

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Introduction to French Polynesia

French Polynesia is an overseas collectivity of France and its sole overseas country. It comprises 121 geographically dispersed islands and atolls stretching over more than 2,000 kilometers (1,200 mi) in the South Pacific Ocean. The total land area of French Polynesia is 3,521 square kilometers (1,359 sq mi), with a population of 278,786 (Aug. 2022 census).

French Polynesia has 5 different island groups called, the Society Islands archipelago, comprising the Windward Islands and the Leeward Islands, the Tuamotu Archipelago, the Gambier Islands, the Marquesas Islands, and the Austral Islands.

Among its 121 islands and atolls, 75 were inhabited at the 2017 census. Tahiti, which is in the Society Islands group, is the most populous island, being home to nearly 69% of the population of French Polynesia as of 2017. Papeete, located on Tahiti, is the capital of French Polynesia. Although not an integral part of its territory, Clipperton Island was administered from French Polynesia until 2007

Day #1: Board on our sailboat in Uturoa, Raiatea at 6:00 p.m. We will have introduction meeting and go out for dinner.

Day #2: Route 1-2 (8 nm 1.5 hours) Set sail around Raiatea to Anapa Pearl Farm with its pearl divers. Group tour involving learning all about pearls. Explore the lagoon or hike through the rainforest to spot Tiare Apetahi, a very rare flower.

Day #3: Route 2-3 (34 nm 6 hours) Set sail to Bora Bora. Anchoring at Motu Toopua, Bora Bora. Enjoy swimming and snorkeling. Take a mooring at the Bloody Mary's restaurant and marvel at their huge list of famous guests.

Day #4: Route 3-4 (5 nm 1 hour) Move to the east side of lagoon (Bora Bora), where you can swim with turtles, rays, sharks, and fish. In the afternoon, sail the southern shore of the island and explore the magnificent coral reef.

Day #5: Route 4-5 (40 nm 6.5 hours) Set sail to the east side of Taha'a and explore the amazing coral reef of Passe Toahotu. Stay onboard for dinner.


Day #6: Route 5-6 (27 nm 4.5 hours) Set sail to Huahine and visit Fare, where you will find a warm local welcome in this Polynesian village. Browse the boutiques and get a bite to eat in the small restaurants.

Day #7: Route 6-7 (28 nm 4.5 hours) Set sail to Raiatea and dine onboard and sail back to Uturoa, Raiatea. Sleep aboard.

Day #8 After breakfast, take group pictures, wave farewell and disembark at 9:00 a.m.

RAIATEA

- Raiatea is considered as the largest island of the Leeward Islands. In the heart of Polynesians, the island has a certain magic connotation. It is must-see island.
- * According to the legend, the priests set out to build a new marae, making sure to uphold the custom that no one should speak or move during construction. Terehe, a descendant of the royal family disobeyed and went for a swim in the river. Wrathful, the gods awoke an enormous eel from the depths that swallowed the girl. The beast, having trouble digesting, stirred and eventually devoured the heart of the island, splitting it into two separate parts. This is how Taha'a and Raiatea were born.
- Geology has since proved that they initially formed just one island several million years ago. Today, the two islands share a history, a heritage and a lagoon.








BORA BORA

- ★ This island has an area of 38 km2 and is only 9 km wide at most. Its terrain is made of a basaltic chain that reflects its volcanic origin and offers an impressive landscape. The highest peak is the famous Mount Otemanu and rises to 2,385.17 feet high (727 meters). 3 beautiful bays sculpture the main island, offering the locals and tourists postcards beaches and landscapes.
- The coral reef has only one pass called the Teavanai Pass, to the west. It is the only gateway for boats wishing to enter this magical place.
- The island is so famous it is also for its history and the presence of American troops during the Second World War from 1942 to 1946. We owe them many facilities on the island and in particular the airstrip that has been for a while the longest in Polynesia.







TAHA'A

- Also, Taha'a is a must-see island. Only 2.5 miles separate the island from Raiatea, both sun-soaked island are surrounded by the same emerald waters. As it partly made of a string of motu, the island is only accessible by boat, a specificity which makes it even more attracting.
- ★ With its surface area of 55mi² and its 5,000 inhabitants, the island is essentially known for its vanilla plantations, as it provides 80% of the Polynesian production.
- Easily navigable, the lagoon fortunately presents great moorings which makes yachting and pleasure sailing agreeable. Here you are facing a real open-air aquarium, a godsend to nautical service providers.







HUAHINE

- The island is divided into two parts connected by a bridge of a hundred meters: Hughine Nui and Hughine Iti.
- Real Eden, the island is a haven for anyone seeking tranquility and calm. White sand beaches and coral islets have been sprinkled on a blue lagoon that could recall the Bermuda sky. A lush nature marvels many tourists and the island embodies the Polynesian beauty.
- Like the small creeks scattered around the island, Huahine wants to be secret, fragile and silent. Only archaeological remains attest to the wealth of ancestral heritage. But perhaps you will be able to make the stones speak and lift the mystery that hangs over the "island of the woman". Huahine abounds with food and fruit crops, the locals kindness can be read on every smile and in every look.










SPECIFICATIONS

Where, how and what time will we meet?


It is your responsibility to buy your own airfare from your country to Tahiti.

You need to buy your airfare for flying to Tahiti from your home country but you need a domestic transportation to reach Raiatea from Tahiti. You can pick one of two choices below:

Option #1: Air Tahiti – 1 hour domestic flight Fare: \$179-358 USD (Non-stop).

Option #2: Ferryboat – 6 hours 28 minutes trip Fare: \$74-98 USD & one stop in Hughine.

(You can ask travel agent for flying to Raiatea via Tahiti.)

Please double check with your travel medical insurance company before buying the travel medical emergency insurance policy. The U.S. Medicare may offer the insurance but please check with The U.S. Medicare office at first before you will fly.



YOUR CONFIDENTIALITY WILL BE RESPECTED AND PROTECTED

- If you have any health condition and you don't wish to share it with us, your privacy will be respected. The copies of our medical forms and envelopes will be distributed to you and the guests. You can fill out the medical form and put it in the envelope and seal it. Keep it in your cabin or give it to your partner.
- If you are unconscious, we will give your sealed envelope to the doctor or EMS paramedic.
- We urge you to share your information with us if you have any food allergies. For your safety, we (including our guests) must know immediately. Please bring your extra Epi-pen if possible.







THE WEATHER IN FRENCH POLYNESIA

Climate in French Polynesia

What is the best month to go to Tahiti? The best time to visit Tahiti is between May and October. Although the temperatures are balmy year-round, Tahiti's winter season enjoys less humidity.





WHAT TO PACK FOR A HOLIDAY IN FRENCH POLYNESIA IN SEPTEMBER?

The weather in the Pacific islands is fairly constant, but with a rainy season from November to March. Pacific Islands such as Fiji, the Cook Islands, Tahiti and French Polynesia, Samoa and Vanuatu enjoy a tropical climate. Average daytime temperatures in the Pacific islands range 75-89°F (24-31°C), with little variation throughout the year, making them ideal beach holiday destinations during any month. Cyclone season is in the humid summer months (November to April), however few of these make landfall.
