



Kid's Korner

WINTER CRAFT: MAKE ICE CRYSTALS IN YOUR KITCHEN

You probably already have all the ingredients you need for this easy at-home science experiment! By Lacie Dooley publisher of Macaroni Kid Athens, Ga., Feb 5, 2019. Photo by Lacie Dooley

Growing your own ice crystal at home is super easy -- and is sure to wow your kids, no matter how old they are. Plus, you're sneaking in a science lesson! You need just a few common household ingredients in order to grow your own ice crystals: 6 Tbsp borax powder, 2 cups water, A pot (to boil water), Glass jar, Pipe cleaners, Clothespin


Instructions: Put the water on to boil. While you're waiting, make a snowflake by cutting two pieces of pipe cleaners approximately 2 inches long and then twisting them together. Then twist the rest of the pipe cleaners on in any kind of shape you'd like. Make sure to leave one piece of the pipe cleaner longer than the rest. Attach the clothespin to the longest piece of pipe cleaner and trim the edges of the remaining pipe cleaner, if needed, to make them even. Add the borax powder to the jar. Pour the boiling water into the jar (This is a job for the adult!). Lower the snowflake into the solution, using the clothespin across the top of the jar to keep it from falling in. (You don't want the water to cool down before the pipe cleaner is added to the solution.) The water should cover the snowflake. Have your kids observe the crystal every few hours to see how it is changing, or even consider making a time-lapse video! Your crystal will be "done" in about six hours. (The longer you let the snowflake sit in the solution, the more crystals will form.).



PLASTIC BAG BAN

Responding to growing plastic bag pollution, the Legislature in 2020 passed a statewide ban on single-use plastic bags. This new law bans single-use plastic bags to reduce marine plastic pollution, litter, and waste. The law will: Reduce contamination in commingled recycling and compost systems. Promote reuse and recycled content. Build consistency in policy and enforcement across the state. Support the recycled paper manufacturing industry. We are currently collaborating on outreach materials with local governments, retailers, associations, and NGOs. We will offer technical assistance, customizable education, and outreach material to businesses working to educate customers and comply with the ban. You'll also be able to submit a report, starting in 2021, if you observe a business still using prohibited bags. We will use this information to help businesses follow the state's plastic bag ban. Why ban plastic bags? Every year Washingtonians use 2 billion single-use plastic bags. Plastic bags are a big problem in the recycling system. Plastic bags contain toxic chemicals Plastic bags cost retailers money. Plastic pollution poses both physical and chemical threats to the marine environment. Reusable bags or recyclable paper bags are a better alternative. The ban details: (delayed one month, now effective February 1, 2021 due to Covid), Washington state will: Prohibit single-use plastic carryout bags in all retail and grocery stores, restaurants, takeout establishments, festivals, and markets. Require an 8-cent charge for all recycled content paper carryout bags and reusable carryout bags made of film plastic. The fee may not be collected from anyone using a voucher or electronic benefits card issued under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Women, Infants and Children (WIC), Temporary Assitance for Needy Families (TANF), or Food Assistance Program (FAP). Require a minimum of 40 percent post-consumer recycled content and meet composting requirements in all retail-provided paper bags. Require that a reusable bag made of plastic film contain 20 percent post-consumer recycled content and be at least 2.25 mil thick. Require compliant paper and reusable plastic film bags to be labeled with the above specifications. Create consistent policy and fees across the state. This ban does not apply to food banks and food assistance programs, however, those programs are encouraged to take actions to reduce the use of single-use plastic carryout bags.

The Stanwood Area Historical Society asks, "Did You Know?"

Excerpts taken from the "Stanwood Story", written for the Stanwood News by Alice Essex. June 6, 1935 the first applications blanks for old age assistance from the State Department of Welfare arrived and were available from Mayor Charles Dockendorf, and various offices. Eligibility requirements included...applicants must be in need, age 65 years or over, citizens of the United States, as well as residents of the State of Washington for at least five years within the 10 years immediately before making the application.

August 15, A tri-county meeting of delegates from Snohomish, Skagit, and Island Counties was held at LaConner to consider establishment of an airport. Arlington and a site between Mount Vernon and Anacortes were the suggested locations. Arlington got the endorsement. The local delegation came in for a bit of ribbing, as it happened, because many came in overalls to advertise the coming Harvest Jubilee.

Abe Glassberg, secretary of the Snohomish County Chamber refused to allow them to stand with the rest of the Stanwood delegates when he made the introductions. Subsequently he called upon J.H. McElroy, local commercial club president, to introduce the disreputable bunch, so said the report.

October 17 a fine exhibit of pioneer relics was shown at the second annual Gyi Gyi Hault, held to commemorate the 71st anniversary of white man's arrival on the Stilly. The affair, again sponsored by the Pioneer Historical Society of the Stillaguamish Valley, attracted numerous pioneer residents including Dr. and Mrs. O.R. Allen, formerly of Stanwood, and Mrs. Mercer, age 91 and one of Seattle's pioneer women.

A similar affair, commemorating the 75th Diamond Jubilee of Snohomish County, was held at the Everett Elks Club in December. An all-day open house, cafeteria lunch, heirloom exhibit and 6:30 dinner was on the program, during which C.J. Gunderson was named permanent chairman and J.H McElroy permanent secretary; both were from Stanwood.

December 26 H.L. Thurmond, Iver Thomle and Joe Danielson, all of Stanwood, were elected president and secretary, respectively, of the Snohomish County Pea Growers' Association, which had been formed earlier in the year. John Ness of Silvana was named to the five-man board.

Citizens' meetings concerning flood control were held throughout the year and included groups from 23 townships in the watershed, bordered by Chelan County on the east, Skagit n the north, the Sound on the west and the northern border of the Tulalip Reservation on the south. Engineers recommended that control begin with work on the streams way back in the mountains of the area. In December, the much-contested issue was put to vote. Locally-Florence, Warm Beach, and Cedarhome were against it. The vote elsewhere was not given, nor were the results announced here in 1935.

The pulse of the community is reflected in a classified ad which read-"WANTED-Carpenter work. Experienced carpenter will work for \$3 a day. Call at NEWS office"-and also in these quips from Editor Brown's column:

"With the passing of razor straps and woodsheds, child morals are declining" and again...," Best foods are the cheapest. The trouble is never the high cost of living, but the cost of high living."

Stanwood was where the action was in 1936. The business community was buzzing with changes...new names appeared on the east side and west side, old landmarks were given a new look, roads and utilities were extended, even a new city hall was dedicated.

COVID VACCINATIONS—WHERE DO YOU FALL?

The moment we've all been dreaming about for the past several months is here. There is a COVID vaccination that has been approved by the FDA and as of this writing is now being rolled out to some of our first responders. While it will be some time before it is widely available, this is most certainly a positive step towards a return to normal.

Older adults have been determined to be more vulnerable to negative outcomes as a result of COVID 19, and therefore are being prioritized ahead of some other groups for the vaccinations. If you live in a senior congregate care facility (like an assisted living facility, retirement home or nursing home) you are likely to have access to the vaccination even earlier than other older adults. The New York Times has published a free online tool to help you assess approximately where you might fall in the priority for vaccinations. You can check it out here. https://www.nytimes.com/interactive/2020/12/03/opinion/covid-19-vaccine-timeline.html

Some of our older generations may remember some initial missteps in the roll out of the polio vaccination in the 1950's and have concerns about the speed at which this vaccination has been produced. But, there is good evidence to suggest that the vaccinations are safe. The two vaccinations that are furthest along in approval process have been tested on tens of thousands of people already and have been demonstrated to be nearly 95% effective. Some individuals receiving the vaccination have reported some mild side effects like fatigue and soreness at the injection site which have generally resolved within 2 days of the vaccination. And, while the vaccination itself is new, the technology used to deliver the vaccination—modified RNA—has been studied and in development for more than 20 years.

It will likely be some time before we can gather in groups again, and enjoy our daily activities without a mask, but there is a light at the end of the tunnel and a promise of the return to normal we've all been hoping for if enough people get the vaccination. Between 75% and 85% of the population need to be vaccinated before we can reach so called "herd immunity" where the spread of the disease in our community has been halted. If you live in a senior living facility, you can expect the vaccination to come to you likely in early spring. It is expected that vaccinations for other older adults might be available in late spring via your primary care physician or your local pharmacy. Together we can put a halt to COVID and a return to life as we know it.



BACON JAM

Slather our sweet and savory bacon jam on everything! Spread it on a toasted baguette, hamburger buns or waffles. Add it to a grilled cheese sandwich, atop baked brie, stuffed chicken breast, or stir it into mashed potatoes, let your imagination go wild!

INGREDIENTS: 1 lb. sliced bacon cut into 1/2-inch pieces; 2 lg. sweet onions guartered and thickly sliced; 1/2 c. dark brown sugar packed; 1/3 c. strong brewed coffee: 1/2 c. water: 1 T. balsamic vinegar DIRECTIONS: Cut bacon into 1/2-inch pieces. In a large skillet over medium-high heat cook bacon for about 8-10 minutes, stirring frequently until the bacon begins to brown, but is still chewy. Using a slotted spoon, remove cooked bacon to a paper towel lined plate; set aside. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon of the bacon drippings. Add the onions to the skillet with the drippings, cook for about 8-10 minutes then reduce the heat to low. Add brown sugar and stir. Continue to cook until the onions have caramelized, about 18-20 minutes. Add the coffee, 1/2 cup of water and the reserved bacon; increase the heat to medium. Continue to cook, stirring about every five minutes, until the onions are thick and jam-like, about 25-30 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in balsamic vinegar. Use immediately or refrigerate for up to a week. Cook's Note: Bring jam to room temperature or reheat before serving.


