IS ROVER RIGHT FOR YOU?

There is a good reason why dogs are often called "Mans (or woman's) best friend." Dogs, and cats, are wonderful companions. They are generally happy to see us, they do silly things that make us laugh, and they can be great to snuggle with on a cold winter night. Science has shown that, in fact, spending as little as 15 minutes with an animal sets off a series of chemical reactions in your body, lowering your stress hormones, and stimulating the production of serotonin, the "feel good" chemical that your body also releases when you eat chocolate or you exercise. Besides that, almost immediately your blood pressure and heart rate decrease. Over the long term, spending time with an animal can lower cholesterol levels, fight depression and even reduce the risk of heart disease and stroke.

On top of these health benefits, people who own pets can benefit from getting more physical activity, having companionship, having opportunities to engage with others, and even having a greater sense of purpose. If you have a dog, you might even have more security in your home. But, there are also real drawbacks to consider before jumping into pet ownership. Pets can be expensive, costing \$500 or more each year. And, over 86,000 visits to the emergency room each year are due to falls caused by pets. And of course, if your golden years are filled with travel plans, pets make that a lot more complicated

Ultimately, most doctors agree that the health benefits of owning a pet as older person outweigh the risks. For those on the fence, you may even consider a sharing a pet with a family member or friend, giving you both some of the benefits without the responsibility.

If you are considering a pet, adoption of older pet from a local shelter may be the way to go. Not only are these wonderful pets who need a home, but their lower energy may be a good match for you. Check with your local animal shelter to find your next furry friend.

STEP ONE: Dye eggs. I used two different shades of green. STEP TWO: Draw thorns. Make sure the eggs are completely dry. Pat with a paper towel first, if needed. Using a fine tip black marker, draw on thorns. You can draw lines, a line of x's, or little free form prickly pear thorns. It's up to you! Optional: Cut squares of tissue paper. Scrunch them up and glue them to the top with kid's school/Elmer's glue. STEP THREE: Nestle in pots. Pour decorative gravel into small terracotta pots.

The Stanwood Area Historical Society asks, "Did You Know?"

Excerpts taken from the "Stanwood Story", written for the Stanwood News by Alice Essex. John Larson concludes with his story about Capt. Drake and his 37-foot boat "Progress" were lost at sea after leaving San Francisco for Hawaii. Besides a wife, who didn't share his love of the sea, the little captain had a daughter and two sons.

He began sailing in England as a cabin boy at the age of 12 and had built several boats here. Despite shipwrecks and capture by pirates in the West Indies, he had sailed most of the seven seas. He headquartered here for many years and wrote a story of his adventures.

To all a salute!

Change was the password in Stanwood 1937. The pioneer era was fading...a new era was on the way.

The forest, logged off to hinterlands, soon were to cease providing fodder for the town's payrolls. The spotlight was turning to the fertile fields for grist for the community's future. Stanwood, long known for logging and lumber activities, was becoming a new kind of town.

The change had been slowly and quietly emerging since 1928, when Bozeman Canning Co. of Mount Vernon pioneered trial lots of peas here, and when a vegetable cannery was established on the Stanwood waterfront by Lien Bros. The next step was purchase of the former Carnation plant on the hill by Bozeman, for conversion into a pea canning operation.

That same spring Lien's added peas to their product line, and four years later, spring 1937, S.A. Moffett & Co. of Seattle introduced the frozen vegetable process. During Moffett's first season at their new Hatt Slough plant, preparation of peas, spinach, corn and broccoli was done for final processing in Seattle, but that was soon to change.

Timed perfectly for the processing industry 1937 was a bumper year for crops. Bozeman had a rosy season, from which thousands of dollars went into the pockets of growers and workers. Lien Bros. also hit the jackpot as it were, pouring \$74,000 into the local economy from their pack of 160,000 cases of peas, carrots, beets, beans and cabbage. During the peak of the harvest, 150 men and women were employed and 11 remained for a time during the winter labeling the pack for shipment about the United States, Hawaii and Alaska.

Moffett was so pleased with its four-month run, that it announced plans to enlarge its plant and at the fall meeting of Snohomish Cunty Pea Growers Association the Twin Cities were lauded as top-flight pea growing country.

Before the end of the year this edict was verified, when R.D. Bodle of Ballard, and T.H. Hogue, of Kent, bid for pea acreage and got it. Come spring 1938, Bodle established headquarters in the plant on the west side which had been occupied by Camano Blue Point Oyster Co. There, peas and corn were prepared for freezing in Ballard, while Hogue chilled its harvest on the farms for shipment to Kent.

The 1938 season looked so promising that "Peas that Please," the Bozeman slogan, was adopted for all peas grown in the Twin City area. A second-story addition to the Lien cannery was completed in time for the harvest. The town welcomed the sight of four carloads of unassembled viners, plus three carloads of seed peas, at the depot. Anticipation, however, was greater than realization, because of a prolonged drought in June. Despite this, all plants finished with good tonnage, though less than expected and less than the previous year.

Signaling the coming of the new era, was the October announcement by Stanwood Mills Inc. that it was closing its plant. The mill was the first to manufacture lumber in Stanwood and had been in operation for 48 years, since its founding in 1889 by A.S. Howard. Market and other conditions prompted the closure and sale of the stock to retail yards. More Next Time


conclude any vegetables eaten with cake or other flour-based products are deadly and should be avoided. I'm looking at you, zucchini bread.



WATCHING LOCAL SPORTS - LIVE STREAMING

Messages from the Athletic Department regarding spectators at home games: There is a lot of information out about spectators at games. We wanted to make sure parents are in the loop. The WESCO league voted to have only home spectators at sporting events. No visiting team spectators will be allowed into away games. Here is the process for athletes to invite parents to home games. 1) Each student will receive 2 vouchers from their coach (a split family can have 4 and this information will be verified with what we have in our system). 2) The coach will mark off on the provided roster which athletes took their vouchers. 3) The coach will turn the roster back into the athletic office. 4) The athlete will hand the vouchers out to their parents. 5) The only way into the game is by presenting the voucher. No exceptions. Student message: Next week we will begin allowing students to attend the remaining varsity home games. Football on March 26th @ 7:00 pm, and Soccer on March 29th @ 7:30 pm. Students will need to sign up for the game/games they want to attend on a Google Form. Seniors will have the first hour for priority sign-up before the link will be open for all other students. There will be a limited amount of seating due to COVID guidelines. Vouchers for the games must be picked up at the athletic office window on the day of the contest. Seniors will receive an email from Mrs. Wark in their school email account with the link to signup at 10:00 AM on Monday. All other students will receive their link at 11:00 AM. The picking up of the voucher will be the student's agreement to follow all COVID protocols with the understanding that they will be asked to leave the game if they are not adhering to the protocols. WATCH YOUR STEP!

Speculation is running wild regarding the recently discovered bottomless pit, aptly named "Hell's Hole." Located in the forest due west of Highland trail in the Barnum Point trail system, the pit was discovered by local hikers Mariam and Travis Beckle in mid-January. The apparently bottomless pit is drawing attention and unwanted crowds. The last thing our peaceful quiet community wants is to be brought into the spotlight especially for something as attention grabbing as a natural phenomenon. And this is just the kind of phenomenon that demands investigation from experts far and wide.

In a recent interview, hiker Travis Beckle said, "Why did this have to happen out here? We don't want all the attention this will bring." But attention we will have!

Many of us are familiar with Mel's Hole near Manatash Ridge in Ellensburg, WA. Mel's Hole is named after the farmer who discovered it decades ago. It is said anything (including a dead cow) can be thrown down the pit without any indication of hitting bottom. At certain times of the day, there is said to be a dark beam that shines from the mouth of the hole accompanied by a blast of freezing air. To this day, Mel's Hole is unexplained.

Likewise, in Woodinville, repair work on an extensive pothole was scheduled to be done a few years back. When the road crew showed up to do the work it was discovered to be more than a huge pothole; it was a bottomless pit. The police, fire department, and local geologists showed up and every news station around Seattle followed. As of today, the hole sits wide open, a frightening invitation for the brave and curious to explore middle earth. Although no dark beam has been reported shining from the mouth as happens with Mel's Hole, the Woodinville Hole does emit a similar blast of frigid air several times a day.

Both holes are cylindrical in shape and apparently bottomless. All of this brings us back to our own bottomless pit, Hell's Hole, named by renowned local geologist Digger Westover, because of the blast of scalding hot air emitted several times a day. There are still many questions to be answered such as why our hole emits hot air in contrast to the other two bottomless pits in our state. And then there's the biggest question: how is a bottomless pit even possible and could it actually have an opening at another end somewhere? Does is truly pass through the planet, as is being speculated by Digger and his fellow geologists, hence explaining the extreme heat of the emitted air blasts?

Covid 19 has kept us all sheltering like moles. With better weather heading our way comes the urge to get outdoors and take a hike. Until we have some answers and a good safety fence with proper signage surrounding the pit, geologist Digger Westover's advice to the community is to never wander off designated trails!

More information to come as the investigation unfolds.



The ferris wheel is the only relic left behind on Camano Island because it was too costly to transport. Jack Archibald plans to renovate the wheel and offer rides to tourists and locals. LIGHT

Talk to a visual artist and they can tell you much about the character of light. Different times of day, different seasons, soft, harsh, the glow of light in clouds.. all changing the light we perceive.

Launch yourself outside the atmosphere and those subtleties disappear. Light is either on or its off. There are stories of astronauts stepping outside for a space walk in darkness and experiencing the almost instantaneous blast of Sun as the orbit brought them back into day. After realizing the flash was normal would follow a disorienting sense of being suspended above the Earth. Before there were the lights of the ship with maybe a twinkle of a few lights below. In a flash the reference changes and the ground becomes frighteningly distant.

On Earth, a porch-light can expand its influence long past the bulb. Light reflects in moisture, whether dense fog or a fine haze, in dust, smoke- think of car headlights in fog. In space, though, its either on or off. Put your hand between you and the light and the unlit side of your hand will be absolute black.

Astronomers on Earth are keenly aware of "transparency" and its balancing act with "seeing". Transparency measures anything between you and the stars. Seeing measures the stability of the atmosphere. Often the clearest nights have the worst seeing, like looking through clear running water. Sometimes those with a slight haze have the best. Deep sky objects require the best transparency or they are lost in the scattering of all those porch-lights (or worse!). Solar system viewing requires the best seeing and can deal with a bit of haze.

For the hardcore with scopes on planet Earth, those rare perfect nights are the stuff of legends. If you want to engage a fisherman, ask about the one that got away. Want to engage an astronomer? Ask about that perfect night.

LEMON CHEESECAKE TOPPED WITH LEMON CURD AND FRESH BERRIES

My signature Cheesecake with Ginger Snap cookie crust, decked out with homemade lemon curd, and fresh seasonal berries, Enjoy!

GINGER SNAP COOKIE CRUST: 2 c. Ginger Snap cookie crumbs; 1/4 c. granulated sugar; 6 T. butter, melted

ČHEESECAKE: 3 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened; 3 lg. eggs; 1 1/3 c. granulated sugar; 3 T. lemon juice; 1 tsp. vanilla extract; 1 tsp. grated lemon zest

LEMON CURD: 8 lg. egg yolks; 2 T. finely grated zest (about 2 lemons); 1/2 c. plus 2 T. freshly squeezed lemon juice (about 3 lemons); 1 c. granulated sugar; 1/8 tsp. salt; 10 T. cold unsalted butter, cut into pieces; Fresh berries: strawberries, raspberries, and blueberries for garnish

DIRECTIONS: 1. GINGER SNAP COOKIE CRUST: In a large bowl, combine the cookie crumbs with 1/4 cup sugar and melted butter. Press into the bottom and slightly up the sides of a 10-inch Springform pan. Place in the refrigerator until ready to use. 2. CHEESECAKE: Preheat oven to 350 degrees, 3. Using a stand mixer, fitted with a paddle attachment, beat cream cheese on high speed until completely smooth. Add eggs, one at a time, beating until smooth after each addition. Continue to beat, gradually adding 1 1/3 cups sugar, then lemon juice and vanilla. Stir in lemon zest. 4. Pour into prepared crust and bake for 35 minutes. Remove cheesecake from oven. Cool on a rack for 30 minutes. Meanwhile prepare Lemon Curd. 5. LEMON CURD: Combine yolks, lemon zest, lemon juice, and 1 cup sugar in a heavy-bottom saucepan, whisk to combine. Cook over medium-high heat, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon (be sure to scrape the sides of the pan), until the mixture is thick enough to coat the back of the spoon, 8 to 10 minutes, and registers 160 degrees on an instant-read thermometer. 6. Remove saucepan from heat. Add salt and butter, one piece at a time, stirring until smooth. Strain mixture through a fine sieve into a medium bowl. 7. Cover with plastic wrap, pressing it directly onto the surface of the curd to prevent a skin from forming. Refrigerate until chilled and set, at least 1 hour or up to 1 day. 8. Spread lemon curd over the cheesecake. Refrigerate for at least 5 hours over overnight. Top with fresh berries before serving.
