



Amber questions are a little more difficult or require more detail.

Red questions require a lot of knowledge and are more difficult to ask and answer.

Exercise 1 P.7

1. What is the capital city of Japan?

The capital city of Japan is Tokyo.

Tokyo became the capital city of Japan on the 3rd of September 1868.

Trains and subways are the best way to get around Tokyo. Visitors should buy a prepaid travel card to conveniently pay for transport.

5. What should I do in Tokyo that might not be in the guidebooks?

The parasite museum has over 60,000 kinds of parasite, 300 of the most interesting are on display. Despite the name, Piss Alley is a great place to go if you want to try something a bit different for dinner. If you don't feel like battling the crowds in Harajuku, then you might want to consider Shimokitazawa. It's similar to Harajuku, but a bit more relaxed and not as crowded.
