AT LAST! The Viscount and the Valet, Book Three in the Whitleigh series. And so, the Whitleigh saga continues. This book builds on characters from the first two but centers on Viscount Merrivale, originally introduced in Book Two as John Tremaine's boyhood friend. The heroine is...well, here's what the back cover blurb says:

When George Merrick, Viscount Merrivale hires a new valet, he has no idea he has hired a female in disguise. Furious upon learning the truth, he assumes she is conspiring with his three overbearing older sisters, who are willing to use any trick to compel him to marry He sets a trap to teach his valet a lesson—but soon finds himself snared in it, as well...

Hunted for crimes carrying a *death without mercy* sentence, Olivia Neville will do whatever she must to protect her younger brother and toddler sister. Even if she has to serve as valet to a whimsical lordship. Even if she has to run away when she finds herself falling hopelessly in love with a man she can never have...

Want to hear a secret? I hadn't planned to give Merrivale his own story, but he was just so much fun to write in Book Two that I decided he had to have a romance of his own! Besides, he insisted...and what can a writer do when a character takes over?

After the delay caused by moving in 2017, I knew finishing this book by year end would be a challenge. However, I had promised it in time for Christmas giving and, knowing my readers were asking for it, I pushed my myself to write over 10,000 words a day in November. Frankly, I astonished *myself* with that level of sustained effort, but I was motivated by my beta readers who were waiting to read each day's output! I was truly heartened that, without knowing the others had said it, all of them thought that Viscount was the best in the series to date.


More exhausted than she had ever been. More frightened than she had ever been, as well.

Viscount Book Cover Backstory

When I young and foolish—that is, after I wrote my first historical romance novel and while I was still figuring out how to get it to print—I contacted no fewer than sixteen artists about a cover for the book. I knew just what I wanted, but couldn't seem to translate my vision into anything anyone else could envision. Eventually, one of my artist friends (who had also turned down the project!) suggested I do the cover myself.

The result was...ummmmm...enlightening. Mainly, it proved that I really could Do It Myself. The major advantage of doing a thing yourself—besides not having to pay or wait for someone else to do it, of course—is that you can create your own vision of the thing without the frustration of trying to explain it to someone who can't see into your head. Naturally, you also have only yourself to blame for less-than-spectacular outcomes, but that's a small price to pay. And, as I like to tell my trainees: "That's a different workshop."

This mixed-media collage above is the original art piece I designed as the cover for *The Viscount and the Valet*. The background is I2xI2 scrapbooking paper, as are the figures' clothing, the stable and swirl patterns. The flowers are pre-made of paper, placed over layers of ribbons and mini mosaic tile pieces.

The coiffures are doll hair and I added a "jeweled" sticker as an ornament for the lady. The decorative elements in her skirt are gold Starform stickers, with a layer of tulle as an underskirt to soften the dress and add dimension. The horses are dimensional stickers. The hero's boots are cut and shaped from scraps of leather. The lock and key in his hand are tiny jewelry charms. With model train fencing and a few jeweled swirls to add more *bling*, the piece was ready to photograph.

After taking dozens of photos to get one that I could use, I sent the best image to my graphics specialist who added the titling. (That's the only element of my book prep I don't do myself.) Frame the finished artwork. Hang in my studio. *Voila!* Another DIY project completed.

Since I don't use patterns for my artwork, I'm often asked how I know when a piece is finished. Whether it's a paperengineered piece, an art doll or something else, my answer is always the same: "When I've gone one step too far...it's finished." Oddly (or perhaps not), this somewhat haphazard approach is similar to my rather haphazard writing process; I simply write what comes to me as it comes to me. If asked, my advice for any creative endeavor would be: Do whatever works for you...and make it FUN.




The Viscount and the Valet Wins "Ist Place/Historical" Award

I rarely enter contests. For one thing, I've found I tend to write very differently when I'm planning to send a manuscript

for judging. Nervousness about the outcome interferes with my usual enjoyment of the writing process, and I don't like that! Recently, however, on a late-night impulse, I decided to enter the Gateway to the Best contest, sponsored by Missouri RWA (MORWA). Honestly, I had no aspirations about winning. More than anything, I was just looking for some objective feedback on my story prior to finalizing it. Then in early December, I was notified that I had won the "Ist Place/Historical" award for Viscount. I was amazed—and thrilled. of course!—and very gratified by the judges' feedback, including these:

- I'm running out of superlatives...all was as it should be and more.
- Captured me from the very beginning all the way to the end.
- The GMC, POV, action and suspense were all spot on. VERY rare to find someone who hits all of them well...
- I was hooked from lst page...disappointed there wasn't more to read.
- The opening action creates a good amount of tension.
- You built really three-dimensional characters. I love these characters already! I want to read on!
- I like these characters already and how the author tells their stories...
- Great hero and heroine! I can't wait to see how they reach their happily ever after!
