B.C. culture minister opens writers festival

Cries of "Keep your day job" greet Ian Waddell as he admits to penning 13 chapters of a political novel.

IAN WADDELL, the B.C. culture minister, kicked off the Writers' Festival Wednesday

by telling several hun dred scribes and others the value of book publishing here has risen from \$10 million to \$50 million since 1988.



"Keep your day job!" someone called out when former member of Parliament Waddell said he's penned 13 chapters of a novel in which a Vancouver Centre MP — not **Kim Camp**bell, one gathers — becomes prime minister and has an affair with a Quebec journalist. Mayor Philip Owen gave

the City of Vancouver award to The Greater Vancouver Book, whereupon its editor, **Chuck Davis**, put things in perspective for attendees by saying its 370 writers will finally be paid.

Davis' book beat out Carmen Rodriguez's And a Body to Remember With (Arsenal Pulp Press), on the problems of being a Chilean exile here, and Ian Macdonald and Betty
O'Keefe's The Mulligan Affair:
Top Cop On The Take (Heritage House), about a 1950s
payola scandal involving chief constable Walter Mulligan.

The former reporters have since written another cheery book for Oct. 28 release. It's The Final Voyage Of The Princess Sophia about a Canadian Pacific ship that sank in 1918, drowning all 343 aboard.
