THE TAXMAN

Just about when I finished our federal taxes ... for the third time ... I come across an article listing 60 large corporations that pay no tax whatsoever. Maybe you remember the whining and moaning awhile back that American corporations pay too much compared to other countries' taxes. Maybe you even believed it. If so, all I can say is that your taxes are simple: put down what you earned, take your standard deduction, sign the form and send a check or wait for a refund. You probably figure corporations do the same thing. Put down their earnings, deduct their cost of doing bizness, that's the profit, divide by 40% or whatever it used to be and lick their wounds and their stamp.

And if in the end you don't have to pay taxes, well, as a taxpayer who does, I'm just glad we aren't sending these overtaxed corporations refund checks for all their bother.

Oh, wait, maybe we are. Allowances for next year's taxes, carry-overs, tax exemptions for simply moving to our town, the list is long and depressing. 

The Stanwood Area Historical Society asks, "Did You Know?"

Excerpts taken from the "Stanwood Story", written for the Stanwood News by Alice Essex. Sale of the plant and property, scheduled to be finalized on August 5, 1939 was blocked by the sudden death on that day of D.G. Bennie, who had managed the operation since 1911. A few outlying mills continued to operate, but the die was cast. The hum of viners was to replace the hum of lumber saws in Stanwood. The town had made the switch from trees to peas and processing was soon to become the mainstay of the industrial community.

The winds of change also were blowing elsewhere about town. In line with the frozen food trend, Oscar Rygg installed a cold storage plant at the Home Meat Market in East Stanwood and the following year Bob Boreson followed suit at his market on the west side.

Stanwood Hardware Co. announced a change of ownership and celebrated with an open house on April 1, 1937. S.R. Pusey, who retired in 1970, purchased the business from Rafter Hardware Co. of Mount Vernon, for whom he had managed the store for six years.

Founded In 1902 by H.C. Anderson, W.C. Brokaw, Peter Leque, Iver Johnson and H.A. Hafstad, the company was sold to W.B. Davis in 1916, and to William Rafter in 1936.

April, 1937 also was the time when Idan Gilbertson opened a grocery store in the former Bartz Hotel, which boasted a new front and remodeling by its new owner.

William Bailey bought the original Bank of Stanwood building that same spring and added a one-story addition for his law office. The remainder of the building accommodated the post office, Stanwood General Hospital, H.C. Ownby Confectionery and the office of the West Coast Telephone Co.

May 1, or thereabouts, at the order of the town council, Stanwood installed its first traffic light to expedite traffic at the corner of Market and Main Streets.

In East Stanwood, Stephen Floe moved his real estate office to his new building, the second brick structure in the east-side of town...Yngve and Hansen converted their department store into a grocery operation...Alan Anderson took over the grocery at S.A. Thompson & Co.... George Bryan, formerly with S.A. Thompson, took over management of Heely's Grocery in Florence, after the death of its pioneer owner and O.T. Stave opened a gas station and grocery store on the new highway at the Freeborn corner.

"Fish for everybody" was the word about town in September, when thousands of humpies turned the offshore vista at Warm Beach into a jumping, seething sea of salmon en route to their spawning grounds.

As the holidays rolled around, people were in a dancing mood judging from notices in the social columns. At the city hall, folks could enjoy a Thanksgiving fling to the tune of Ez Parkington's Orchestra for 40 cents, plus tax. At the Stillaguamish Grange, the same tab provided a ticket to the Scandinavian-American dance; at Camp Pleasant, Arnie Wangsmo was playing for a square dance, tab 15 cents and 35 cents, and at Victoria Hall, Herb Hansen was holding forth to the tune of 35 cents for men and 15 cents for women.

Another era was dancing its way in!

All's well that ends well, says the adage, and that was the outcome of the school upheaval of 1937. Stanwood needed a new high school, East Stanwood wanted to enlarge Lincoln...both came forth with requests for state and federal aid.

Consolidation was the advice from the state school officials, who maintained that taxes could be cut in half for the eight outlying districts and the two in the Twin Cities if they could join force happily. Meetings and a series of selections to test the public pulse began in April and ended in December, after numerous hassles in the intervening months.

A SURVIVAL GUIDE FOR COPING WITH AIR TRAVEL

When Orville Wright first took flight over the beaches of Kitty Hawk, NC in 1903, he couldn't have imagined that a century later, millions of people the world over would be getting into shouting matches with ticket agents, security screeners and baggage handlers over the nearly universal frustration caused by his invention. Thanks for the 12-inch gash in the side of my Louis Vuitton suitcase, Orville.

Singapore, New Delhi, and Buenos Aires are just a few of the famous world cities I will probably never get to visit because I refuse to put up with the headaches required to fly there. Also because, like most Americans, I'm not sure exactly where those cities are on a map. (I think New Delhi might be in Belgium.) But sometimes air travel is unavoidable. If you simply must book a flight, here are a few helpful tips to reduce your stress level.

Booking your flight - Choosing the right airline: The first rule of air travel is simple: Don't fly if you can possibly avoid it. But if you absolutely must fly, for example, to attend a family reunion, I recommend Qantas, the official airline of Australia. The last time Qantas had a fatality was in 1951. Of course, if your family reunion is in say, Chicago, you may need to make a couple connections through Sydney, Tokyo and New York. But you will arrive there safely, albeit two days later than the rest of your family, who opted for the nonstop on United.

The boarding process: For many of us, the most exhausting part of air travel is waiting in all those long lines. When going through TSA Security, you will usually have several lines to choose from. It's important to know which is the slowest. Here's a simple rule of thumb: The slowest line will be whichever one you decided to get in. It's an immutable law of airline travel.

Your line will inevitably be the one stalled by the guy who barely speaks English embroiled in a twenty-minute heated debate with the TSA agent (who also barely speaks English) arguing that the army surplus bowie knife he tried to sneak through is a gift for his seven-year-old niece. So just accept your fate and just pick a random line. Then start taking off your shoes, socks, belt, overcoat, shirt, slacks, and underwear for the TSA screener. But leave your glasses on – unless they're night vision goggles.

As you board the plane, it's important to be patient. The time it takes to reach your seat will vary between ten minutes and a week-and-a-half. The delay is typically caused by some 350-pound dude in camo pants and mullet haircut who will spend 15 minutes trying unsuccessfully to cram a carry-on the size of an elk into the overhead rack.





Retrieving your luggage at baggage claim: It's easy to mistake your bag for someone else's, so make sure it stands out by attaching a brightly colored neon orange strap securely to the handle. Upon arrival, head directly to baggage claim to collect your luggage. Notice how it's been an hour and now the only bag revolving around the carousel is a black bag with a brightly colored neon orange strap – which oddly enough is not your bag.

Go to the lost luggage desk, where you will look for the customer service agent. Notice the sign on the counter that reads "On break. Back in one hour." Eventually he will return. You will quickly notice the irony that despite having the title of customer service agent, he actually has no idea what the words "customer" or "service" mean. He will display as much genuine concern for locating your lost luggage as he has about Norwegian currency fluctuations.

You will eventually be informed that your luggage, which was supposed to arrive in Savannah, GA (airport code SAV) was misrouted to an airport with a similar airport code – Savoonga, Alaska (airport code SVA). Be patient. There is a better than 30% chance that the airline will quickly discover their error and get your luggage on the next plane headed east.... this time, to Shreveport, Louisiana (airport code SHV). Oh, one more thing. Your flight home will be delayed by nine hours due to a mechanical malfunction in your plane's main jet engine, which has failed for reasons nobody can figure out. So your luggage just might make your return flight after all.

If all of this still sounds like a bit too much excitement, there is one other way to take the hassle out of flying. Next time, take the train.

Jason Otto is a Northwest contemporary artist. His main medium is acrylic on canvas. Lively brush strokes and energetic compositions distinguish his works.







A Whale of a Success Story: Conservation Keys Annual Return by Ron Newberry. Nature wows us at this time of year on Whidbey and Camano islands. Each spring, enormous gray whales breach the surface of these beautiful marine waters and send a spray into the air, announcing their highly anticipated arrival. Members of one group of gray whales known as the "Sounders" have returned to Saratoga Passage for roughly 30 years. It's a festive occasion – Langley even holds a parade – and there's ample reason to celebrate. Island conservation is key to why these colossal cetaceans make the annual journey home. The Sounder whales, which number about 12, hold Whidbey and Camano waters in high regard. They'll pause along their coastal migration to detour more than 150 miles inland to feed in the North Puget Sound waters next to Whidbey and Camano. They're mostly seeking the abundant ghost shrimp found burrowed in mudflats. The gray whales wait for high tide and gorge themselves on the meaty crustaceans. Nearshore habitat and marine conditions found in Saratoga Passage, Port Susan, and Possession Sound are optimal for the thriving ghost shrimp, according to Ralph Downes, enforcement officer with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. "We get the largest concentration of gray whales feeding here because of the substrate and the presence of the shrimp," Downes said. "One of the reasons we have so many shrimp is the nutrient-rich water that comes out of the Stillaguamish, Snohomish and Skagit rivers but the most important thing is the beach — the sandy, shallow gradient where burrowing shrimp can live." Add in the fact that the tidal flow and wave action in Saratoga Passage and Possession Sound is mild compared to much of Puget Sound – allowing sediments to settle rather than get carried away – you start to understand why ghost shrimp are so densely populated in this one area. The Sounders eat hundreds of pounds of them a day while hanging out near the shores of Whidbey and Camano between March and May. This web of interdependence between one of the ocean's largest creatures and one of its smallest illustrates why naturally-functionally shorelines matter – and why preserving them is so vital. 

EARTHSHINE

If you have a clear view to the east before sunrise and to the west just after the Sun sets you will be able to see the glow of the Earth on the unlit portion of the Moon.

Known simply as Earthshine it is the most visible in early Moon phases because the phases between Earth and Moon are reversed: A person standing on a "New Moon" (totally dark disk from our perspective) would see a "Full Earth". A full Moon to us would be a New Earth on the Moon.

Since we live on a mostly water planet and water reflects mostly blue, Earthshine is mostly blue. As the phases of the Moon increase the Earth, from the Moon's perspective, diminishes and is washed out by the increasingly illuminated lunar disk.

How come, you may ask, is the Moon red during a lunar eclipse and not just blue? A lunar eclipse happens on a full Moon, so from the Moon's viewpoint a "New Earth". In this case light is refracted around the Earth's atmosphere at the edges. We see this every day in sunrises and sunsets which are, of course, largely red.

The Full Earth from the Moon must be a spectacular sight, but perhaps even more so a lunar "solar eclipse" when the Earth blocks the lunar day and everything is lit up in a dark red. We almost take our end/beginning of day colors for granted, but since the Moon has no atmosphere sunlight would always appear a harsh white. For a lunar inhabitant an eclipse would be the only time to experience the color of the sunset.

LEMON SPAGHETTI WITH SHRIMP

Spaghetti noodles tossed in a light and tangy lemon sauce topped with pan seared shrimp, Enjoy!

SHRIMP MARINADE: 1 lb. extra-large shrimp; 1/3 c. extra virgin olive oil; Zest of 2 lemons; 1/2 c. chopped parsley; 4 cloves garlic, minced; 1/2 tsp. sea salt; 1/4 tsp. freshly cracked black pepper

PASTA LEMON SAUCE: 1 lb. spaghetti; 1/2 c. extra virgin olive oil; 1/3 c. fresh lemon juice; 1/2 c. Parmesan cheese; 1/2 c. chopped parsley; Zest from 1 lemon; Sea salt and freshly cracked black pepper, to taste

DIRECTIONS: Prepare ingredient before you begin. SHRIMP MARI-NADE: In a large bowl, toss together the shrimp, olive oil, lemon zest, parsley, garlic, salt, and pepper; set aside to marinate at room temperature for 20 minutes. Meanwhile bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. When the water reaches a rapid boil, toss in spaghetti, and cook according to package instructions. While the pasta cooks, heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Cook the shrimp in a single layer for about 2-3 minutes turning them over once. (Depending on the size of your pan, you may need to cook the shrimp in 2 batches.) Once the shrimp are done, transfer to a plate and loosely cover with foil; set skillet aside to toss spaghetti in later. PASTA LEMON SAUCE: In a small bowl or measuring cup, whisk together the olive oil, lemon juice, and Parmesan cheese. Drain the spaghetti reserving 1 cup of pasta water. Add the spagnetti to the skillet along with the lemon sauce and a 1/2 cup pasta water; toss to combine. Add the parsley and lemon zest. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Add more pasta water if needed. Plate the lemon spaghetti. Top with shrimp and sprinkle with more Parmesan cheese if desired.
