
Andrea J. Stein, the award-winning author

TAKING ACTION

Banning Book Bans

New Jersey lawmakers are moving to place limits on who can request books be removed from libraries. Dozens of people testified, including students who said protections are needed in school libraries. The Freedom To Read Act (S2421) introduced by State Senator Andrew Zwicker (D-Princeton) and State Senate Majority Leader Teresa Ruiz (D-Essex) establishes requirements for library material in public school libraries and public libraries and protects school library media specialists and librarians from harassment. The bill cleared the Senate Education Committee on Monday after passing the full Assembly in June.
