. She entered the Novitiate at Graymoor on October 14, 1952; professed First Vows on October 17, 1953 and Final Vows on August 29, 1959.

As an Atonement missionary, Sr. Susan ministered in Deal, NJ, in Yokohama, Japan and in Leadership. She served as Third Councilor in 1972 and elected as First Councilor in 1976. In 1981, Sister was elected Superior General and was re-elected in 1986. In 1992, at the request of Bishop Hubert Bucher, Sister ministered in Bethlehem, So. Africa to assist the Sisters of St. Paul with their formation and mission. In 1994, Sr. Susan was sent to Edmonton to oversee the programs there. She later returned to So. Africa in 1994 as the Vicar for Religious in the Diocese of Bethlehem. In 2002, she returned to Graymoor and was the Director of the Fund Development Office. Sister opened the Paliparan mission in Cavite, Philippines in 2010.

In her Legacy, Sr. Susan writes that she “had a great interest in other countries, cultures, languages, and way of life, and how we interact and integrate ... hopefully for the good of all.” She always hoped our congregation could become truly international with great respect for all people and religion. No “us” and “they” just “all are one in the One who sent us.”



Sr. Patricia Shaughnessy, SA
March 26, 1926 – June 22, 2017

Sr. Patricia was born to Nora M. (Otto) and William Shaughnessy in Holyoke, Massachusetts.

Prior to entering, Patricia received her art degree from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, NY and later worked for a major greeting card company.

Patricia entered the Postulancy of the FSA at Graymoor on September 24, 1956. She professed her First Vows on April 16, 1958 and Final Vows on August 31, 1963.

As an Atonement missionary, Sr. Pat ministered in catechetical, parish and pastoral ministry in New York (Cobleskill, Amsterdam, Rocky Point, L.I., & Port Leyden). Also in: East St. John, N.B., Bandon, OR, Oildale, CA & No. Conway, NH. In retreat ministry at the Washington Retreat House and at OLA Retreat House at Graymoor; and in art ministry in Assisi, Italy & at Graymoor while also teaching art in all grades at St. Columbanus School, Cortlandt Manor for nine years.

In her Legacy, Sr. Pat wrote that her legacy is: “*My artwork throughout the years...to express our spirit...especially the Francis pictures.*”

Sr. Pat told, how in 1956, she came to Graymoor, knocked on the door, and told the Sister who answered, “*I have come to learn your way of life.*” She later came to know that she was given the gift of her art talent “*for the sake of the mission.*”
