

Day 1: Hokkaido

Exercise 1 P.7

1. What is the capital city of Hokkaido?

The capital city of Hokkaido is Sapporo.

2. Where can I go skiing in Hokkaido?

Niseko is a popular place to go skiing.

3. When was Hokkaido founded?

It was founded in 1869.

4. What should I do in Hokkaido in winter?

The Ainu are the indigenous people of Hokkaido. They are thought to be descended from the Jomon people who are the people who lived in the Japanese archipelago during the Jomon period. Another theory is that they are descended from the peoples of northern Asia. They were traditionally huntergathers. They believed that all things were inhabited by spirits. There are now only about 20,000 Ainu living in Hokkaido, many have moved and are living in cities around Japan.
