COMMUTING ON THE SOUTH END

I've known some folks on the South End who didn't own a car, incredible as that seems. And this was back before the Island Transit free buses plied the highways. They'd hitchhike or walk, they'd ask for rides at Elger Bay Store. Some rode bicycles. They weren't making some ecological, enviro'green' statement --- they were just poor. And without transportation, they kept getting poorer since there weren't many local jobs.

A lot of us South Enders commute. Seriously commute. After my one night at the Twin City Food assembly lines and a mangled arm, I quit and found myself in a familiar predicament: unemployed with no prospects for work. Just about when I hit rock bottom and figured I'd need to move to Seattle just to keep my homestead, I got a graveyard job at Everett General Hospital as an orderly two nights every weekend. 40 miles one way. I thought it was a trip to Oregon every week, an adventure in my old '60 Chevy Apache pickup that needed constant mechanical attention, often on the side of the road.

Maybe it's an indication of just how paradisical the South End is that we'll drive to Hell and back just to live here. The missuz drove 75 miles to the University of Washington Library in Seattle for her job. I knew folks who drove to Tacoma, over 100 miles away, to find work that paid enough to keep their piece of Shangri-La-La. Course, they probably never saw it in the light of day ---- mostly just imaginary real estate, sort of exactly like Heaven. Maybe without the streets of gold.

My own commuting days are about over. Walk down the hill to the workshop, fire up the woodstove on cold days, go back up for the third cup of coffee and wait for the place to warm up. Sure I miss those drives through the farmlands, the tulip fields, over the rivers and past all those Puget Sound views and the volcanoes and the mountain ranges. But my truck's gonna last a decade or two longer and if I get real nostalgic about the good old days of commuting, I just take a road trip, you know, without the 8 hour shifts at the end.

Kid's Korner



by Easy Peasy and Fun (https://www.easypeasyandfun.com/paper-flower-craft/). This adorable paper flower craft is perfect for welcoming spring in your home. These will make a wonderful decoration, you can make a few and have a lovely bouquet. Use sheet music paper, or newspaper for a more rustic look. Ready? Let's start.


What you need: circle paper punch – we recommend extra large if this craft will be done by a younger kid; yellow paper; paper in a variety of colors (we used regular print paper); paper cutter or scissors; stick glue; green paper drinking straws; clear tape (or patterned for some fun)

Directions: 1. First punch a few circles out of yellow paper. You will need one circle for 1 flower. We recommend you use larger punch if you are working with small children as it will be easier for them to handle. 2. Cut strips of paper. There is some trial and error with the next step. Depending on your circle size, different lengths (and widths) of paper strips will work. We recommend you first make one strip of paper and make a loop (as seen in the next step) and see if it works with your circle size. Once you are happy with the size of the loop in relation to your yellow circle, start cutting strips of paper in that size. We recommend you do the cutting if you are working with younger kids. If you will be making this a classroom project and want the kids to make the cutting by their own, we recommend you use the largest circle punch, as then cutting strips across the width of a letter sized paper works out nicely. 3. Glue the ends of paper strips together, making a paper loop. You will need guite a few (the number depends on the size of the flower you are making). 4. Glue the loops on one side of the paper circle. We started by sticking 4 at a 90° angle, then another 4 in between and another 8 in between those. 5. Once you are happy with how full your paper flower craft is looking, apply some glue onto the green paper straw and press it in the middle of the flower. 6. Secure with clear tape. Your paper flower craft is complete.

I was starting to lose feeling in my soaked, ice-cold hands. It was at this point that I suggested that maybe we should call it a day. Rain was beginning to create puddles on the greens. But Kevin would have none of it. It was an April shower. It would pass. So we kept going.



CLEAN WATERS DEPEND ON HEALTHY LANDS

The Whidbey Camano Land Trust has permanently protected roughly 15 miles of natural shoreline and more than 3,000 acres of tidelands in Island County, including a half-mile stretch of beach at Possession Sound Preserve, south of Clinton. Once conserved, stewardship staff lead efforts to restore shorelines to their natural state whenever possible. In 2015, the Land Trust partnered with the Washington Department of Natural Resources to remove a creosote-treated wooden bulkhead at the Waterman Shoreline Preserve in Possession Sound that cut off sediment supply to the beach. Eroding feeder bluffs that provide sediment play a critical role in nearshore habitats. They replenish the beach and tidelands with sand, gravel and nutrients, enriching habitat essential for marine life including crabs, shrimp, endangered Chinook salmon, orca and gray whales. The health of nearby forests and lands also contribute to water quality in Puget Sound. "The productivity of the upland areas is an important part of the whole process," said Dan Matlock, Land Trust board member and retired college biology professor. "The shading of beaches for forage fish spawning, the insect rain (insects that fall into the water from nearby shores and vegetation), shorebird nesting and feeding habitat, and water filtration are all part of the whole picture." Howard Garrett, co-founder of the nonprofit Orca Network, agrees that all of those factors are making a difference in providing healthier habitats for fish and wildlife. "It certainly does to those dozen or so gray whales that come back every year," Garrett said with a laugh. Garrett said he takes pride in being part of an island community that is passionate about the well-being of whales and cares so much about the overall environment. His organization is dedicated to raising awareness about Pacific Northwest whales and the importance of providing them healthy and safe habitats. While resident orca whales are struggling due to dwindling salmon populations, the number of gray and humpback whales in Puget Sound are increasing. That's good news for one special group of grays that find that the shrimp bounty around Whidbey and Camano is worth taking a detour. The Whidbey Camano Land Trust is a non-profit nature conservation organization that actively involves the community in protecting, restoring, and appreciating the important natural habitats and resource lands that support the diversity of life on our islands and in the waters of Puget Sound. WSRB UPGRADES CAMANO FIRE'S PROTECTION CLASSIFICATION

The Washington Surveying and Rating Bureau recently upgraded the Protection Classification for Island County Fire District 1 - the area served by Camano Island Fire & Rescue - to a 5/6. Previously, Camano was rated as a 6/7. Properties rated as a 5 must be located within 1,000 feet of a fire hydrant. Properties located more than 1,000 feet from a fire hydrant are rated a 6. The improved classifications relate to the island's fire insurance rating, and could potentially reduce insurance rates for local homeowners. Homeowners can contact their insurance provider to see if the upgraded rating reduces their insurance premiums. "Our insurance rating is a community effort involving our department, our dispatch agency, and the numerous water associations on the island," Chief Levon Yengovan said. "We're pleased that our work to improve our fire protection service may also save our residents money." The WSRB rates the fire protection capabilities of all fire departments in the state every six years, and provides a rating from 0 to 10. The lower the rating, the better the fire protection capability. Most fire protection districts in the state are rated between a 4 and an 8. Many insurance companies use WSRB ratings to help determine residential property coverage rates. Ratings are based on four factors: The fire department itself, fire safety controls, emergency communications and water supply. Find more information about the WSRB online at www1.wsrb.com. THAT SENSE OF DREAD

Beekeeping shouldn't be all that stressful, for the beekeeper it is, not so much for the bee. There's a lot to manage and the bees are really good at creating chaos!! At least we think its chaos. ...but it's not, it's just what they do - reproduce!! The nuances of swarms: The primary swarms we see now are those reproductive swarms, the natural ones. Those are the swarms that the bees are want to do all by themselves and do very well if left to their own devices. These early swarms are a natural way that bees make more of themselves on a colony level, they split in two and rehome the more mature half. That rehoming normally would occur in nature in a tree or hollow log. Due to urbanization and sprawl, it now happens occasionally in homes and outbuildings. It is a very fine line between nature and civilization – the trick is to make it workable for both. The swarms people tend to notice are colonies that have just left their old home and are "in transition". The swarm will land in a nearby tree, bush or shrub to allow the "scout bees" to go out and investigate a suitable new location for them to inhabit. This can take anywhere from hours to days depending on weather, local habitat and the size of the cluster. A smaller unit may take more time due to a lack of adequate scout bees doing the hard work of finding a suitable home. Bad weather, especially rainy conditions don't allow the scout bees to fly as much and the gueen being protected by the cluster won't fly if conditions aren't good. The best thing you can do if there's a swarm on your property is to call a professional. Beekeeper that is!! The beekeeper will be able to rehome that cluster in an appropriate location where there are adequate resources to ensure its survival and make sure it's well taken care of during the very fragile period of building a new home. Calling a beekeeper as quickly as possible is really important, since in our location there really aren't enough resources to make sure the swarm will be able to put together a new wax comb house and fill it with honey before the winter cold comes. The flight of bees in late June or July after the major nectar flow (blackberry in our area) is bound to starve either in the short term or in winter due to lack of stored resources. I have a lot less reservations to see a swarm fly off in May or June than in July even though it pains me to see my bees fly off at all, ever, I have more confidence that they have a fighting chance of making it on their own than the ones who fly off late in the season. Swarms are a natural impulse and sometimes you just can't fight Mother Nature, but since we put them here, it makes sense that we are good stewards and make sure they're taken care of to the best of our ability!! So. Please call me if you have a "lump o' bees" stuck to something on your property, I'd be happy to come check them out and since I have the majority of colonies on the island....well the girls probably escaped from one of my units anyway...sometimes the party in the box just gets rowdy!! lol!! https://camanoislandhoney.com/ (C) 303 330-1724.

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The Stanwood Area Historical Society asks, "Did You Know?"

Excerpts taken from the "Stanwood Story", written for the Stanwood News by Alice Essex. East Stanwood chose to go it alone. Stanwood was for consolidation, so were the four Camano Island and the four mainland districts. All seemed favorable until the final ballot was taken in May. The vote was 771 "for" and 195 "against", with a majority of "fors" in all but Warm Beach where the result was 62 "for" and 88 "against". The overall majority vote held, the election was officially approved and consolidation was given the green light.

Per pre-election agreement, a site between Stanwood and East Stanwood was proposed, exploratory steps were taken and application was made for state and federal aid. Ere long, a telegram came from Washington, D.C. announcing a \$44,280 federal allotment for construction of a \$100,000 high school for the newly formed consolidated district, which included Stanwood, Silvana, Norman, Florence, Warm Beach, Livingston Bay, Utsalady, Camano and Mabana.

Architect Earl Morrison set about drawing up plans, then came the obstacle race. Warm Beach was unhappy, declared the election illegal and demanded that it be nullified on the grounds that majority approval was mandatory in each of the participating districts. With this declaration, Warm Beach filed suit, and action came to an abrupt stop.

After much legal ado, Judge Ralph C. Bell ruled in August that the law upheld the Warm Beach stand. A repeat series of elections with voting regulations well spelled out, was the only legal solution, said Judge Bell.

This time Warm Beach chose not to participate and when the final ballot was taken in December consolidation passed with flying colors...428 "for" and 87 "against." For the second time, a new consolidated district was formed and a combined state and federal grant of \$56,288 was approved. The remaining \$43,000 was to be raised by special levy.

On this round, everybody (except the 87 dissenters) was happy, and on December 30 a bond issue of \$50,000 was passed with little opposition. Site transactions were resumed and purchase was finalized on approximately eight acres from the Lien holdings of the north side of 271st Street, an additional 10 acres was later acquired from the Ovenell Bros. for \$2,700, bringing the total site acquisition to 17 and one-half acres at a cost of \$4,500.

The first "old grad" banquet was held in the Masonic Hall that December. The affair, emceed by Clifford Myron, brought together 100 of the 850 graduates, who had received diplomas from Stanwood Hight School between the years 1911 and 1937.

Says the story, "The Class of 1927 won honors for the largest attendance, but the Class of 1917 had the most pep." Musical selections and brief comments by representatives of the various classes preceded organization of the school's first alumni association. Alf Willard became the group's first president; Alice McKean Davison was elected as its first secretary-treasurer.

In January 1938, contracts were awarded for the new building and construction began in earnest. Planned to accommodate 300-400 students, the facility included 13 classrooms, study hall, library, lunchroom, kitchen, science lab, lockers, showers, home economics and shop departments, as well as a 50 X 90-foot gymnasium and stage, with and estimated folding chair seating capacity of 1,200 to 1,500 people. Special accouterments consisted of a radio public address system, speech room with stage and photographic darkroom.

Ready for occupancy in September 1938, the initial enrollment was 185 students. Three 55-passenger buses were added to the district's transportation fleet and it soon became evident that the days of proverbial little red schoolhouses were numbered.

SUNSETS ON OTHER PLANETS

Take a look at the above image. The Sun is setting over a desert landscape and with the beautul sunset colors of...blue? What you are looking at IS a sunset over a desert landscape, but not on Earth. Its Mars taken by NASA's Spirit rover. The daytime sky on Mars is red, but the sunsets are blue..exactly the opposite of Earth. Because there is so much dust in the Martian atmosphere that dust absorbs blue light during the day and scatters it at sunset.

Venture a trip to Saturn's moon Titan and another counter intuitive even occurs: Titan's twilight light is actually brighter than midday. Titan's atmosphere is so thick and its distance from the Sun would make even the brightest times not much more than a very foggy orange night under a full Moon.

A trip to Venus at sunset would show a hazy yellow gradually turning brown as the Sun sets. A Uranus sunset would be a deep blue. Leaving our solar system completely, a sunset on the exoplanet Trappist-1e would be mostly a copper brown. Sunsets anywhere without an atmosphere would be like a colorless off switch.

If we ever colonize Mars those who have only known the Martian sky would find it very strange that we on Earth get so excited about that beautiful orange and red sunset. "Everyone knows", they would say, "that sunsets are blue".

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
STRAWBERRY RHUBARB CREAM CHEESE PIE

Recipe from Camano resident my dear neighbor Sharon Schwalm – Luscious fresh strawberries heaped upon a delightful cream cheese base topped with a strawberry-rhubarb compote, Enjoy!

INGREDIENTS: 1 (9-inch) pastry shell, baked and cooled; 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened; 2 T. granulated sugar; 2 T. milk; 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract; 2 1/2 c. fresh strawberry halves; 1 1/2 c. coarsely chopped rhubarb; 3/4 c. water; 1/2 c. granulated sugar; 2 T. cornstarch DIRECTIONS: 1. In a large bowl, using an electric hand mixer, beat softened cream cheese, 2 tablespoons sugar, milk, and vanilla on medium speed until well combined. Spread the cream cheese mixture into the bottom of the pastry shell. 2. In a small bowl, mash 1/2 cup strawberries. Arrange the remaining strawberries over the cream cheese mixture. 3. In a small saucepan, combine the mashed strawberries, rhubarb, water, and 1/2 cup sugar; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer 2 minutes or until the rhubarb is tender. Drain the fruit, reserving 1 cup juice. (If necessary, add enough water to equal 1 cup.). 4. Bring the juice and cornstarch to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes or until the mixture is clear and thickened. Stir in strawberry/rhubarb mixture. Add a few drops of red food coloring, if desired. Cool slightly. Spoon cooled strawberry/rhubarb mixture over fresh strawberries. Refrigerate until chilled and set. 5. Serve topped with a dollop of whipped cream. Serves 8.
